# **Property Crimes**



#### Arson

- Willful malicious burning
- W/ intent to defraud is a separate charge



#### Vandalism



- AKA malicious mischief
- Willful damage or destruction of another's property
- Felony or misdemeanor

## Theft (larceny)

- Taking and carrying away property of another
- W/o consent of owner
- Specific intent: to deprive owner



## Shoplifting

- A form of larceny
- Taking items without paying or intending to pay for them
- Attempted shoplifting = concealment


## Grand Theft (487 P.C.)

 Money, labor or real or personal property more than \$400



#### **Grand Theft**

- If the following exceeds \$100
  - Farm animals
  - Vegetables
  - Fruits
  - Nuts
  - Farm crops
  - Aquacultural products (fish, shellfish)



#### **Grand Theft**

- Any firearm
- Any automobile





# Theft by false pretense (embezzlement)

- Specific intent to defraud
- Actual fraud committed
- False pretenses used
- Must cause owner to part w/ property or \$

## Petty Theft

- All others not classified as grand theft
- Misdemeanor
- Specific intent



#### Extortion



- AKA blackmail
- Using threats to obtain the property of another

## Robbery



- Unlawful taking of property
- From a person's immediate possession
- Force or intimidation (pickpockets?)
- Both a crime against property and person

## Burglary (459 P.C.)

Enter

 W/ intent to commit grand or petty theft



## Burglary

- Does not have to be forcible entry
- May be an authorized entry as into a store open for business
- Body of person does not have to physically enter building

## **Building:**

- Structure w/ walls & a roof
- Includes telephone booths and showcases
- Carport w/ roof & 2 walls if attached to house

## Burglary from vehicles

- Vehicle must be locked and windows up
- Entering locked trunk of unlocked vehicle is burglary





## Forgery

- Making or altering a writing or document w/ intent to defraud
- Signing another's name to a check
- Uttering: offering as real a document known to be fake (as a check)

## Receiving stolen property

- Receive or buy property that one knows or have reason to know property is stolen
- Knowledge may be implied by circumstances
- Felony or misdemeanor
