MESA CLUB NEWS:

MESA Club has been busy as always. The Mousetrap Car Competition was a big success, and many of the entries were super cool. The STEM Day put on by Colorado University and hosted by West Middle School was awesome. MGMS took about twenty-four students and they are all really excited to see what CU will bring for us next year.



Our next competition is the Egg Drop Competition which is at Colorado Mesa University. The competition is on Monday, April 24th. Students have to research, design, and build a device that holds three raw eggs. Their device will be dropped from a height of forty feet onto concrete. The lighter the device weighs and the faster it falls the better. Teams that have three whole, unbroken, raw eggs after the drop are in the running for winning. In addition to the competition, students will have an opportunity to tour CMU's campus and observe science labs and experiments as well as tour other cool campus buildings like the library and sports center.

Finally, a few months ago, MGMS's MESA Club was approached by SD51 to be one of the first schools in SD51 and the first western slope school district to become involved in the State of Colorado's Environmental Leadership Program (ELP). The ELP is a voluntary program that encourages and rewards superior environmental performers that go beyond the requirements of environmental regulations and move toward the goal of sustainability. Our MESA Club will host a huge collection day for recycling metals on Saturday, April 8. This is going to be a really big deal, so look and listen for information about this program on local news and radio stations. More information about the program and the collection day will be going home with all MGMS students after spring break.

Spring Scholastica Tournament

Fourteen students involved in the Mt. Garfield's Gifted and Talented Program attended the D51 Scholastica Tournament on March 3rd. The Scholastica Tournament includes students from all nine D51 Middle Schools and had approximately ninety-five students competing in games involving logic, strategy, spatial awareness, math skills, and combinations of these areas. Health Office Reminders:

SUN SAFETY

It's warm and sunny! Your kids want to be outside and enjoy the sunshine. Keep in mind these tips from the American Cancer Society to stay safe in the sun!

REMEMBER TO:

Limit Sun Exposure

1. Peak sun hours are between 10am and 4pm, so try to limit the amount of sun exposure during this time.

Cover up

- o Use clothing to cover and protect your skin.
- o Wear a hat. This helps protect your skin and eyes.

Wear Sunglasses

1. You are supposed to wear sunglasses that block 99%-100% of both UVA and UVB rays. To buy the cor rect sunglasses, look for "UV absorption up to 400nm" or "Meets ANSI UV Requirements."

Use Sunscreen

o The SPF (Sun Protection Factor) in sunscreen states how long the sunscreen will protect your skin from the sun. To find that out, take the SPF, times it by 15, and that is how long the sunscreen will protect your skin.

o Apply and reapply sunscreen every 2 hours.

Avoid tanning beds

1.Tanning beds give out UVA and usually UVB rays as well. Both rays can cause long-term skin damage, and can contribute to skin cancer.

Protect your children

o Keep babies (younger than 6 months) out of direct sunlight, and cover up and protect with clothing and hats.

- o Use these tips to protect you and your children from the sun.
- o Educate your children about sun safety to have a safe and enjoyable summer!

Remember, just because it has been warm and sunny doesn't mean the cold weather is behind us. Please make sure your children are dressed for all types of weather.

Gator Physical Education continues to build strong BODYS & MINDS.

MGMS P.E. students have finished up winter time net activities. With the end of the 3rd Quarter students completed badminton, pickleball and ping pong units with tournaments in all three concentrations. Also, at the end of the quarter came the fitness assessment finals. Students test their abilities with five different assessments measuring upper and lower body strength & endurance, cardio-vascular strength and endurance, flexibility, agility, and speed. In meeting cross-curriculum requirements, grades are added and averaged for the quarter. More specifically in third quarter 8th graders concentrated on improving personal results in the Pacer test, 7th graders learned how to calculate and use personal target heart



rates and 6th graders applied growth mindset rubrics in all aspects of the physical education setting.

In 4th Quarter students will start out with fitness pre-assessments to establish a baseline for the eight elements of fitness. Our units this quarter will consist of Hantis, Track & Field, Softball, Chicago Ball, Frisbee, and possibly a unit on summertime backyard activities.

Physical education students are required to dress out in shorts daily, the NEW Gator t-shirt, tennis shoes that tie and come with a good attitude, ready to be challenged and have fun.

Text Alerts

District 51 has invested in a district-wide communication system (called SchoolConnects) that will allow all schools and the district to contact you regarding important news, events, and emergency or safety- related situations. Schools and the district can only send texts to phones who have subscribed to receive the messages. If you want to receive SMS text messages from the school or district, you must first do the following:

- 1. Ensure that your child's school has your cell phone listed in the student database under "Mobile".
- 2. From the SMS-capable telephone where you want to receive the text messages, text the word Join to the number 56360. If our messaging system finds a match for your phone number in its database, you receive a confirmation message thanking you for joining school alerts. If our messaging system does not find a match for your phone number in its database, you will receive a me
- 3. Create a contact on your phone with the name of your school or school district, or another meaningful name, and the phone number 56360. Then, when you receive a text from this number, you know who is sending it.

At this point in time, the District will only contact parents in the case of an emergency or safety-related situations. The District will reach out to parents using phone, text and email or a combination. Parents and the community can also check the district website (www.d51schools.org) or social media accounts (facebook.com/schooldistrict51 and twitter.com/district51) for emergency alerts and updates as well as general news.

In order to receive the quickest and most accurate information in an emergency situation, parents need to be sure that all home phone, cell phone and email addresses are up-to-date in the student information system, Synergy. Contact theschool office if you have any questions. The texts, calls and emails will only go to those families who have those fieldsfilled in in the database.
