# **Teacher News**

Extra, Extra, Read All About It!!

### Mrs. Erickson - Kindergarten

The 2008-2009 Kindergarten class is off and running. There are 5 students this year- 2 girls and 3 boys. We are all becoming friends and learning to listen, help, and respect one another. This year Kindergarten has 15 min of P.E. daily. Everyone is very excited about P.E.

Our reading readiness program which involves Jolly Phonics is going strong. We have already covered 9 letters/sounds/motions. There is a bit of homework each night. We work on words that begin with our new sound and practicing the correct way to write the letter. There is also a lot of rhyming going on in our room. The class also has rhyming homework that involves a nursery rhyme. Everyone is being very responsible about bringing back their homework.

Math has the class totally involved with all of the mechanics of the calendar. There is lots of counting, patterning, odd/even, place value, money, weather watching and recoding, and basic addition. We are also working with unifix cubes, pattern blocks, and mirrors. We will be adding listening story problems involving food very soon.

Science has us mixing colors and now we will begin working on the five senses. We will doing several experiments as we weave our way through the senses. We will be wearing scientific attire when we complete an experiment!!

Me, myself, and I - that's what we have been talking about for Social Studies. We have been working on a "me" book involving families, homes, favorite foods, etc. Now, we will be working on Johnny Appleseed and how important he was to our country. There will be many activities involving apples, measuring apples, graphing apples, and cooking with apples.

Our field trip to the Threshermen's Reunion was awesome. We saw Mr. Davis shearing sheep. We decided that we wouldn't want to get a haircut like that!! The sawmill was operating – it's lot different than going to Menard's for lumber. We visited the one-room school house - pretty tiny by today's standards. The steam engine train ride was definitely a favorite. We even got to see Abraham Lincoln!! Thanks to Mr. Embley for accompanying our class as a chaperone.

First and second graders are working really hard on adjusting to new rules and routines this year. We are having lots of fun developing our love of school and learning. In the upcoming month, we have lots of exciting work planned.

A big chunk of our time during the day is donated to reading. Both grades will be working a lot with learning the sounds for all the letters and letter combinations. Furthermore, we are learning and reviewing strategies good readers use to decode words.

In math, we are focusing on addition and subtraction in first grade. The second graders will be reviewing place value to prepare us for two digit addition. Our class will be using a daily program called "Rocket Math" to help us memorize all those math facts.

We will be beginning this month with a science unit on habitats. We are going to discuss five different types of habitats: forest, wetland, ocean, desert, and artic. We will learn some of the different plants and animals that inhabit these areas. Furthermore, we will discuss some adaptations the plants and animals have made to live in a certain area.

Our class will be continuing to use guided reading in the classroom. Guided reading is important because it places readers in their exact level. With this, students will get a one-on-one opportunity to read with me. I will be sending books home everyday in their "book buddy" bag. The books will be changed on Tuesday and Friday of each week. Please take time to have your child read these books to you. Reading and rereading text is the best way to build great fluency in a reader. So reread those books at school and at home.

Finally, don't forget to check the school website! We love to update it with new pictures of what is happening in our classroom, as well, as other helpful information.

### Ms. Rients – 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup>

Welcome back to another great school year! The students are already working hard and back into the swing of things after just a couple weeks of school. They are a fun group, and I look forward to getting to know them this year.

In reading we are working on sequencing, drawing conclusions, author's purpose, and cause and effect. Please have your child read at least 15 minutes a night, along with read their A-Z book three times a week. This may seem like a lot of reading, but as with everything, practice makes fluent readers.

In language arts, we are reviewing what makes a complete sentence. Also we are picking out the subject and predicate of the sentence. In writing, we are starting our Flat Stanley project. During our read aloud, I read *Flat Stanley* to the students. Have your child give you details about the story. We are going to write a class letter to send out with our own Flat Stanleys. Watch for more details on this to come.

3rd graders in math are reviewing addition and subtraction. They are also studying place value through the hundred thousands place. This includes writing numbers in standard, expanded, and word form. The next chapter will be about comparing, ordering, and rounding numbers. 4th graders are working on place value through the hundred millions place. They are also writing numbers in standard, expanded, and word form. Next they will also be comparing and ordering numbers. Both grades are also practicing their Rocket Math to memorize their math facts.

In science we have been studying natural resources. We've discussed renewable and nonrenewable resources, conservation, recycling, and solar energy. We've done a few experiments by making recycled paper, seeing how different colors absorb heat, and done a recycling challenge. Social Studies will be starting shortly, and we will start by learning how to read maps. This will include a map project where students will be making maps using their handprints. Then we will do an overview of our country's land, government, and culture before starting our trip around the regions of the United States.

It is important that all students get their assignment book signed each night by a parent. This counts as a participation grade, and it allows parents to see what the student is responsible for completing during the day. Also, as a reminder, I am using SnapGrades again this year, so I encourage you to check on your student's progress throughout each quarter.

