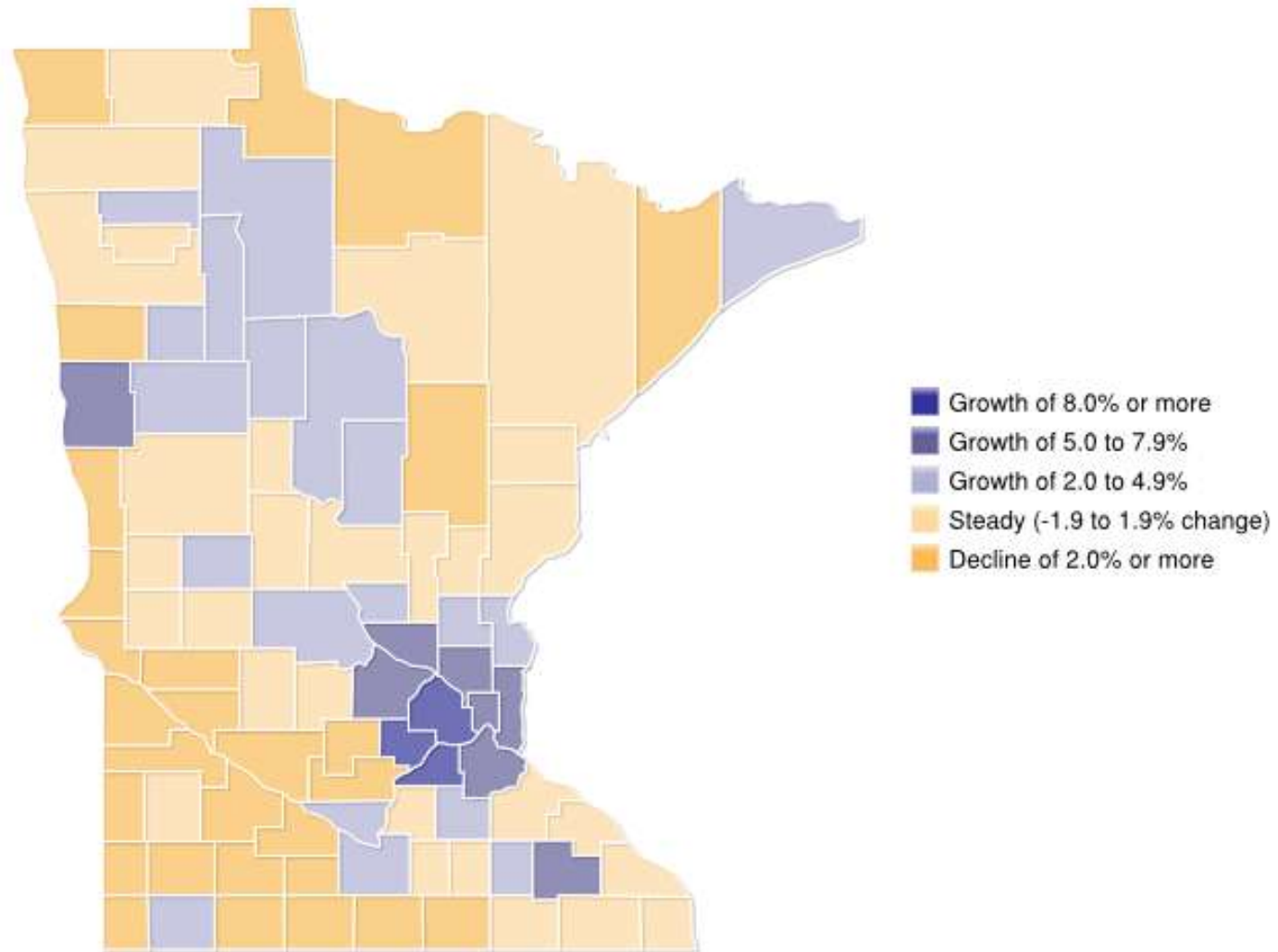

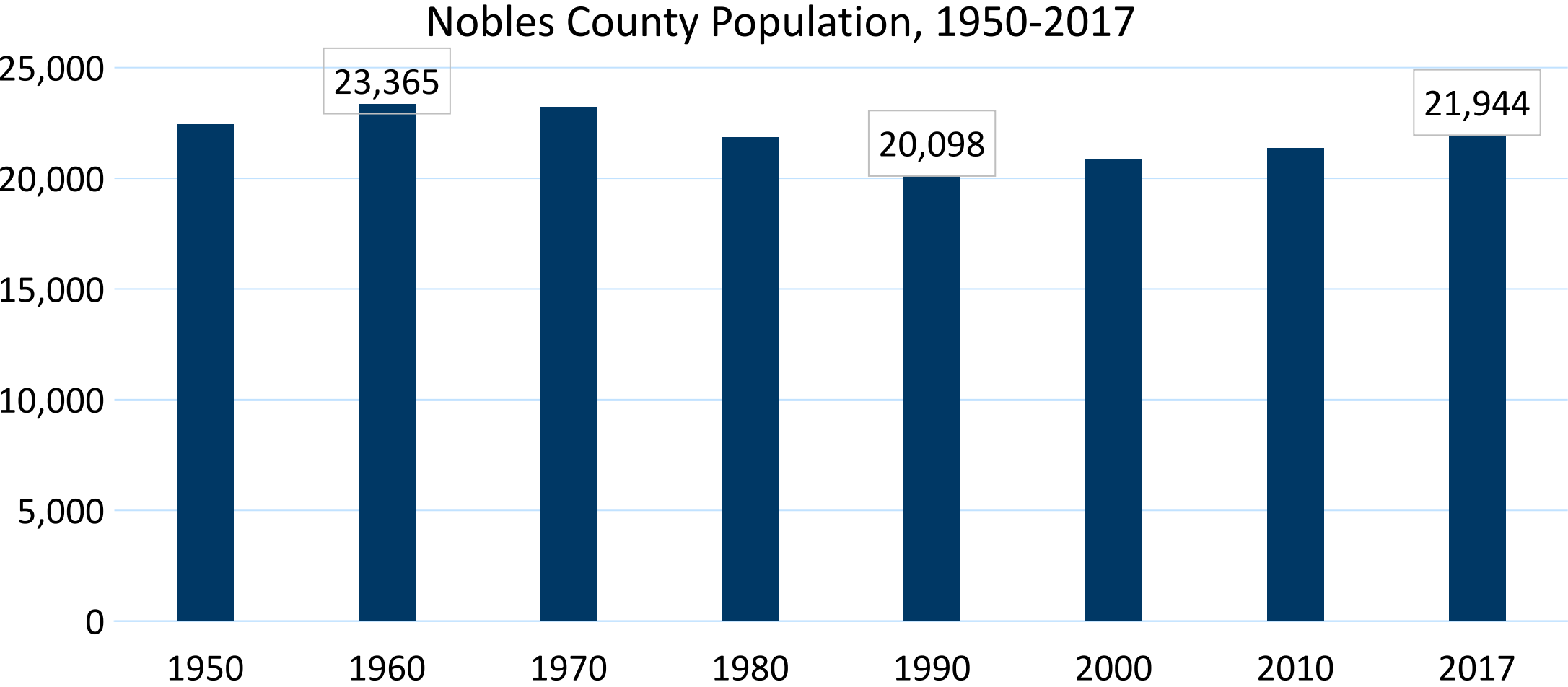

By county, 2010-2017



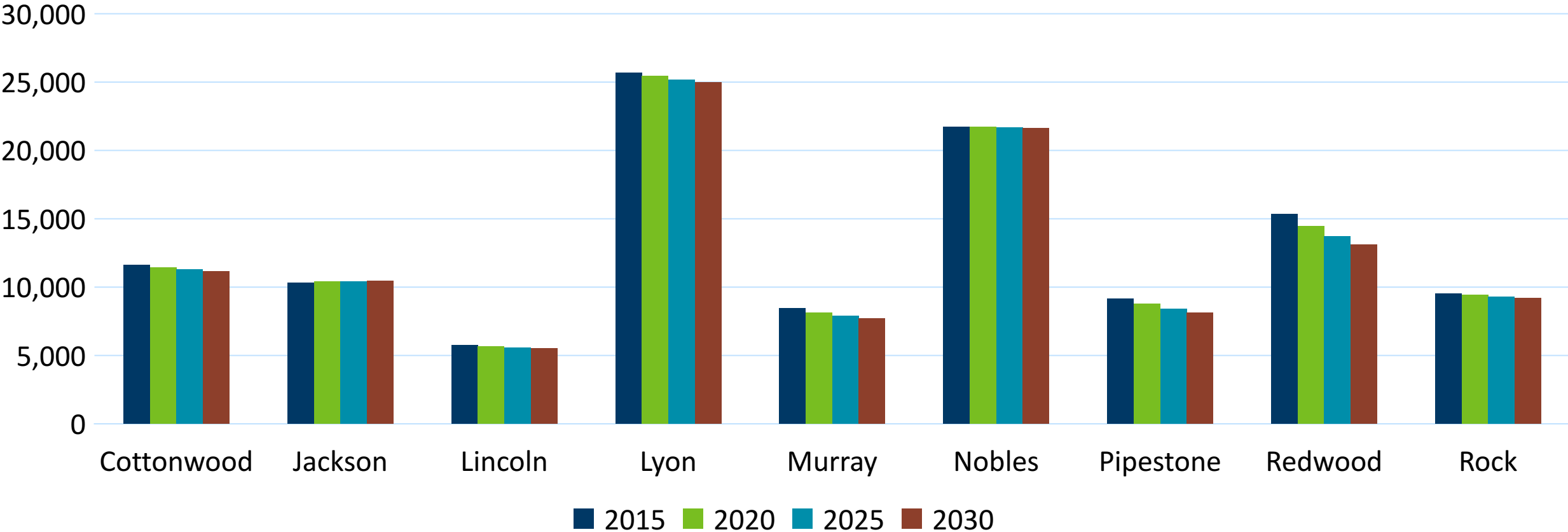
Nobles County has grown by ~1,100 people in the last 17 years

