A-G COLLEGE REQUIREMENTS:

- A. US History, World History 2 years required
- B. College Preparatory English 4 years required
- C. Mathematics 3 years required, 4 years recommended including Algebra, Geometry, Algebra II
- D. Laboratory Science 2 years required, 3 years recommended
- E. Languages other than English 2 years required, 3 years recommended
- F. Visual and Performing Arts 1 year required
- G. College Prep Electives -1 year required (*Note that there may be validations - see counselor for details)

In order for students to qualify for admissions to any campus in the University of California system, they must complete all of the preceding requirements with no grade lower than a C.

Please note that many of the school and district award programs are based on courses that would qualify on this list.




- Gather phone numbers of admissions offices of the schools you apply for

- Submit FAFSA Application for financial aid between January 1- March 2 at (www.fafsa.ed.gov)
- Ask Teachers to review essays for feedback
- Request letters of recommendation
- Produce "brag sheet" with accomplishments/community service/clubs and leadership opportunities listed
- Send a "Thank You" note to all that have helped you

Senior Checklist for College:

Fall	(September-November)
	Start your senior year by finalizing your <u>college list</u> .
	Now that you have an idea of where you want to go, <u>visit prospective colleges</u> and get a feel for the campuses.
	Consider options for <u>early action</u> and your recommendation letters.
	Register for required tests, it's your last chance to take the <u>SAT, ACT, or SAT subject tests!</u>
	Fill out and complete your college applications before the deadlines arrive.
	Check with your <u>guidance counselor</u> to ensure all your colleges get what they need.
	_Start working on your <u>college application essay</u> , it's a crucial part of your application.
	Explore your prospective schools' <u>financial aid requirements</u> to plan your college budget.

	Schedule your college interviews to finish up the admissions process.
	Complete your FAFSA so you can get the most possible financial assistance for college.
