She acknowledged that her work and the work of her colleagues is provided to the district on a contractual-basis with First Student, and the District is not the direct employer. She indicated this is a hard time to ask for a raise; however, she believes the bus company can provide its employees with increased compensation.

	 Mrs. Whitacre gave a short update on Mr. Laase's condition since his recent surgery, and his progress toward returning to work. Mrs. Whitacre, Assistant Executive Director of Elementary Schools, provided the following elementary intervention data through October 30: Soar to Success: 30 sessions with 97 students participating, with 83% making progress; Do the Math: 27 sessions with 132 students participating, with 89% of students making progress; Lexia Reading software that supports the teaching and reading skills in both school and home: over 23,000 total logins have been reported in 24 elementary schools. Every school has used the program; there have been 850 total logins from home computers. Mrs. Whitacre will provide additional data next month. Mrs. Deb Bailey, Executive Director of Middle Schools, provided the following middle school intervention data and information: 223 students receiving support in Lit Plus with 81% showing progress, and 221 students receiving support in Math Plus with 90% showing progress; 109 students are using Lexia, with 82% showing progress. Mrs. Bailey is pleased with the increased ability to pin point the right students for the interventions. Mr. Larsen reported the high school intervention information, which included updates on Progress Monitoring, Nova Net Program usage, and the Read 180 Pilot Program at Palisade High School. Progress monitoring information was provided for each high school: Out of approximately 6,233 high school students, 1,272 are being monitored, which is 20.4%.

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	 Mr. Larsen reported that a major component of progress monitoring is to keep students on track to graduate. Updates will be provided quarterly. The Read 180 Pilot Program at Palisade High School is continuing this year for ninth-grade students. Data indicates students are making adequate progress. The Nova Net online-program usage continues to climb. The numbers have increased; 6,700 hours were reported for October. Mr. Larsen reported Nova Net is making a significant difference. Mrs. Rice asked how students are identified for progress monitoring, as the numbers differ from school to school. Mr. Larsen replied that each school has different needs; identification is accomplished through consistent filtering. H-2. Business/Investment Reports: Mrs. Callahan deVita Mrs. Callahan deVita provided the Board copies of the monthly Fuel Usage Report. She reported the year-to-year comparison of fuel consumption continues to drop during both September and October. Fuel prices remain below last year's levels. Continued work is being done to develop a more solid means of calculating miles per gallon for the district's fleet. Mr. Rowley asked about the possibility of using compressed natural gas. Mrs. Callahan deVita indicated this is a viable option which will need researched, to work through the details and to identify needed investments. Regarding the monthly business/investment reports, Mr. Rowley asked about the lower revenue. Mrs. Callahan deVita stated the revenue is what is expected at this time, due to the specific ownership tax continuing to lag behind last year's levels; this area will be watched closely. The Board thanked Mrs. Callahan deVita for her reports. H-3. Expulsion Report: Mr. Bill Larsen Mr. Larsen reported as of October 31, there had been 12 student expulsions, compared to 17 at the same time last year. STUDENT DISCIPLINE

Related: JK-R Adopted: November 17, 1987 Revised: August 18, 1998 Readopted: November 17, 2009

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The Board believes that effective student discipline is a prerequisite for sound educational practice and productive learning. The objectives of disciplining any student must be to help the student develop a positive attitude toward self-discipline and socially acceptable behavior.

All policies and procedures for handling general and major discipline problems for all students of the district shall be designed to achieve these broad objectives. Disorderly students also shall be dealt with in a manner which allows other students to learn in an atmosphere which is safe, conducive to the learning process and free from unnecessary disruptions.

The Board in accordance with state law has adopted a written student conduct and discipline code based upon the principle that every student is expected to follow accepted rules of conduct and to show respect for and to obey persons in authority. The code also emphasizes that certain behavior, especially behavior that disrupts the classroom, is unacceptable and may result in disciplinary action.

The Board shall consult with administrators, teachers, parents, students and other members of the community in the development of the conduct and discipline code.

All Board-adopted policies and Board-approved regulations containing the letters "JK" in the file name shall be considered as constituting the discipline section of the legally-required code.