SW Minnesota Counties



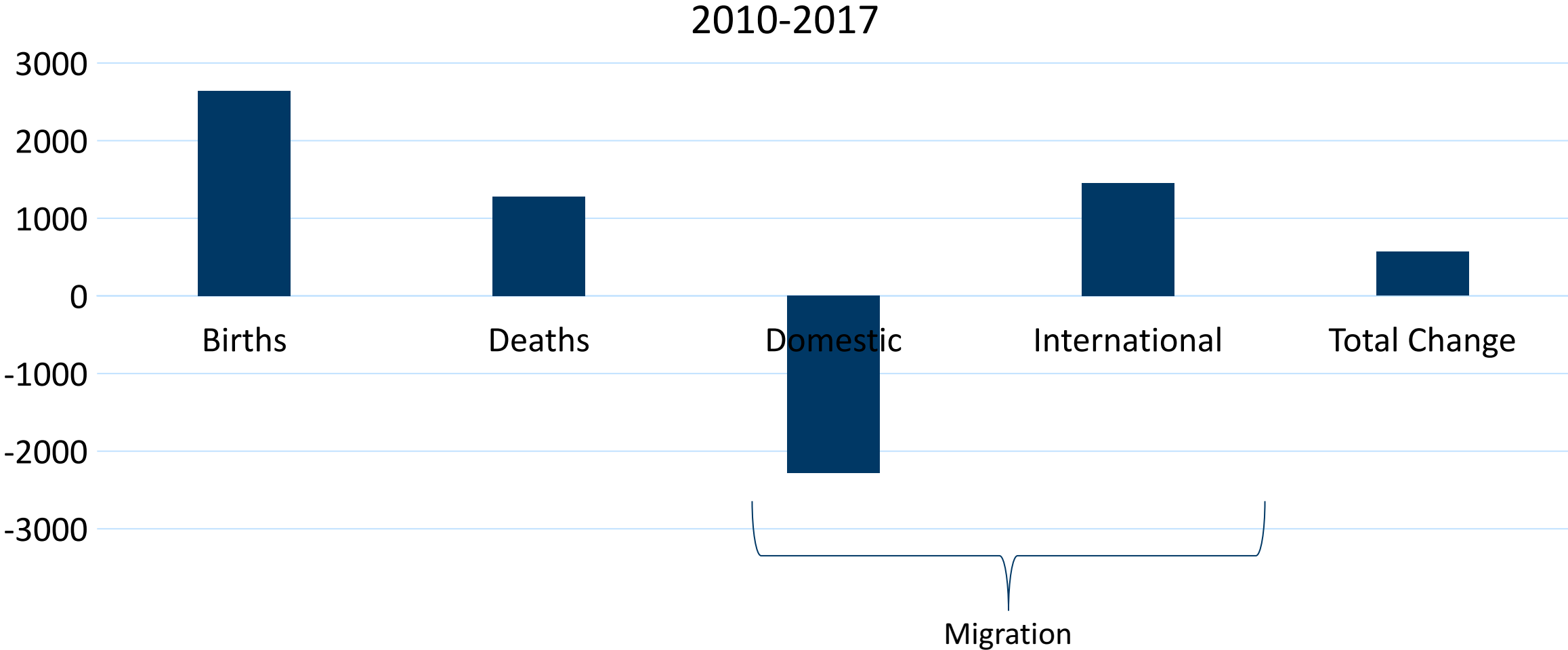

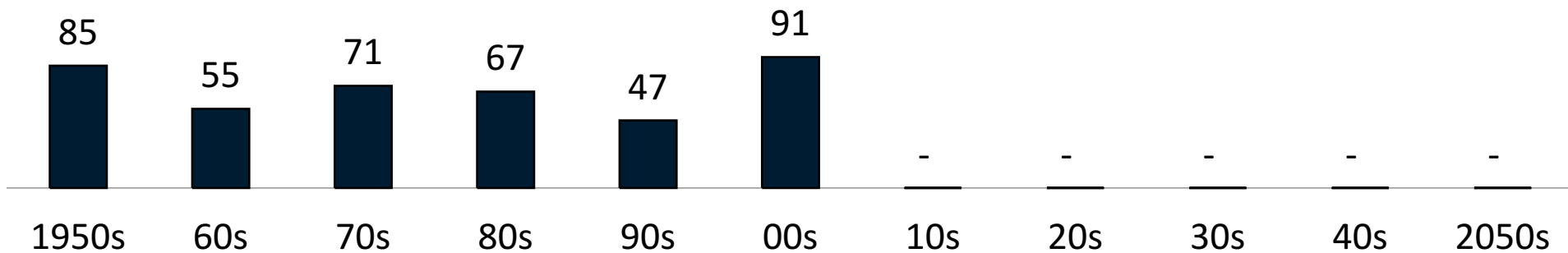

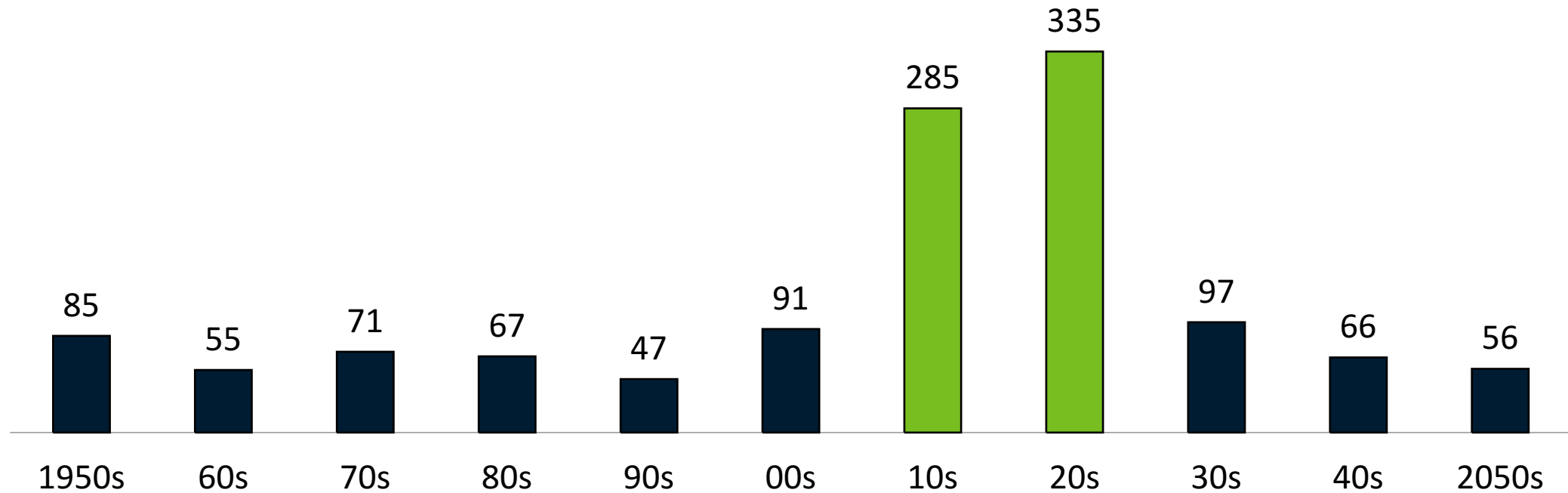
Change in older adults, age 65+ (in thousands)

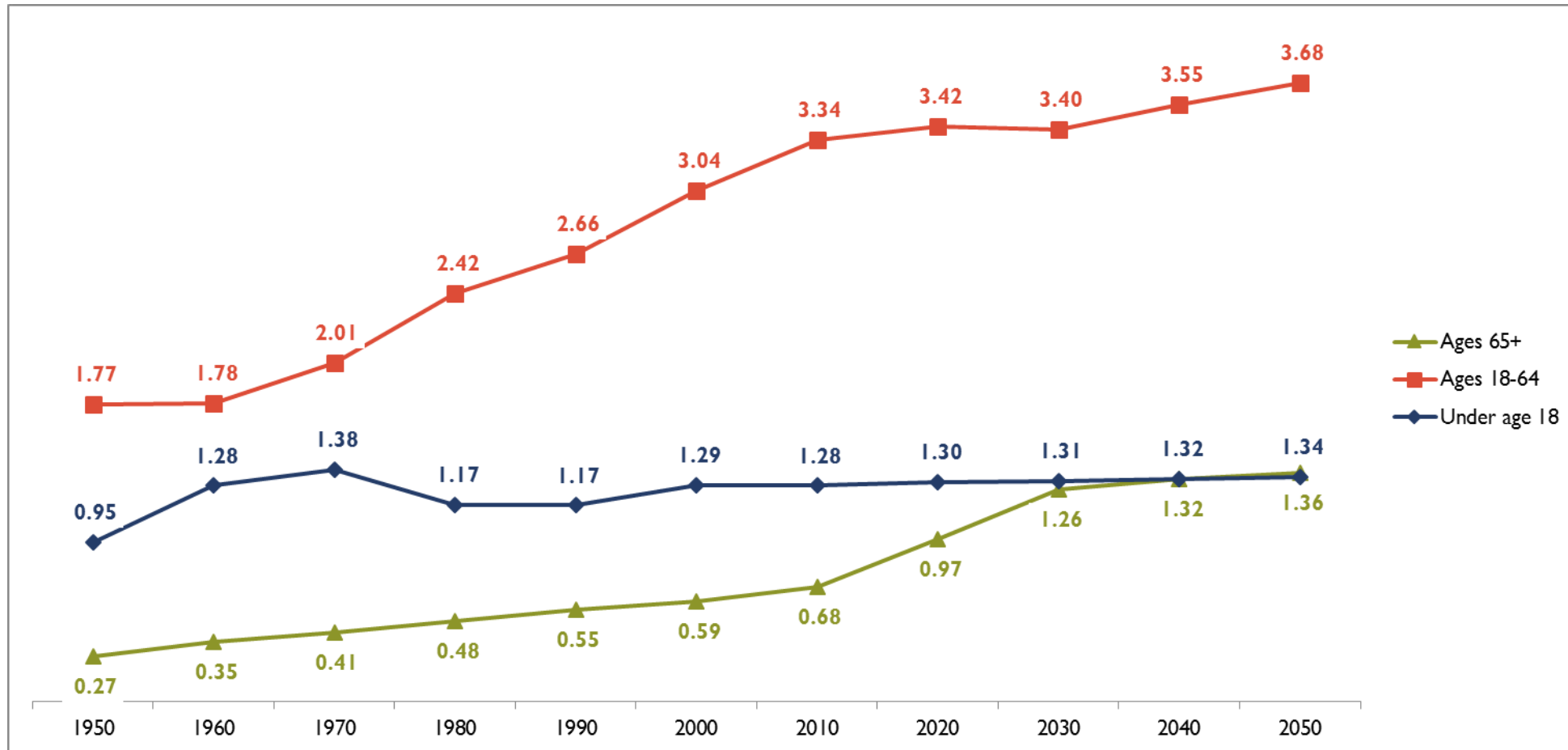
Unprecedented increases in MN's “older adult” population

