Assistant Principal's Corner

First, I would like to thank the entire Somers High School community for welcoming me into this new role with open arms. While I have been with Somers for many years, I feel very privileged to have the opportunity to get to know even more of our student body and families. Over the past few months, I have been working with faculty and students on the following initiatives:

Peer Tutoring Center

As a cooperative effort with the Counseling and Career Center (CCC) and the Library Media Center (LMC), a new Peer Tutoring program is in the works here at Somers High School. Classroom teachers were recently asked to identify exceptional students who are seeking leadership and service opportunities and interested students have met with Mrs. Grenier in the CCC to get involved. This will be a mutually beneficial program for both tutors and students seeking extra help. As a tutor, students have the opportunity to hone their content knowledge and to strengthen their communication and leadership skills, and students seeking assistance will gain reinforcement and new perspectives on content. We anticipate that this program will be rolled out later in the month of February. Tutor schedules will be posted on the CCC and Main Office windows, as well as in the Library Media Center, and on the Somers High School website. SHS English

Students from College English 10 and Honors English 10 showed tremendous growth on their second round of NWEA MAP testing in January. In the fall, sophomores averaged a 228 RIT, which was 8 points above the national norm. Eighty-one students scored above that national norm of 220 with 39 students finishing above the 80th percentile. This time, Somers sophomores raised their average to 232, but more importantly, 83 scored above the norm while a whopping 52 Spartans scored above the 80th percentile. This success can be attributed to the hard work students are putting in, rigorous curriculums, and a decision to include the test score as a portion of their English midterm grade. The Reading portion of the MAP test was given as the skills portion of sophomore English midterms. The improved commitment to do well on the test shows in the data.

On March 7th, 2019 the sophomore class is attending a play at the Hartford Stage called Detroit '67, which includes the following overarching themes from the students' *Raisin in the Sun* unit: familial strengths and conflicts, overcoming racial tensions, resilience, and economic ramifications of segregation.

The College Prep English 11 teachers have been working to prepare their classes to take the ELA portion of the upcoming SATs. Practice is integrated into the regular curriculum through the use of Khan Academy, College Board, and NewsELA interactive resources. Teachers are tracking student progress on SAT Reading practice tests to better inform them of how to best support students in their preparation for the spring session of the SAT.

It is bittersweet to say goodbye to our English 11 and Honors English 11 long-term substitute Ms. Catherine Gleason, but we are also excited to welcome back Mrs. Heather Connors. Ms. Gleason is moving on to teach English in South Korea, and Mrs. Connors has returned officially with her classes as of January 28th.

Mademoiselle MEYERS joined The World Language department at Somers High School at the end of October 2018. She has taught at Mabelle B Avery Middle School for the past three years and we welcome her at the high school.

One honor student says, "My favorite part of this class is the creative and fun visual techniques used for note-taking. 
We are happy to have Mademoiselle MEYERS at our school and as she would say: "'C'est chic!"

Both the boy's and girl's basketball teams have qualified for the NCCC and CIAC state tournaments, with the girl's NCCC playoffs starting the week of February 14th and the boy's playoffs starting the following week. The wrestling team has completed their regular season and will be competing in the NCCC Championships on February 9th at Granby High School followed by the Class S Championships scheduled for February 15-16th at Windham High School. Tri-Town hockey is currently in the top 10 in Division 3 and still has (4) remaining games left at Enfield Twin Rinks. In preparation for the Class S Championships, our (4) indoor track athletes just competed in the NCCC Championships with Kylie Raymond setting another meet record in winning the 3200 meters. Nurses Corner



Concussions

With the recent changes in weather and melting and re-freezing of snow, come increased chances for falls and head injuries. January has had the highest report of concussions here at SHS this far in the school year. A concussion is a type of brain injury that changes how the brain normally works. This happens when the brain jiggles and slams up against the skull. Usually there is some type of blow to the head, but a fall can also result in a concussion. Studies have shown that Adolescents ages 13-16 have more severe symptoms and a harder time dealing with the effects than adults. It is important to recognize a concussion when it first occurs to prevent further injury and so that the injured person can begin the only treatment for a concussion; which is REST. Signs to be on the lookout for are change in behavior, personality or memory. Often a persistent headache may the only symptom reported. Seek medical attention for your child if you suspect a concussion so we can create a medical plan informing teachers of

their need to rest the brain. They will need to limit screen time and avoid any strenuous activity. If the student is an athlete they will need to be retested with imPACT and will be slowly reintroduced to play once cleared. With proper rest and plenty of sleep complete recovery can be as soon as a few days up to a few weeks. With that said, please enjoy your winter activities while you still can! Healthy is Happy!