The superintendent shall arrange to have the conduct and discipline code distributed once to each student in elementary, middle, and high school and once to each new student in the district. Copies shall be posted in each school of the district. In addition, any significant change in the code shall be distributed to each student and posted in each school.

Enforcement of discipline code

All discipline policies and procedures must conform with requirements of law. Discipline policies and procedures may include acts of reasonable and appropriate physical intervention or force in dealing with disruptive students which are not in conflict with the legal definition of child abuse. An act of a teacher or other employee shall not be considered child abuse if the act was performed in good faith and in compliance with Board policy and procedures.

A teacher or any other person acting in good faith and in compliance with the discipline code adopted by the Board shall be immune from criminal prosecution or civil liability unless the person is acting willfully or wantonly.

Disciplinary information

In accordance with state law, the principal or designee is required to communicate disciplinary information concerning any student enrolled in the school to any teacher who has direct contact with the student in the classroom and to any counselor who has direct contact with the student. The purpose of this requirement is to keep school personnel apprised of situations that could pose a risk to the safety and welfare of others.

For purposes of this policy, "disciplinary information" means confidential records maintained by or in possession of the principal or designee on an individual student which indicate the student has committed an overt and willful act which constitutes a violation of the district's code of student conduct and/or there is reasonable cause to believe, through information provided to the principal from another credible source, that the student could pose a threat to the health and safety of other students and school personnel based on prior misbehavior.

"Disciplinary information" is intended to include only that information of a serious nature that is not otherwise available to teachers and counselors as part of the education records maintained on students or other reports of disciplinary actions.

STUDENT DISCIPLINE

Related: JK-R Adopted: November 17, 1987 Revised: August 18, 1998 Readopted: November 17, 2009

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It is appropriate for instructional staff members to request disciplinary information from the principal or designee on students in their classrooms if there is concern that the student poses a threat to the safety of other students or school officials.

Any teacher or counselor to whom disciplinary information is reported shall maintain the confidentiality of the information and shall not communicate it to any other person. The principal or designee is required to inform the student and the student's parent or guardian when disciplinary information is communicated and to provide a copy of the disciplinary information. The student and/or the student's parents or guardian may challenge the accuracy of disciplinary information through the process outlined in Board policy and administrative regulations concerning challenges to the content of education records (JRA/JRC, JRA/JRC-R).

Discipline of Habitually Disruptive Students

A student who has been suspended three times during the course of the school year for causing a material and substantial disruption in the classroom, on school grounds, in school vehicles or at school activities because of behavior that was initiated, willful, and overt on the student's part may be declared to be "habitually disruptive." The student and the parent, guardian or legal custodian of the student shall have been notified in writing of each suspension counted toward declaring the student as habitually disruptive. Declaration as an habitually disruptive student shall be grounds for suspension or expulsion of a student.

The student shall be required to participate in an individual remedial discipline plan that shall address the child's disruptive behavior, his or her educational needs and the goal of keeping the child in school. No student shall be declared habitually disruptive prior to the development and implementation of a remedial discipline plan. The remedial discipline plan shall be developed after the first suspension for a material and substantial disruption and reviewed and, if appropriate, modified after the second suspension. The district shall encourage and solicit the full participation of the child's parent, guardian or legal custodian in the development of the remedial discipline plan.

Discipline of Special Education Students

Appropriate discipline for special education students shall be determined by the student's individual education plan (IEP). The director of pupil services shall be contacted prior to the use of any disciplinary measure which is not authorized by the student's IEP as additional procedural considerations are required in accordance with the district's responsibilities under state and federal law.

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The Board of Education determines that possession and/or use of a weapon by students on school property or at school activities is detrimental to the welfare and safety of the students and school personnel within the district.

Mandatory expulsion in accordance with state and federal law

Carrying, bringing, using or possessing a dangerous weapon in any school building, on school grounds, in any school vehicle, at any school-sponsored or district-sponsored activity or event, or off school property when the conduct has a reasonable connection to school or any district curricular or non-curricular event without the authorization of the school or the school district is prohibited. An exception to this policy may be made for students participating in an authorized extra curricular activity or team involving the use of firearms.