Change in older adults, age 65+ (in thousands)

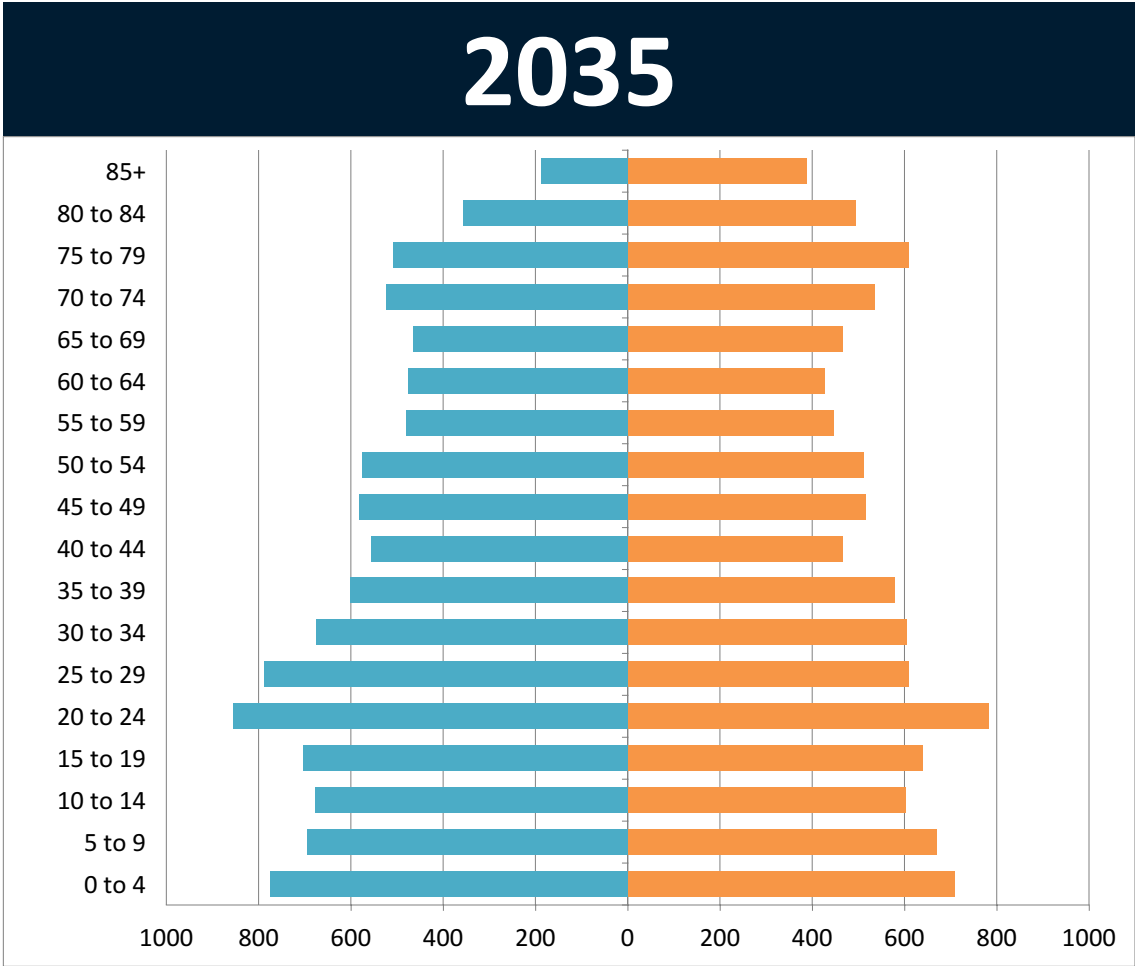
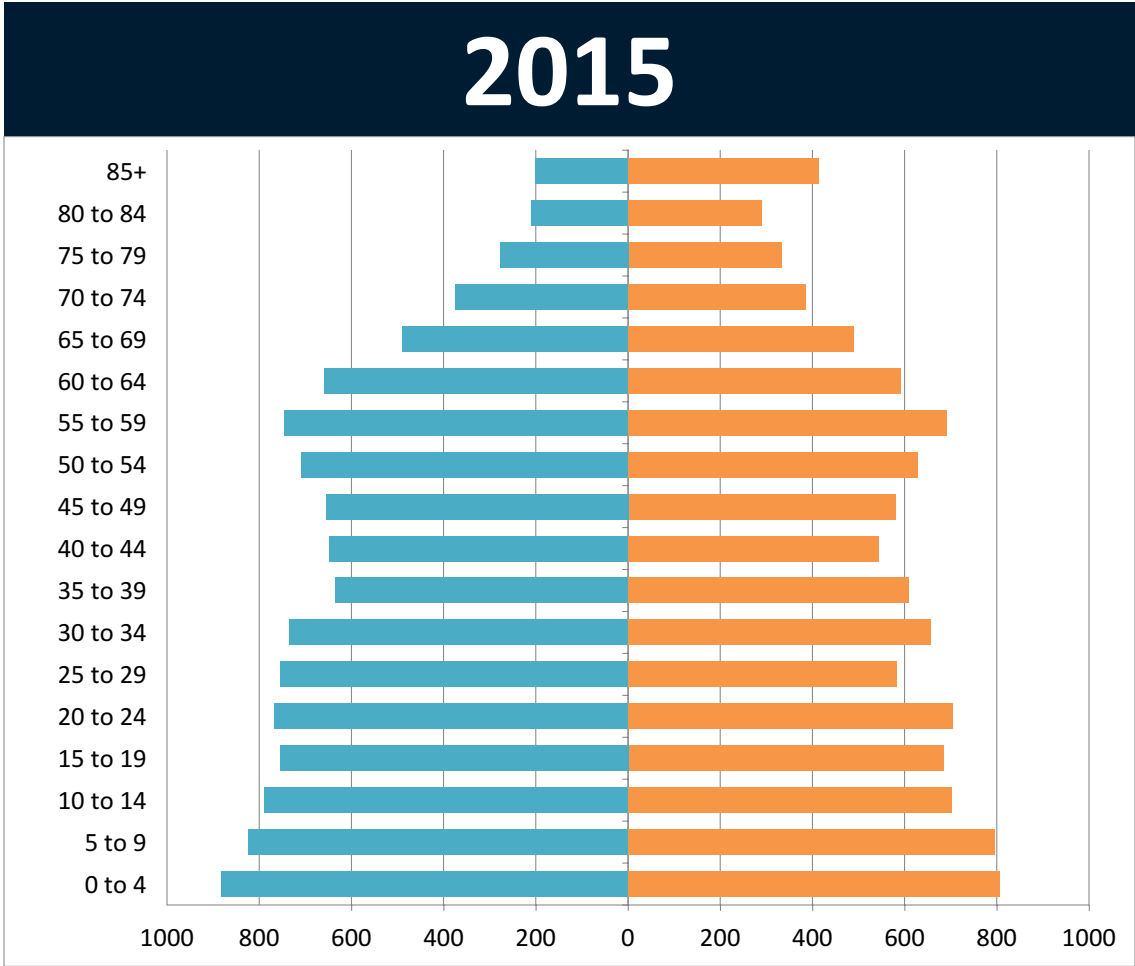

