Students & Teachers

Students build off of skills they learned in sixth and seventh grade to make sense of longer, more challenging fiction and nonfiction texts. Focusing on context clues and textual evidence helps eighth grade students sharpen their ability to write and speak with more clarity. Students will expand their vocabulary is by using online resources and use new words in their asses and their writing assignments to meet these literacy goals, students must pay attention to details in their reading and when writing.

The math skills and understanding that your child will game during eighth-grade are among the most important foundations for college and career readiness. These include working with ratios and rates, and working with variables and variable expression – the building blocks of algebra. Many of the years topics will remain a major emphasis throughout the middle school years into high school.

Student Success Plans

The Student Success Plan is an individualized student-centered plan that engages every student based on their unique interests and strengths helping then to understand the relevancy of education to achieve postsecondary educational and career goals. The SSP will begin in Grade 6 and continue through high school. It will provide the student support and assistance in setting goals for academic, career, social, emotional, and physical development that meet rigorous high school and postsecondary expectations. The SSP and supporting activities, such as student portfolios, experiences outside the classroom, dual concurrent credit, along with academic/personal records should be electronic and portable following the student from school to school and district to district.



Naviance

Nayiance is a web-based program that the city of Waterbury has purchased for middle and high-school students. They can complete career interest inventories, learning style inventories, etc. and search colleges and careers of their choice. This program is designed to augment SSP.
