
We welcome new families to Carrington and strongly encourage them to join our PTO, volunteer, and have a voice reach out to Jean Creaven our parent liaison to get involved.

In ELA, we continue to learn to identify, form, and make the sounds of all the letters in the alphabet. We are also identifying story elements: characters, settings, and events of the story, predicting what will happen next, and creating a mental picture in our mind. We have begun to segment and blend sounds to make simple CVC (consonant, vowel, consonant) words.

In Math, we will continue connecting written numerals to quantities and classifying objects into categories by counting, using objects, pictures, and numerals. We also have begun comparing two numbers between 1-10 using concrete objects, pictorial representations, and abstract models.

We are finding shapes in everything around us, learning about insects, learning about handy tools that help us do a job, learning about following rules, and learning about our community.

Happy November, 2nd grade families! We can't believe we are already in November! By now, students should be familiar with daily routines, schedules, and expectations. Please check out Dojo to see how your child is doing throughout the day.

We have been learning A LOT in Grade 2! In Math, we are wrapping up using mental math strategies to add and subtract. We will begin to apply those strategies when solving problems requiring us to interpret data from graphs. We will even create our own graphs! In Fundations, we will learn a new syllable type, the closed syllable exception, and learn rules for adding suffixes to basewords. We are excited for Unit 2 in Reading! This unit allows us to build upon information learned from our latest unit in Science to dig deeper and get a better understanding of animals and habitats while focusing on characters, setting, and plot. In Writing we will explore the features of a How-To Text and work through the Writing Process to write our very own How-To Text!

We have used the data from the beginning of the year assessments to find an instructional focus for each student in Reading and Math. Students will continue to participate in small group instruction in Reading and begin to participate in small group instruction in Math. We are thrilled that students have done an excellent job with these small group routines thus far!

The weather is changing quickly, please make sure your child has a coat to go outdoors for recess. Also, if your child needs a sweater while in the building, it must be compliant with the District's Dress Code Policy. 3rd Grade

During the month of November third grade will begin our study of multiplication in numeracy. Students will learn about the commutative property of multiplication and that multiplication is repeated addition. They will be introduced to equal groups, arrays, and should understand that multiplication equations can be used to represent them.

In literacy, students will read stories that include themes of cooperation, immigration, and government. Students will learn that themes are the author's message, or lesson, in a story. Students will also learn about "how to", or "process" writing during the month of November.

During Fundations we will conclude Unit 2 and begin Unit 3. Unit 3 will review the "vowel consonant e" syllable type. They will learn to recognize and spell these syllable types in two syllable words that have both closed and "vowel consonant e" syllables.

Mrs. Ciccone's class will have a field trip to the Mattatuck Museum on November 10. Mr. Gagnon's class will also have the same field trip on November 11. Please be sure to send the permission slips back to school as soon as possible before the field trip date.

4th Grade

Here in Math class, we have been working very hard with our previous three lessons on Volume. We are tying everything together this month, and will be moving on to more challenging topics such as multiplying multi-digit numbers, dividing multi-digit numbers, and finally solving multiplication and division problems.

For Science, we have been exploring what matter is as well as what properties make up matter in Unit 2. Recently, we have been exploring more about physica properties, and I anticipate that we will be moving on to the next lesson of how matter changes very soon!

6th Grade Ms. Griffin and Mr. Carosella

Math: Students will fluently add, subtract and multiply decimals using standard algorithm strategies for each operation. In doing so, students will apply standard algorithm strategies to solve multi-digit problems for all operations. Also, students will represent ratios using tables, charts and diagrams. Using their understanding of ratios, students will solve real world mathematical problems. Please make sure students are completing daily Basic Skills and That Quiz activities for homework.

Science: Students will start Unit 2 Ecosystems. Students will begin the unit by identifying key components of an ecosystem. The focus then turns to biotic factors such as producers and decomposers. Students will research and focus on specific producers and decomposers to better understand the flow of energy in an ecosystem. Students will be challenged to identify the components necessary for a healthy ecosystem, as well as the factors that may place an ecosystem at risk.

Social Studies: Students will begin to explore the continent of Asia. Specifically, students will learn about the physical geography, history and life in East Asia.

Reading: Students will begin Unit 2 "Our Heroes" exploring a variety of informational texts that celebrate real-life heroes, with selections that include both ordinary and historical figures whose bravery, fearlessness, and strong will inspire others. Students will analyze in detail how a key individual, event, or idea introduced, illustrated and elaborated throughout text examples or anecdotes.

Language Arts: Students will continue to build grammatical strategies and skills with daily practice through Quill with a focus on effective use of adjectives and adverbs. Students will also learn how to develop an argumentative essay that includes a focus on the effective use of textual evidence to support their position and ideas.

7th & 8th Grade

In Social Studies, The 7th grade will study Geography as well as the history of the eastern portion of the United States.

The 8th grade will continue to learn about the 13 colonies and analyze the expansion of European power in North America. Students will focus on the Spanish, French, and English colonies in North America, leading into the French and Indian War as a precursor to the American Revolution.
