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I. Course Description:

Students analyze and create original works in the categories of prose, poetry, performance poetry, creative nonfiction, drama, comics, journalism, film, graphic design, and multimedia. Fee required.

II. Course Objectives:

- 1. Students will understand and practice the writing process from prewriting (stage one) through multiple experiments with language (stage two) to the refining and celebration of a completed writing product (stage three).
- 2. Students study existing works and create original works in a variety of genres.
- 3. Students will demonstrate an understanding of terminology and formatting requirements as it pertains to each genre.
- 4. Students will submit work to *The Eclectic* and *Patriot Pages* as well as to local, state, and national contests.
- 5. Students will keep a writer's notebook and compile a writing portfolio.

III. Classroom Expectations:
