A Message from the Principal, Mrs. Razza

I can't believe May is already here and the school year is quickly coming to an end! Smarter Balanced testing has begun for all grade 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students! In addition, all students will be given an End of the Year assessment in math. All students will be testing in reading as well. Please make sure your child comes to school every day! Below are some tips that can help your child do well on tests.

Help Your Child Do Well On the Test:

- 1. Make sure your child gets a good night sleep before every test.
- 2. Provide a light, healthy breakfast.
- 3. Have your child dress comfortably and arrive at school on time.
- 4. Send your child off to school with confidence-building words of praise and support: "You'll do great!" "Believe in yourself!" "I love you!"
- 5. Suggest that your child breathe deeply to relax before and during the test.
- 6. Remind your child to read directions carefully and look at all the answers before choosing one.
- 7. Tell your child to check his or her answers before submitting test.
- 8. Do not schedule trips, dental or medical appointments, or early pickups for testing days.

Attendance is still extremely important as we end the school year. All students that attend school each day during May and thru the last day of school on Wednesday, June 21st, will get a certificate for a free ice cream from Dippy's Ice Cream on Lakewood Road. As part of our attendance incentive, students may wear their favorite t-shirt on any 1:05pm dismissal day and also the day after Memorial Day!

Happy May! It's allergy and bug time of the year. Keep hydrated and covered as needed. Washing hands and hydrating helps with allergy prevention and control. They not only carry Lyme disease but other viruses as do mosquitoes too. Full arm and leg covering should be maintained if hiking or playing in or near woods. <u>Kindergarten - Ms. Bugryn and Mrs. Gutierrez</u>

We are in the home-stretch of the school year! We are excited for many upcoming learning experiences and events with the students. Throughout the month of May, we will be talking about and exploring butterfly and frog lifecycle through read-aloud and hands-on activities. We will be reading Eric Carle's *The Very Hungry Caterpillar* and at the end of May, the students in both Kindergarten classes will be presenting a little play based on the story. More info will follow! Students will also get to see how a caterpillar changes into a butterfly with a classroom project. Students will be learning about more ways to help keep our Earth clean and healthy. We will be going outside to plant flowers and vegetables in the school garden, and learn about the critters that live there. Students will also get to see how a

caterpillar changes into a butterfly with a classroom project.

At the end of May, we will have our field trip to Flanders Nature Center in Woodbury, CT. More information will be coming home. Our End of Year MClass testing begins in May so please make sure you child gets a good night's sleep and comes to school ready to learn each day. Keep reading and talking about books at home (retelling) and have your child practice his/her trick words. In math, we continue to explore addition and subtraction to 10, shapes, patterns, counting, and finding partner numbers. Thanks again for all your support.

Grade 1 - Ms. Jimenez-Montanez and Mrs. Russell

May is here! It is time for us to buckle down and finish up our wonderful learning in this last full month before June arrives and summer is here. We have been learning so much and we can't wait to share it with you. In Wilson's we are still working on learning about vowel-consonant-e pattern. We are marking up the words and learning how to spell the words correctly as we write complete sentences. We are also reading a lot of books and informational texts with this vowel pattern. In reading we are working on our author study unit. We have just learned about Kevin Henkes and how he has a lot of great lessons to learn through the mice characters in his stories. His mice act just like humans! Our next two authors are Ezra Jack Keats and Helen Lester. Please make sure that your child is reading for 15-20 minutes each night. Asking them questions about what they read will help to make them a better reader.

In math we are learning about adding and subtracting double digit numbers. We are using many different strategies to help them learn. In the classroom we use math rods, number lines, and hundreds charts. We encourage you to practice adding and subtracting numbers 1-20 as frequently as possible. If they are unable to add and subtract quickly, it will be difficult for them as they continue on into second grade. Using flash cards is a great tool for at home review! Field day is coming up in June and we have a lot of fun things for the end of the year, including our PBIS Carnival. Behavior plays a part in participation. We are continuously reminding our students to be Regan Role Models. Respect plays a part in our Regan pledge. We hope that you have noticed your child being respectful at home because we have been working on it so much at school. Thank you for all of your support and help!