Little-to -no growth in working-age population in MN over the next 15 years

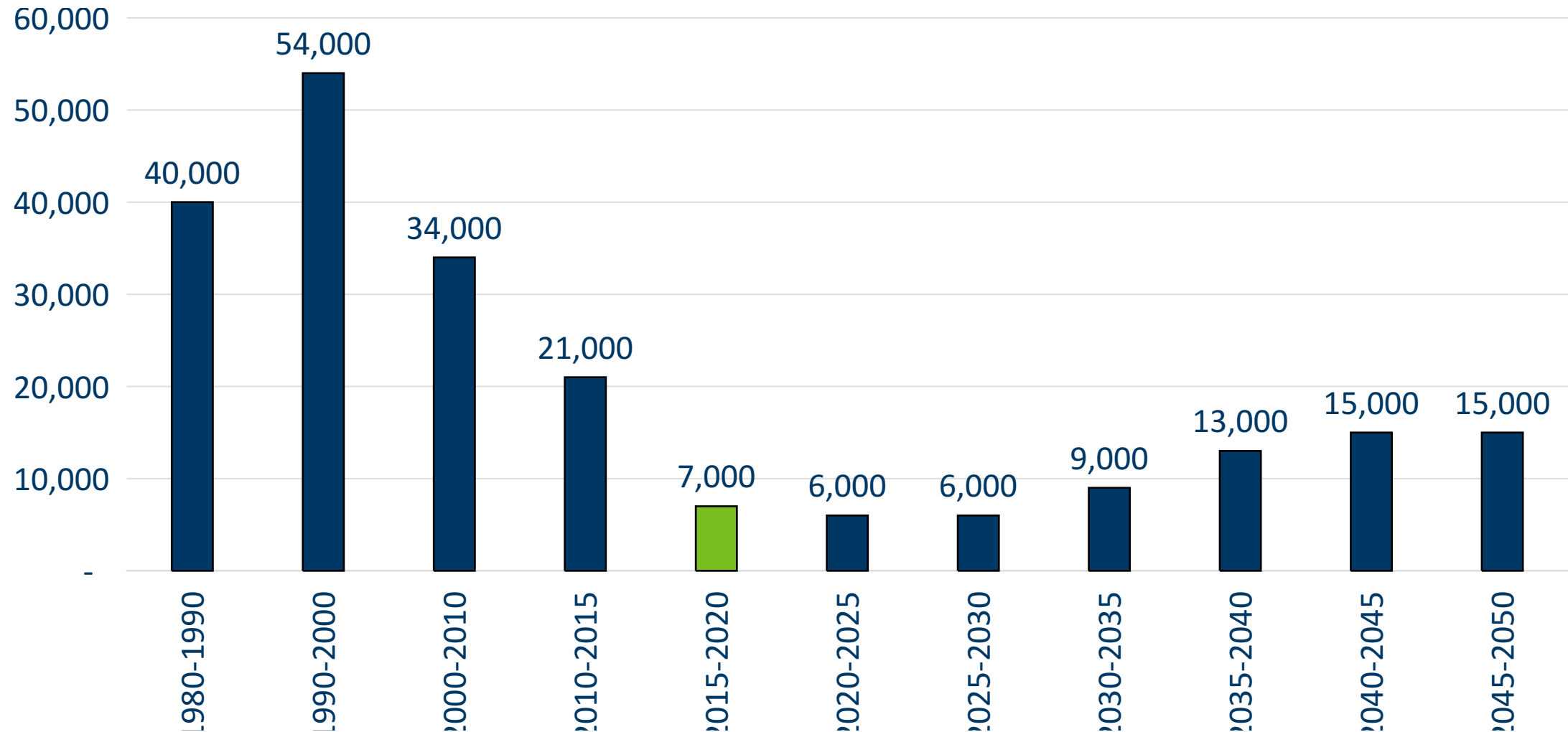


Nobles County in 20 years

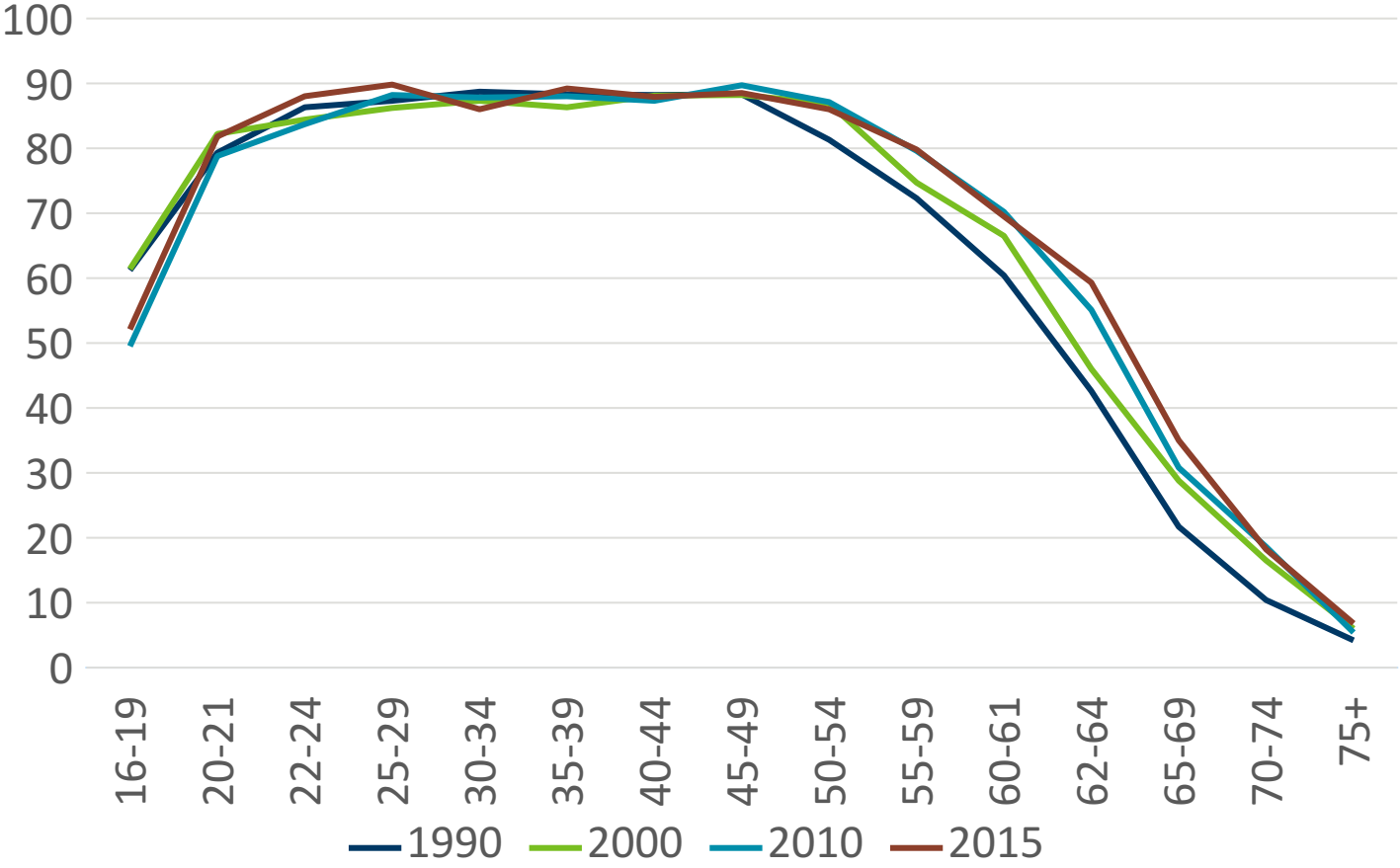
Minnesota's labor force growth is projected to slow further over the next 10 years

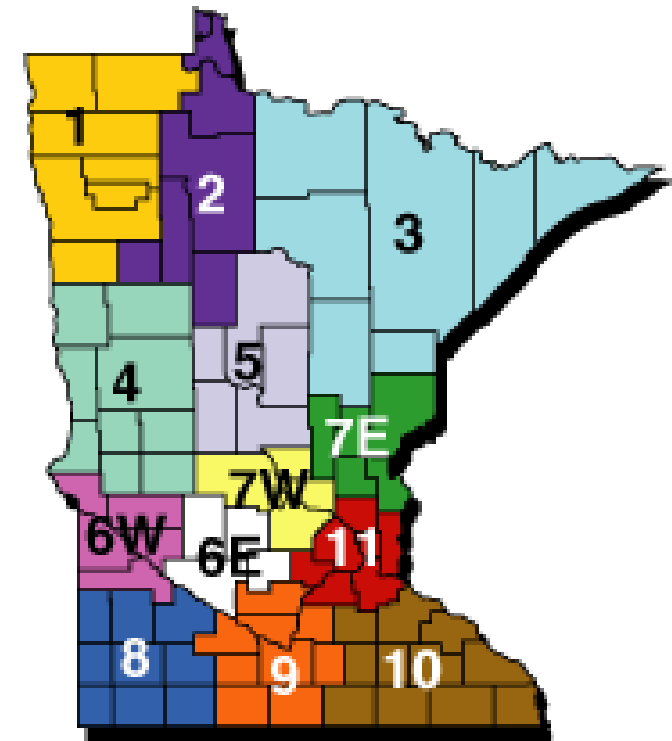
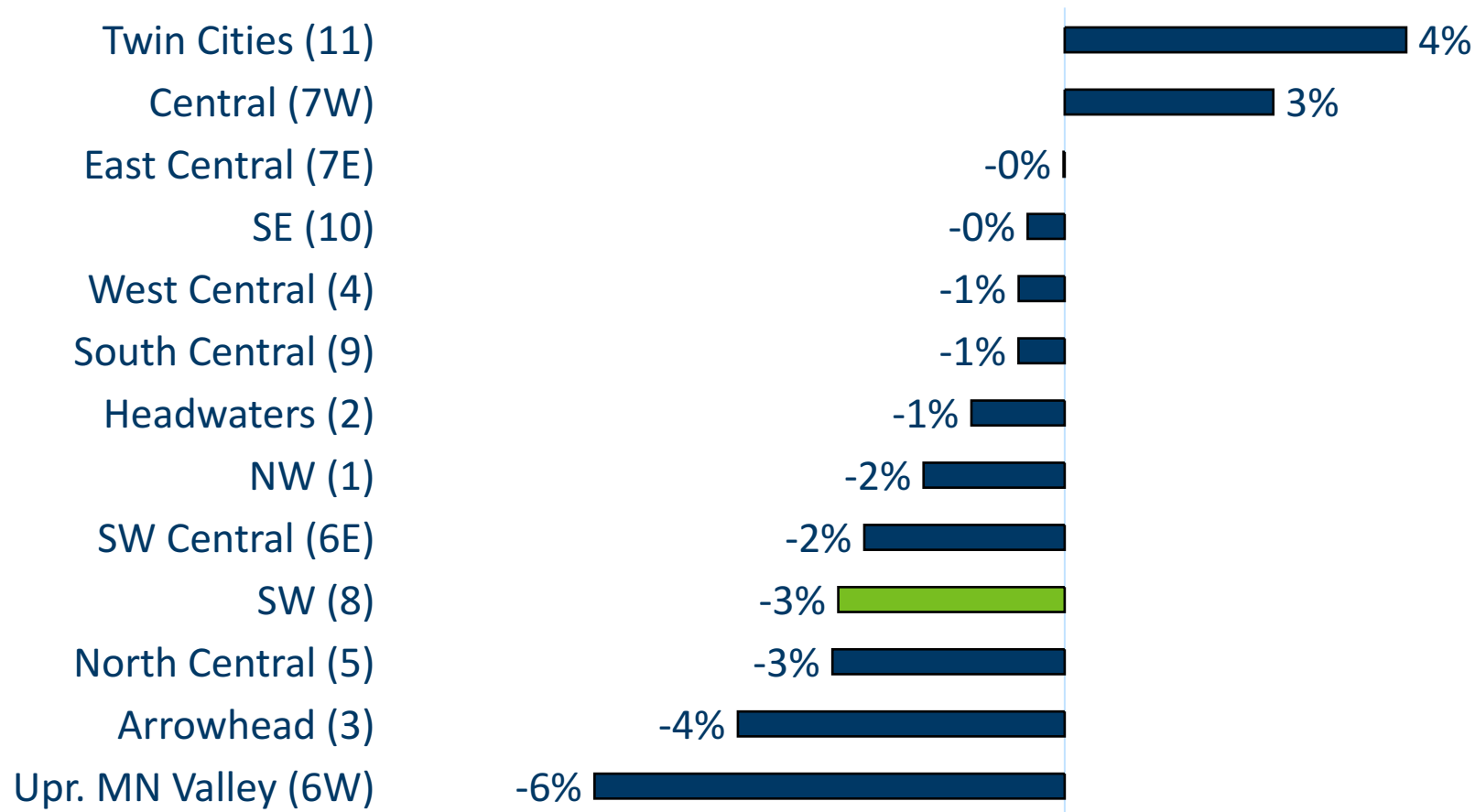
LABOR FORCE PARTICIPATION BY AGE MINNESOTA, 1990-2015



