

READY KEIKI: The Promise of Universal Access to Pre-K





Why is preschool important?

- Ensure that our keiki are ready for success when starting Kindergarten
- Create economic stability for families who need a safe place for their keiki while they go to work



Act 46 (2020)

Established goal to provide all keiki ages 3 and 4 with access to Pre-K enrollment by **2032**

Act 257 (2022)

Appropriated **\$200 million** to expand access to Pre-K by:

- Building new school facilities
- Renovating existing facilities to increase preschool capacity



Hawai'i Population of Underserved Pre-Kindergarten Keiki



35,272 total 3 & 4-year-olds
18,921 served by existing Pre-K classrooms
Licensed Pre-K Providers: 17,978 seats Public Pre-K & Charters: 943 seats
7,054 20% are estimated to opt-out of Pre-K


- First-Year Goal: Renovate & refurbish over 50 classrooms on elementary schools to new Pre-K classrooms
- Expand public preschool to serve 3-year-olds







- Expand Pre-K programs at existing Charter Schools
- Create application for new Pre-K Charter Schools







Preschool Open Doors Program

- State child care payments for low-income families for 4-year-olds to attend licensed preschools
- Increase child care rates from \$919 for accredited preschools & \$740 for nonaccredited to \$1,200+
- Expand to serve 3-year-olds
- Leverage TANF funding for child care



Workforce Pipeline

- Build Pre-K teaching classrooms on all state Universities and Community College campuses
- Build Pre-K classrooms on High School campuses, where students can earn Dual Credits toward a teaching degree
- Establish a Hawaiian Language Immersion Pre-K teaching pathway
- Create University of Hawai'i BA degree targeted toward Pre-K to 3rd Grade
- Implement the Early Childhood Educator Tuition Stipend Program



Partnerships

- Build preschool classrooms at state libraries and housing developments
- Purchase land to build new preschools near areas where parents work
- Partner with counties to identify opportunities
- Partner with businesses & nonprofits to support onsite early learning settings and afterschool care
