Why are semicolons and colons important?

Like other punctuation marks, semicolons and colons are important because they help make writing clear. •



The semicolon signals a pause in a sentence. •



The colon tells the reader "get ready for what's next."











Why are semicolons and colons important?

The letter below is hard to read because it is missing semicolons and colons. •

Dear Garden Club Members: It's that time of year again; our vegetable garden awaits. Please show up at the site this Saturday morning at 7:30. If you can, bring the following: hoe, shovel, weedpuller, and gloves.



Notice how much clearer the letter is when semicolons and colons are added. •









Use a semicolon between independent clauses if the independent clauses

- are closely related in meaning and
- are not joined by and, but, for, nor, or, so, or yet -

Independent clause

Independent clause

The clouds are moving in; let's head home.











Remember: Use a semicolon to join independent clauses only if the clauses are closely related. •

Incorrect

Do not touch that tree frog; everyone stay together.

These two clauses aren't closely related.





Do not touch that tree frog; it may be poisonous.

These two clauses are closely related. A semicolon can be used to join them.

Use a semicolon between independent clauses joined by a conjunctive adverb or a transitional expression.

Kim loaded the camera incorrectly; therefore, the film was ruined.

I like cotton; in fact, most of my clothes are made of cotton.

Notice that the conjunctive adverb and the transitional expression are followed by commas.

Do not place a colon right after a preposition. -

Preposition

Last fall we traveled **through**: New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine.

Correct

Last fall we traveled through New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine.

Correct

Last fall we traveled through the following states: New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine.