As used in this policy, "dangerous weapons" means:

- a. A firearm, whether loaded or unloaded;
- b. Any pellet or "beebee" gun or other device, whether operational or not, designed to propel projectiles by spring action or compressed air;
- c. A fixed blade knife with a blade that measures longer than three inches in length or a spring loaded knife or a pocket knife with a blade longer than three and one-half inches, or
- d. Any object, device, instrument, material, or substance, whether animate or inanimate, used or intended to be used to inflict death or serious bodily injury including, but not limited to a slingshot, bludgeon, brass knuckles or artificial knuckles of any kind.

The possession or use of any such weapon shall require that proceedings for the expulsion of the student involved shall immediately be initiated by the principal. In accordance with federal law, expulsion shall be for no less than one full calendar year for a student who is determined to have brought a firearm to school in violation of this policy. However, if a student discovers that he or she has inadvertently carried, brought or is in possession of a dangerous weapon and the student notifies a teacher, administrator or other authorized person in the school district, and as soon as possible delivers the dangerous weapon to that person, expulsion shall not be mandatory and such action shall be considered when determining appropriate disciplinary action, if any. The Superintendent may modify the length of this federal requirement for expulsion on a case-by-case basis.

Discretionary Discipline in Accordance with State Law

Carrying, using, actively displaying or threatening with the use of a firearm facsimile that could reasonably be mistaken for an actual firearm on district property, when being transported in vehicles dispatched by the district or one of its schools, during a school-sponsored or district-sponsored activity or event, and off school property when such conduct has a reasonable connection to school or any district curricular or non-curricular event without the authorization of the school or school district is prohibited. Students who violate this policy provision may be subject to disciplinary action including but not limited to suspension and/or expulsion.

A student may seek prior authorization from the building principal to carry, bring, use or possess a firearm facsimile that could reasonably be mistaken for an actual firearm on school property for purposes of a school-related or non-school related activity. A student's failure to obtain such prior authorization is a violation of this policy provision and may result in disciplinary action, including but not limited to suspension and/or expulsion. The principal's decision to deny or permit a student to carry, bring, use or possess a firearm facsimile that could reasonably be mistaken for an actual firearm on school property shall be final.

DANGEROUS WEAPONS IN THE SCHOOLS

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School administrators shall consider violations of this policy provision on a case-by-case basis to determine whether suspension, expulsion or any other disciplinary action is appropriate based upon the individual facts and circumstances involved.

NOTE: As a condition of receiving federal funds the district is required to expel for one calendar year students who bring firearms to school. The district is required to include a description of the circumstances surrounding these expulsions, the name of the school concerned, the number of students expelled and the type of weapons.

The language allowing the superintendent to modify the length of expulsion on a case-by-case basis is intended to permit the district to discipline students with disabilities and maintain eligibility for federal financial assistance. It is important to note that federal law requires that educational services must continue for students with disabilities who are properly expelled, although they may be provided in another setting.

GROUNDS FOR SUSPENSION/EXPULSION/DENIAL OF ADMISSION

Related: JKD/JKE, JKD/JKE-R Effective: November 16, 1993 Revised: August 3, 1998 Revised: August 6, 2002

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According to Colorado Revised Statutes 22-33-106(1)(a-f) and 3(e) and 22-12-105 (3), the following shall be grounds for suspension or expulsion from school:

