Our students and staff have been working very hard to continue to increase students reading and math fluency.



KINDERGARTEN Team – Mrs. Gutierrez and Ms. Parks

Looks like we are still waiting for that spring weather! We have many fun activities planned for the children. We will be celebrating Earth Day, talking about animal's habitats and plants. In language arts each class will be writing its own story! We have been working hard to get ready for the DRA. Over spring break please keep practicing with them because as soon as we get back the testing begins!

Please keep reading with your child every night. Make sure you are asking them who the characters are in the story and the setting as well. You also want to try and help them to re-tell the story in order from beginning to end. You can also help your child write a sentence about the story or even start to write a story of your own. Each week the class has a new word of the week which will get sent home with the child at the end of the week. Please put the word somewhere in your house and have your child say it before they can enter a room or even open the refrigerator! A list of all the sight words was sent home with your child, so feel free to add more to your house to practice!

In Math students will be exploring adding and subtracting within 10 and basic measurement skills. We have been using different methods to solve addition and subtraction problems, such as using our fingers, drawing pictures, or using counters. Please practice these with your children at home when doing the math homework. We are starting to plan a field trip once the weather gets warmer. We will keep you posted once we get more information! Enjoy your spring break and remember keep reading, reading, reading!

GRADE 1 Team – Ms. Dunn and Mrs. Roden


As we move into April, we see our first grade students rounding the corner to second grade! The students have improved in reading, writing and math. But, there is still work to be done! After a restful April break, DRA testing will begin again. Please continue to read together every night. Don't forget to have your child retell when the book is closed after you read.

You can help practice math facts when getting breakfast ready or driving in the car. We appreciate your help and cooperation and look forward to an amazing end to our school year.

GRADE 2 Team – Mr. Dombrowski and Mr. Homewood

Second grade students in our classes are ready to continue to work efficiently and expand their thinking! Students continue to work on various genres of literature in reading. Our second graders just took the winter DRA's and students continue to grow! Please continue to encourage your child to read at least 10-15 minutes every night. Ask them questions about what they have read so you can be sure that they are practicing "real reading" by reading the words and not just flipping through the pages and just looking at the pictures. We are working hard on finishing Unit 3 and will move our focus onto Unit 4 – poetry and reader's theatre. Report cards will be shortly issued after spring vacation. Also, students are hoping to have parents come in within the next few weeks. Students cannot wait to share their work with you!

In math, the students have been learning about geometry and measurement. They also mastered how to solve comparison story problems based on interpreting graphs and measurements. As we have been throughout the course of the year we will continue to focus on place value. Emphasis is placed on regrouping in addition and ungrouping in subtraction. Students will continue to make new tens, hundreds, and thousands. In social studies, we are continuing to discuss community and how they can become excellent citizens.





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Your child will continue to receive homework Monday – Thursday. They should be studying their spelling words every night since there will be a spelling test <u>every</u> Friday unless otherwise noted! In addition, please encourage your child to read every day for 20 minutes. Ask questions about what he or she read. We also have just made flash cards in the classroom that students will be allowed to bring home and return to school every day for extra practice!

GRADE 4 Team – Miss O'Brien and Mrs. Scarmo

Happy spring! The fourth grade will soon be taking the Smarter Balanced Test. We have been preparing by practicing sample examples on the computer and perfecting our typing skills. We will also be completing our Unit 3 culminating project for ELA. In this unit we have explored themes in literature. Students will create a" Message in a Bottle" to relate a story to the "themes of our lives". We continue to improve our reading fluency by partner reading, echo reading, and readers' theater.

In math fourth graders strive to fluently add, subtract, multiply and divide multi-digit numbers. Your help in encouraging your student to read at home and practice math facts is greatly appreciated.

GRADE 5 Team – Mrs. Hart and Ms. Petruzzi

For the first time, students in Grade 5 are approaching April as a testing season. We have started the administration of the Smarter Balanced Field Test, and will continue to run different Math and Reading assessment tasks up to April 22nd. This includes a well-deserved Spring Break, April 14-18th.

The new Unit 4 of the Reading curriculum will cover Historical Fiction and Non-Fiction. We will be reading about the American Revolution, Civil War, and The Great Depression. In Math, we will use our multiplication to





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calculate area and volume, in addition to algebraic reasoning. We look forward to meeting and planning transitions to middle school on Teacher/Parent conferences on April 23rd, 5-7 p.m.

READING DEPARTMENT EXPECTATIONS – Mrs. O'Leary and Mrs. Ciarlo By the end of First Grade, your child will be expected to:

- Ask and answer questions about key details in a text.
- Read on-level text with purpose and understanding.
- Read on-level text orally with accuracy, appropriate rate, and expression.
- Write opinion pieces, informational/explanatory texts (name a topic and supply some facts about it), and narratives (stories).
- Demonstrate command of the conventions of Standard English grammar and usage when writing or speaking.
- Demonstrate command of the conventions of Standard English including capitalization, punctuation, and spelling when writing.

How can you help?

- Read with or to your child every day.
- Read stories (fiction) and informational (nonfiction) books.
- Ask your child simple and difficult questions about the books you share.

Example story: Little Red Riding Hood

Simple (who? what? when? where?): Who did Little Red Riding Hood visit?

Difficult (how? why?): How do you think Little Red Riding Hood felt when the wolf pretended to be Grandma?

- Talk about other books that have similar characters and plots.
- Ask your child to write a story about a picture he/she has drawn.
- Talk to your child as you cook, shop or drive in the car.

It's April and Spring better not be fooling us anymore! Even though it is Spring, we must still be vigilant as colds and viruses are still around. Maintaining proper outerwear these coming weeks is important. Remind your child even a light jacket needs to be worn on warmer days – it's not summer yet.

Message that Going to School Every Day Matters for Success in School and Life

Everyone - including those of you who work in schools, preschools, public agencies, community organizations, faith based institutions, elected officials, and parents themselves - can help spread the word about this important issue. What can you do to help get these messages out in your agency, community or school? Here are some important facts:

- Families should avoid extended vacations that require your children to miss school. Try to line up vacations with the school's schedule. The same goes for doctor's appointments.
- For younger children, you can set a regular bedtime and morning routine. Make sure they get 9 to 11 hours of sleep. You can lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- For older children, you can help them develop homework and bedtime routines that allow for 8 to 9 hours of sleep. Make sure that when the lights go out, so do the cell phones, video games and computers.
- Get to know the teachers and administrators. With younger children, make sure you introduce your child to teachers before school starts and keep in touch with the teachers. For older students, school officials can help you stay on top of academic progress and social contacts to make sure your child is staying on track.


