Lesson 3

Performing Arts

All the words in this lesson may be associated with the performing arts.

- actress N. a girl or woman who acts on television, in movies, or on the stage (A girl who is good at pretending to be someone else could make a very good actress.)
- **amateur** N. of or by people doing something for pleasure and not for money (The singer was an *amateur* who loved to perform in her spare time.)
- **audition** V. to perform as a test (Ballet dancers must *audition* for the director before they are chosen to dance.)
- auditorium N. a large room with a stage and a place for an audience (In the packed auditorium, people waited eagerly for the play to begin.)
- **character** N. person in a play, movie, or book (The main *character* in the movie finally escaped from the burning building.)
- climax N. the most exciting part; the high point of the story (At the play's *climax*, the mad scientist destroyed his secret formula.)
- dramatist N. a writer of plays (A dramatist usually enjoys seeing his or her own plays performed on stage.)
- hilarious ADJ. very funny (The show was so hilarious that we laughed from start to finish.)
- Illusion N. a false notion (The magician created the *illusion* of a rabbit disappearing into a hat.)
- **impromptu** ADJ. done without prior thought or preparation (Picking topics at random, the drama teacher asked students to stand up and give *impromptu* speeches.)
- **improvise** V. to make up without preparation (Even when he didn't know a song, the jazz trumpeter could *improvise* as he played with the band.)
- mime V. to act without words (Using only gestures, the clown could *mime* the part of an angry policeman or a happy hunter.)
- **portray** V. to act the part in a movie or play (Sally was asked to *portray* a beautiful princess in the school play.)
- **professional** ADJ. receiving payment for skill or performance in sports, arts, or business (We hired a *professional* band to play at the dance.)
- **puppeteer** N. a person who performs with puppets (After many years of practice, the puppeteer learned to move her puppets with ease.)
- **rehearse** V. to practice for a performance (The director asked us to *rehearse* our parts at home before we met on stage.)
- **spectator** N. a person who watches (I would rather be a *spectator* in the audience than the concert performer.)
- **sponsor** N. a person or group who supports (The dancers needed a *sponsor* to pay for their shoes and costumes.)
- **villain** N. a wicked person (Laughing fiendishly, the *villain* tied the hero's girlfriend to the railroad tracks.)
- wings N. space to the right or left of the stage (The actors exit offstage through the wings when the scene ends.)