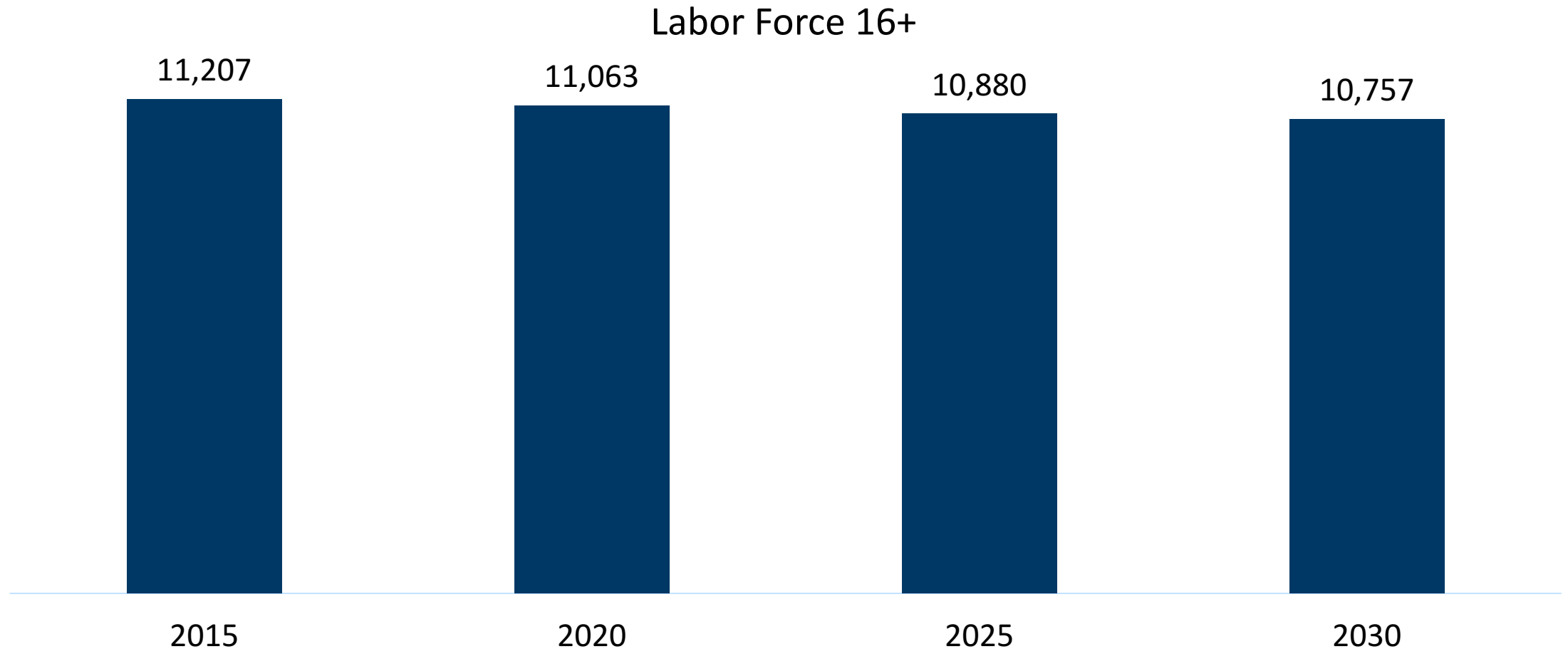

Nobles County will lose ~150 workers every 5 years between 2015 and 2030



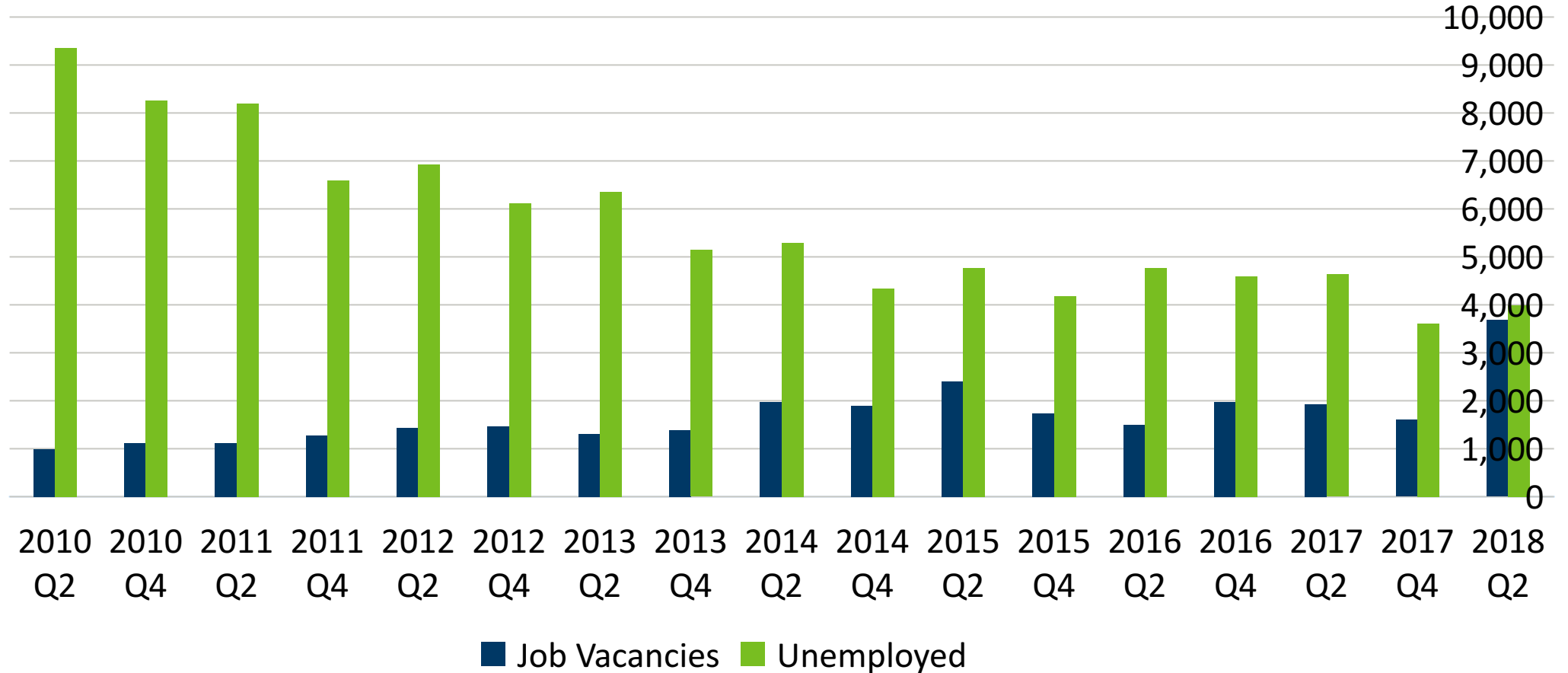

The number of job openings recently surpassed the number of people looking for work