Grade 2 - Mrs. DeFazio and Ms. Razz

During the month of May we will continue to work on poems and plays. Our students have started learning about different types of poems. They are learning more about the structure of poems. We will continue to learn about Acrostics, Limericks, Shape or Concrete, Haiku, and Sensory Poems. Your students will also be participating in reading plays within the classroom. They will take turns being certain parts and will learn about reading with inflection.

** We kindly ask that you send your child to school with dry erase markers.** Students work on white boards throughout the school day in ALL subject areas. Teachers have provided dry erase markers throughout the year, but we have been running out! We still have a lot of learning to do in these last couple of months and students need to be prepared.

In Math we are continuing our learning of addition and subtraction within 1000. We are currently using the partial sums and number line approaches. When subtracting we will only be using the number line approach. We will also begin adding and subtraction within 1000 using story problems. Fractions or partitioning will come later in the month along with arrays. Please remember that your child should be wearing a jacket to school daily, it is chilly still in the mornings. Also remember that if they are wearing a warmer layer inside the classroom it still has to be in dress code color, no hood and no designs. Please continue to read nightly since their goal is to read 87 words per minute, at a 2nd grade level. Check your child's folder nightly because important papers go home often.

Grade 3 - Mr. Mitchell and Mrs. Schmied

May in 3rd Grade! We are excited about poetry in ELA and Graphing in Math. This month both classes will be going on a field trip to learn about energy. This goes along with our science curriculum for the month. Notes from Mrs. Schmied: Please read out loud at home and make sure your child is reading a book every night. We are testing this month for the End Of the Year scores. We are also testing in Smarter Balance and I-Ready. Notes from Mr. Mitchell: Please work on you math facts, regrouping double digit and rounding numbers. With the warmer weather behavior tends to change. Please remind your students about following expectations and how much we need to learn before summer break.

Grade 4 - Ms. Cassella and Mr. Dombrowski

This month has been jam packed with activities for the students with parent conferences, PBIS incentive, and their culminating assessment. Parent conferences were a huge success with many parents attending in person or by phone. Also, the students who participated in the PBIS picnic were able to play 6 different games. Finally, they finished the unit for marking period three about theme by completing their final performance task of writing a letter to the author of a book of their choice and by decorating a soda bottle.

The class is continuing to work on producing high quality open responses following the "RACE to Answer Questions" steps and a rubric to score their answers has been implemented into the classroom. The students will use this scoring rubric to self-assess themselves and to target what needs to be included in their answer for full credit. For marking period four, the students will be learning about different types of folk literature (tall tales, myths, pourquoi tales, fairy tales, etc.) to determine the characteristics of each type. At the end of the unit for their culminating assessment they will have to pick their favorite type of folk literature to write their own original story. In Math, students have been introduced to angles. Students have used various strategies to determine if an angle is obtuse, acute, or right. In addition, using protractors has been a task we are tackling. Measuring and drawing angles will continue to be a pertinent part of this marking period. They will be able to analyze them and create different kinds of angles and they will be able to identify the different properties of these angles. Students have drawn models and created equations to show their mathematical thinking. Students have continued to use the IReady computer program and will continue to do so for the remainder if the school year. The final diagnostic test will take place this month. As the fourth marking period continues, we look to continue to work vigorously throughout the year into Spring Break and then down the home stretch.

Reminders: Homework: A reading comprehension worksheet is assigned each night Monday – Thursday. Also, occasionally there will be a word study assignment. Math homework will be handed out weekly going forward giving students the responsibility of choosing the best times that work for them to complete it.

Word Study: A weekly word study list and a spelling test at the end of each week, Also, it is important that students practice spelling their words each night even if there is no assigned word study homework.

Reading: It is important for students to be reading a minimum of 20 minutes at home each night to maintain their skills. Online Learning: Students who have access to a computer or electronic device at home is encouraged to use www.mobymax.com, lexiacorefive.com and Iready.com. Login information was sent home earlier this year but is still available upon request. Thank you for your continued support!

Grade 5 - Mrs. Betancourt and Mrs. Chasse

As we approach the end of the school year the children are working hard. We are currently working on historical fiction. In order to write a historical fiction piece the students are reading interviews of people who were children during World War II. In math the students are working on coordinate planes. Please look out for the homework packet as this time of year the students tend to forget to hand in their homework. Students should be reading every night at least 20 minutes and practicing their multiplication facts also. Report Cards just went out; if you did not receive it please contact the school.