- 1. Continued willful disobedience or open and persistent defiance of proper authority.
- Willful destruction or defacing of school property.
- 3. Behavior on or off school property which is detrimental to the welfare or safety of other pupils or of school personnel including behavior which creates a threat of physical harm to the child or other children.
- 4. Declaration as a habitually disruptive student
 - a. For purposes of this paragraph, "habitually disruptive student" means a child who has been suspended pursuant to paragraph (1), (2), (3), or (5) of this exhibit three times during the course of the school year for causing a material and substantial disruption in the classroom, on school grounds, in school vehicles or at school activities or events because of behavior that was initiated, willful and overt on the part of the child. Any student who is enrolled in a public school may be subject to being declared an habitually disruptive student.
 - b. The student and the parent, legal guardian, or legal custodian shall have been notified in writing of each suspension counted toward declaring the student as habitually disruptive, and the student and parent, legal guardian or legal custodian shall have been notified in writing and by telephone or other means at the home or the place of employment of the parent or legal guardian of the definition of "habitually disruptive student."
 - c. No child shall be declared to be a habitually disruptive student prior to the development of a remedial discipline plan for the child that shall address the child's disruptive behavior, his or her educational needs, and the goal of keeping the child in school. The remedial discipline plan shall be developed after the first suspension for a material and substantial disruption and reviewed and modified after the second suspension. The district shall encourage and solicit the full participation of the child's parent, guardian, or legal custodian in the development of the remedial discipline plan. (See Policy JK and Reg. JK-R).
- 5. Serious violations in a school building or in or on school property, except that **expulsion shall be mandatory for the following violations**: carrying, bringing, using or possessing a dangerous weapon without the authorization of the school or the school district, except that if a student discovers that he or she has inadvertently carried, brought or is in possession of a dangerous weapon and the student notifies a teacher, administrator or other authorized person in the school district, and as soon as possible delivers the dangerous weapon to that person, expulsion shall not be mandatory, the sale of a drug or controlled substance as defined in C.R.S. §12-22-303 or the commission of an act which if committed by an adult would be robbery pursuant to Part 3, Article 4, Title 18, C.R.S. or assault pursuant to Part 2, Article 3, Title 18, C.R.S. other than the commission of an act that would be third degree assault under C.R.S. 18-3-204 if committed by an adult.

As used in this section, "dangerous weapon" means:

- a. A firearm, whether loaded or unloaded;
- b. Any pellet or "beebee" gun or other device, whether operational or not, designed to propel projectiles by spring action or compressed air;

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- c. A fixed blade knife with a blade that measures longer than three inches in length or a spring loaded knife or a pocket knife with a blade longer than three and one-half inches, or
- d. Any object, device, instrument, material, or substance, whether animate or inanimate, used or intended to be used to inflict death or serious bodily injury, including but not limited to a slingshot, bludgeon, brass knuckles or artificial knuckles of any kind.
- 6. Repeated interference with a school's ability to provide educational opportunities to other students.
- 7. Carrying, using, actively displaying, or threatening with the use of a firearm facsimile that could reasonably be mistaken for an actual firearm in a school building or in or on school property.
- 8. Failure to comply with the provisions of Part 9, Article 4, Title 15, C.R.S. (immunization requirements). Any suspension, expulsion or denial of admission for such failure to comply shall not be recorded as a disciplinary action but may be recorded with the student's immunization record with an appropriate explanation.
- 9. Making a false accusation of criminal activity against a district employee to law enforcement or to the district.

According to C.R.S. Section 22-33-106 (2), subject to the district's responsibilities under Article 20 of that title (Exceptional Children's Education Act), and applicable federal law, the following shall be grounds for expulsion from or denial of admission to a public school or diversion to an appropriate alternate program:

- 1. Physical or mental disability such that the child cannot reasonably benefit from the programs available.
- 2. Physical or mental disability or disease causing the attendance of the child suffering therefrom to be inimical to the welfare of other students.

According to C.R.S. Section 22-33-106 (3), subject to the district's responsibilities under Article 20 of that title (Exceptional Children's Education Act), and applicable federal law, the following shall be additional grounds for denial of admission:

- 1. Graduation from the twelfth grade of any school or receipt of any document evidencing completion of the equivalent of a secondary curriculum.
- 2. Failure to meet the requirements of age, by a child who has reached the age of six at a time after the beginning of the school year, as fixed by the board of education, as provided in section 22-1-115, C.R.S.
- 3. Having been expelled from any school district during the preceding twelve months.
- 4. Not being a resident of the district, unless otherwise entitled to attend under the provisions of article 23, 32 or 36 of Title 22, C.R.S.
- 5. Failure to comply with the provisions of Part 9 of Article 4 of Title 25, C.R.S. Any denial of admission for such failure to comply shall not be recorded as a disciplinary action but may be recorded with the student's immunization record with an appropriate explanation.
- 6. Behavior in another school district during the preceding twelve months that is detrimental to the welfare or safety of other pupils or of school personnel.