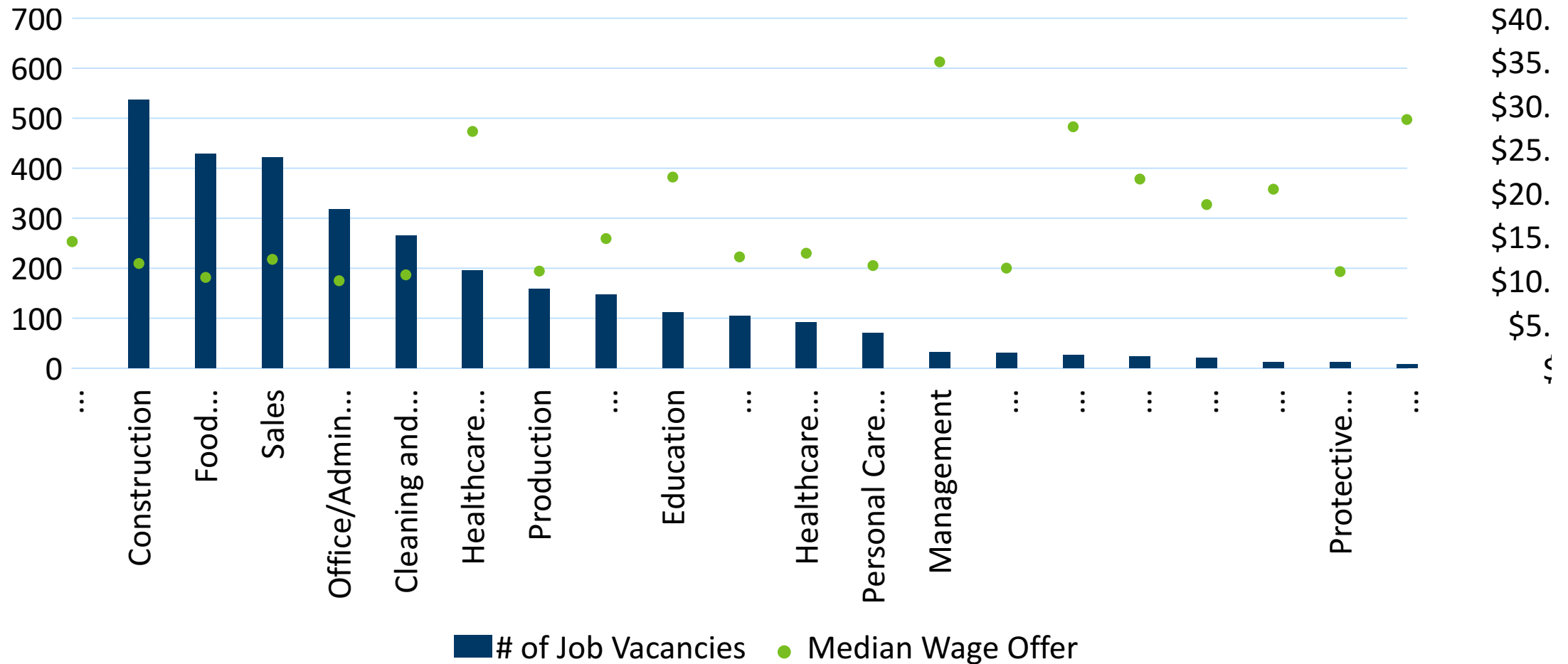


Job Vacancies Growing in SW Minnesota; Unemployment Falling

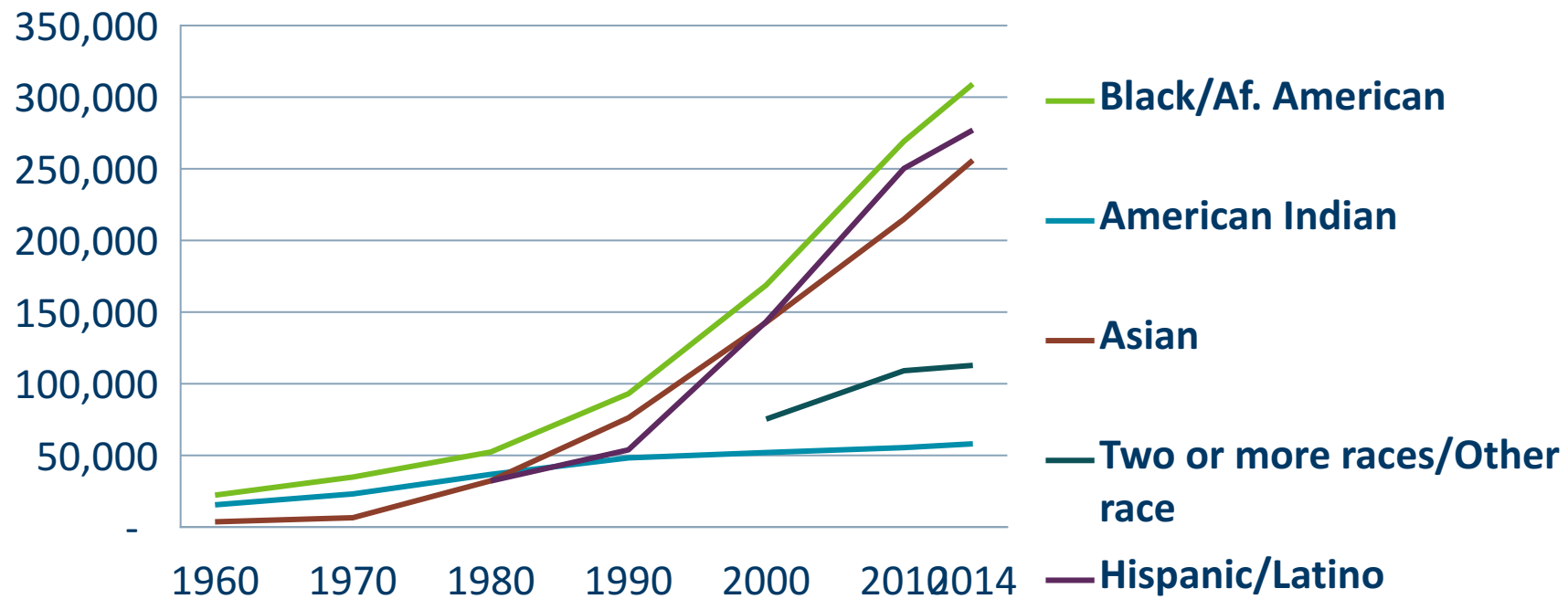

Opportunities to impact labor force's quality and size

- Grow your own (train, retrain, and retain your own)
- Better alignment of preparation (& retooling)
- Pull (or keep) additional folks in the labor force:
 - Older workers
 - People with disabilities
 - Parents, especially mothers
 - Discouraged workers
 - People with less education/skills that align poorly with available jobs
- Attract new workers (domestic, int'l migration)