### Mrs. Hott $-5^{th} - 8^{th}$

Welcome back to another great year at Graymont!! We especially welcome our new student – Travis Schopp as well as our 5th graders who have moved up to join us.

Hopefully you all had a fun and relaxing summer and are ready for all the fall activities. Please see the school website for much information about what we will be studying this year, links to our textbooks online as well as homework assignments. Here's what we have done so far this year:

5/6 Social Studies - We are beginning our study with the Neolithic Era – check out the link to a real archeological site for a city we are studying – Catal Huyuk. We also have welcomed Mr. Bear to our classroom. He will be joining us in our studies and the students will be dressing him in outfits in line with what we study.


5-6 Science - We are starting a study of Earth's structure including tectonic plates, volcanoes and earthquakes. Students have participated in making an edible model of the Earth's structure as well as making a substance to show how the inside of the Earth can be both a liquid and a solid.

7-8 Science - We are beginning with a study of animals – some that we are familiar with and some that we may not have been aware of. We had an interesting lab called Wet, Wiggly Worms where we observed earthworms under various conditions. Thanks to the kindergarten students for helping put our worms in the flowerbed when we were finished with them. We just completed the first chapter on Animal Behavior and are moving on to Invertebrates.

Math – The order of chapters for each of the grade levels is posted on the school website. We will try to make sure we cover the topics we are weakest in as well as any we may not have been able to spend a lot of time on the previous year. Parents of 5th graders – ask them about reading the binary clock we have in our room!



### Ms. Wilson $-5^{th} - 8^{th}$



5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>th</sup> Reading: We have started Unit 1: Relating to Others and Discovering ourselves. We will be focusing on the reading elements: author's viewpoint, cause and effect, generalizing, character, and sequencing. Their selection test that goes along with ever story will be every Thursday morning. The students will have a spelling pre-test every Monday morning with opportunities to practice their words throughout the week. Their spelling test will be every Friday morning.

7<sup>th</sup>/8<sup>th</sup> Reading: We have jumped right into our books and started our focus on Science Fiction and Fantasy literary genres. In adďition we alsó focus on a story's theme and the author's purpose for writing a selection. The students will have vocabulary words to learn and will be faced with thinking critically when answering questions from each story. Please check with your students periodically during the first month or two of school to ensure they are working well with the reading material. In addition to our reading textbooks, from time to time we will focus our attention on reading novels. This reading should be a nice change for the students.

5th-8th – Language Arts: We are working on the four different types of sentences, subjects/predicates, conjunctions, run-on sentences, compound sentences, and complex sentences. Within the next week we will switch gears and focus our attention on nouns: common/proper, singular/plural, and possessive.

7<sup>th/8th</sup> Social Studies: We have started Unit 1in our World Cultures and Geography book. This year we will be focusing on the United States and Canada, Latin America, Southern Asia, Europé, Russia, North/South America, etc. There will be many opportunities for students to work together in class and perform hands on activities.

Accelerated Reader: Each student has been given an individual guarter AR goal. If a students reaches their quarterly AR goal they will receive a 100% in the grade book towards their reading grade. If a student does not reach their quarterly AR goal they will receive a ZERO in the grade book toward their reading grade. Students must reach all four quarterly goals in order to attend the pizza/bowling party at the end of the school year.



### Ms. Ores - 5th-8th Health

Our first year of 5th-8th grade health has started off with the students understanding their own health and wellness. The students have been working very hard to prepare for the first tests. 7th and 8th graders have looked at good and bad health influences. We have taken the time to look at influences in the media and tell about the positive and negative effects of those issues. The 5th and 6th graders have been talking about making healthy decisions. They too have looked at influences in the media to help them realize what good decisions to make. 7th and 8th graders will be taking their first test on August 29th and the 5th and 6th graders will have their first test on Monday, September 8th. I hope all of you received the parent letter that I sent home with your child. I will send these letters out for every new chapter that we begin to keep you informed about what your child is learning. 7th and 8th grade parents should be expecting a second letter very soon.

Our first year of kindergarten PE has been full of loco-motor movements. The students are learning different ways to move. They have started to learn how to slide, gallop, skip, hop, and jump. We have also included some of our own silly ways to move. The students are also beginning to play tag games. It's wonderful that the kindergarteners get to take some time to get up and move.

All of the students at Graymont started their first week of school participating in cooperative activities in PE. They had to start working together and encouraging each other right off the bat. 1st-4th and 5th-8th started different activities the second week of school. 1st-4th started with throwing Frisbees and got to play Frisbee golf. The 5th-8th graders had the chance to try golfing with the help of Pontiac High School's golf equipment. This is a great chance for the students to find a new activity that they may have never experienced before.
