Modernism in American Literature

Literary Modernism – 1915-1945

- 1. Response to "sense of total breakdown"
 - a. Reaction to World War I
 - b. The Great Depression
- 2. Sees the world as "fragmented" pattern of construction out of fragments
 - a. Unrelated pieces juxtaposed
 - b. Life is fragmented
 - c. Unusual connective patterns missing: morals, laws, etc.
- 3. Point of view is remote and detached from subject
- 4. Subject: often questions the purpose of literature
 - a. What is the use of literature in a world which is falling apart?
- 5. Elite audience: intellectual, academic

Philosophical Backgrounds

- 1. Karl Marx
 - a. Economic Determinism
 - b. Human behavior controlled by forces *outside* of self
 - c. CLASS STRUGGLE, workers unite for a Utopian change
- 2. Sigmund Freud
 - a. Psychoanalysis
 - b. Psychological Determinism
 - c. Human behavior controlled by forces *inside* of self
 - i. Subconscious hidden desires and meanings
 - ii. Interpretation of Dreams
 - d. Interior forces, man's taboos and rules govern the world
 - e. Self-analysis
- 3. Friedrich Nietzsche
 - a. "God is Dead"
 - b. Economic and psychological determinism
 - c. No divine patterns, search for meaning
 - d. Trying to put world back into some kind of order, structure
 - e. Spiritual ruins after the war: what is the meaning of life?
- 4. Pablo Picasso
 - a. Objects are broken down, analyzed, and reassembled as an abstract form
 - i. Cubism
 - b. Allows for multiple differing perspectives
 - c. Lack of overall cohesion

Characteristics of Modernism

- 1. Alienation from society; loneliness
- 2. Procrastination; inability to act
- 3. Agonized recollection of the past
 - a. Flashbacks
- 4. Fear of death and appearance of death
- 5. Inability to feel or express love
- 6. World as a Wasteland
- 7. Man creating his own myths within his mind to fall back upon

- 3. Decadence and decay
- 4. Loss and despair