Populations of color in Minnesota



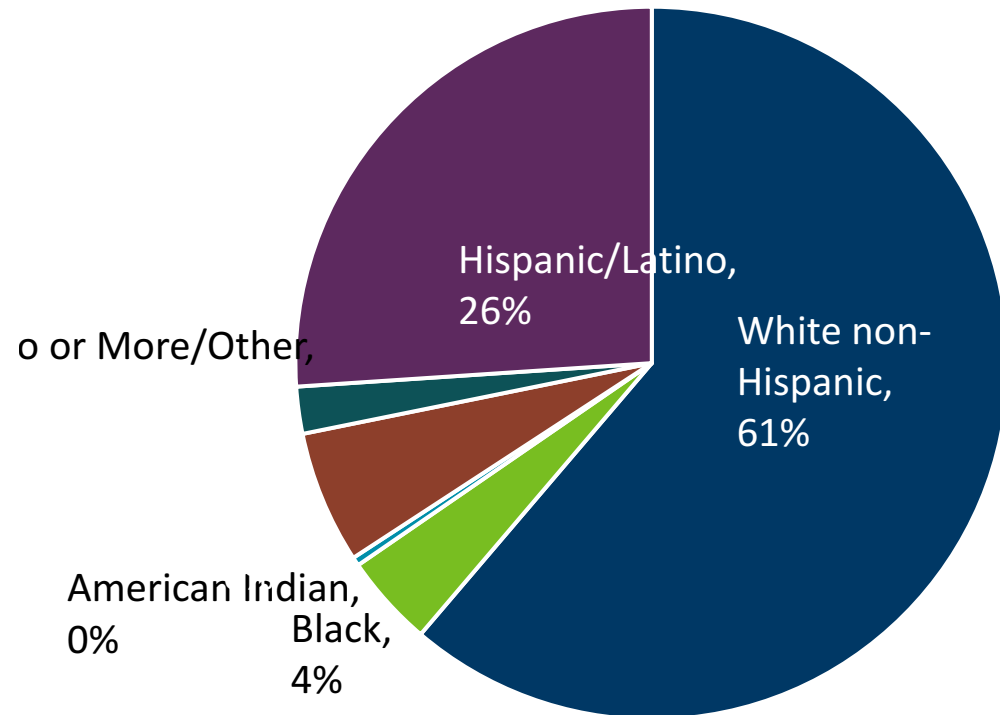

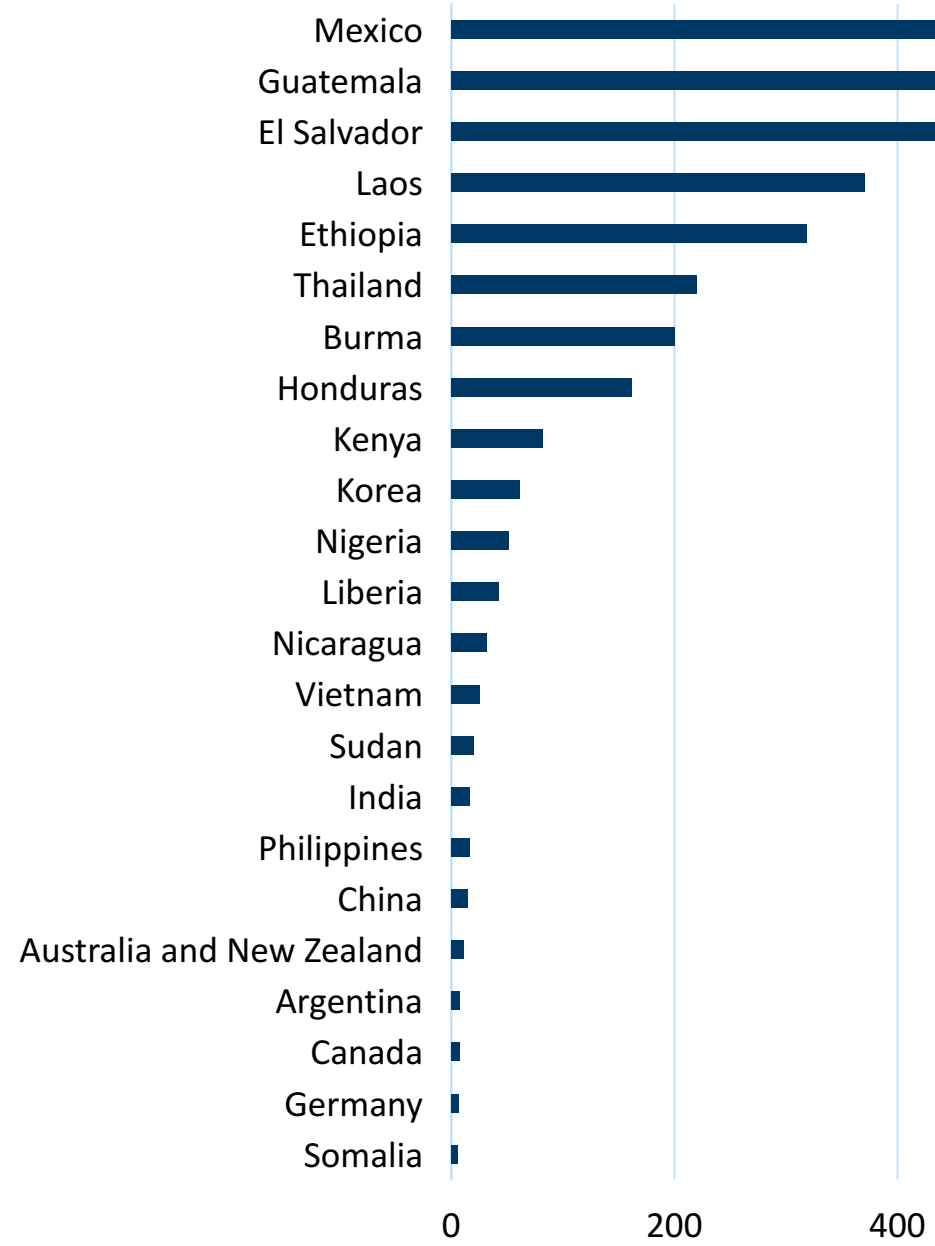
Race and ethnicity, 2012-2016

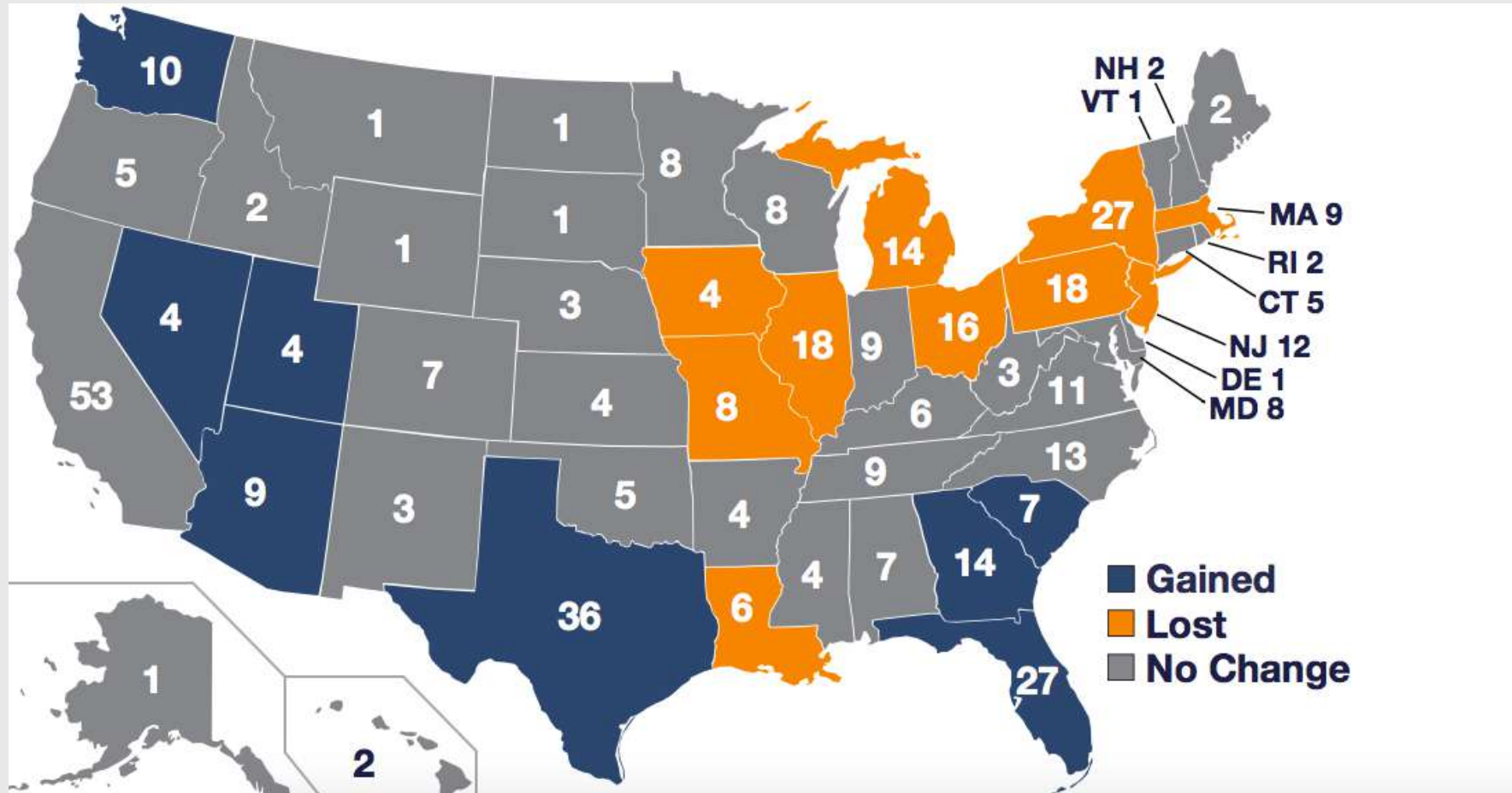

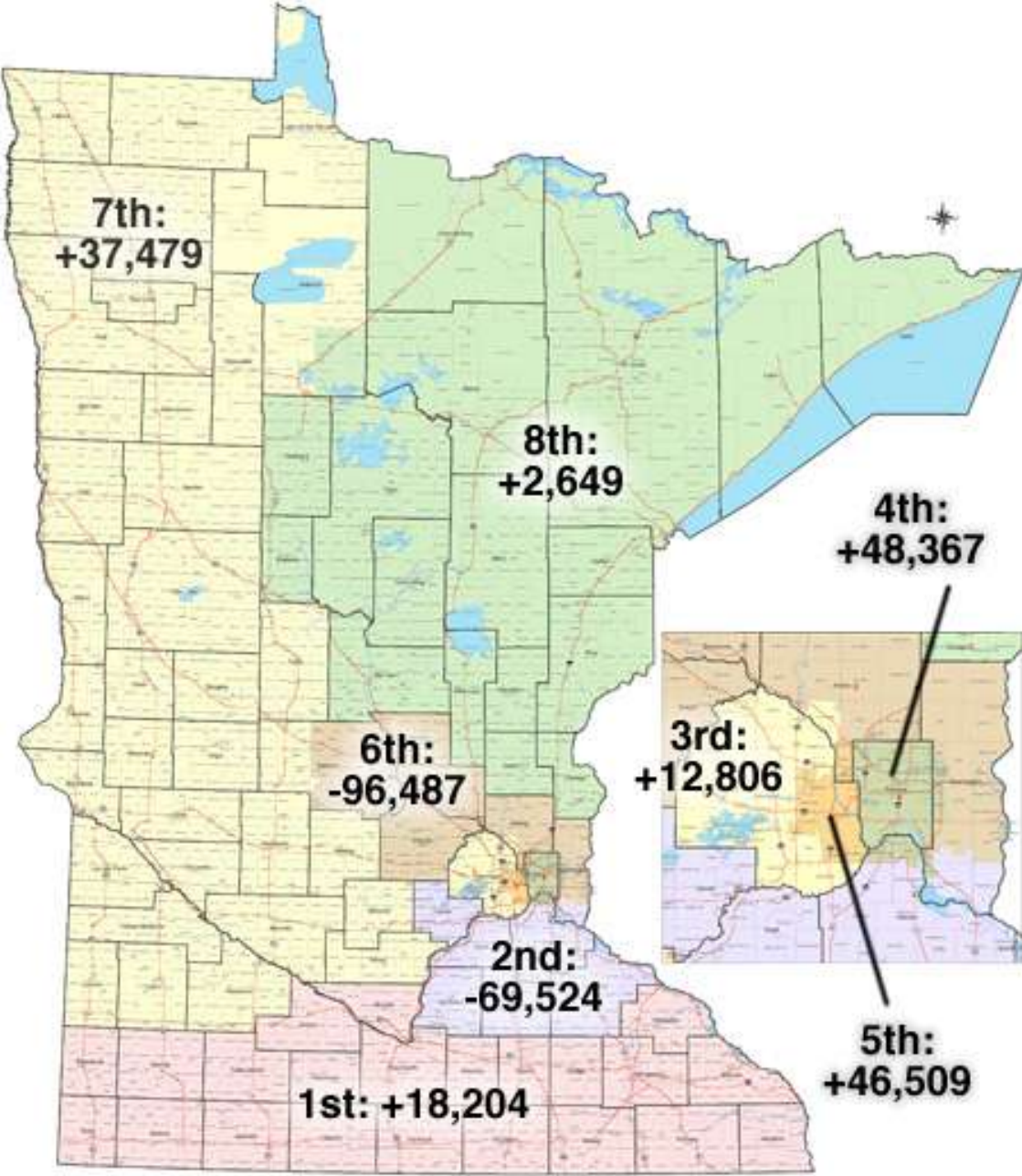

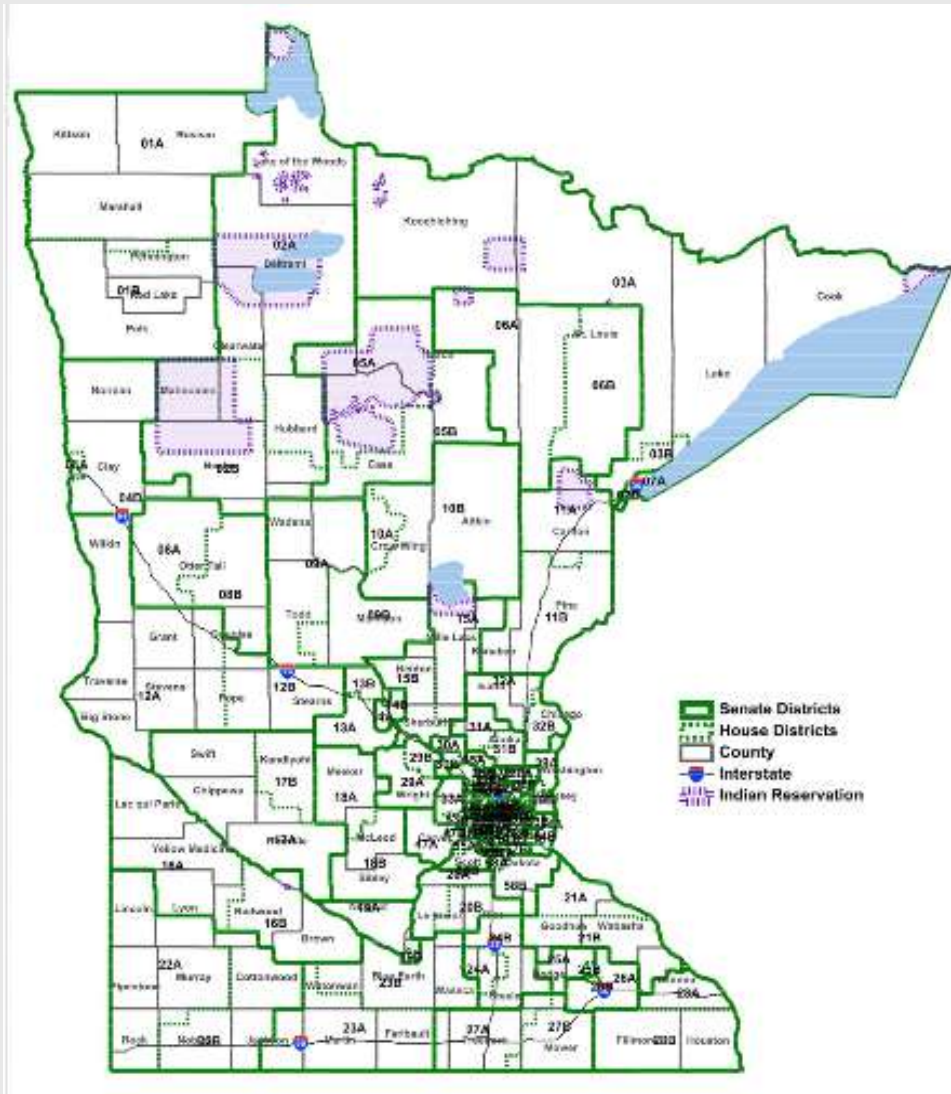
Congressional Reapportionment after the 2010 Census

Census counts guide

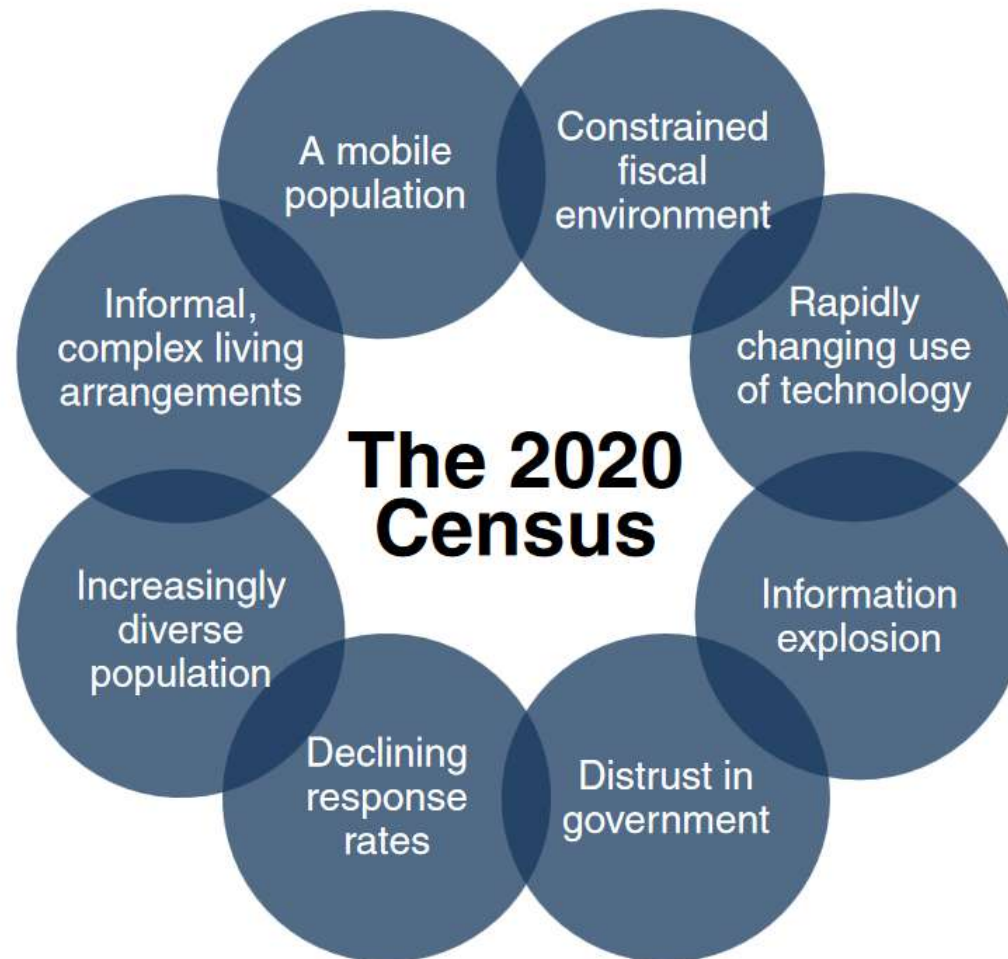

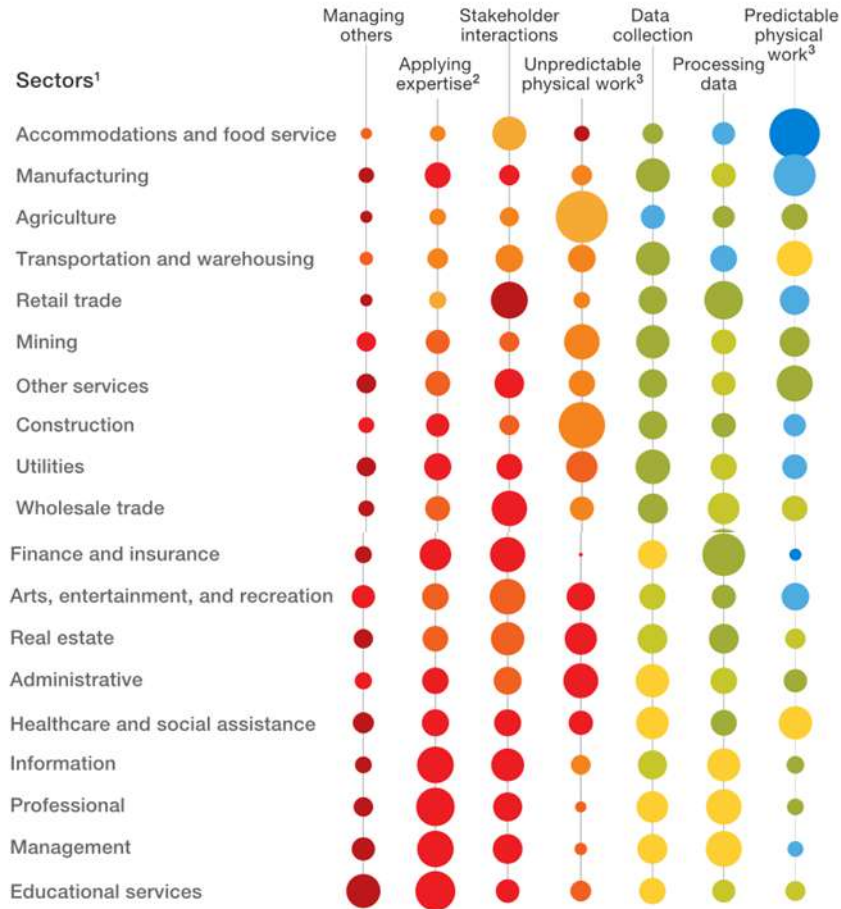

But what about automation?

Automation is technically feasible for many types of activities in industry sectors, but some activities can be more affected than others.



In practice, automation will depend on more than just technical feasibility. Five factors are involved: technical feasibility; costs to automate; the relative scarcity, skills, and cost of workers who might otherwise do the activity; benefits (eg, superior performance) of automation beyond labor-cost substitution; and regulatory and social-acceptance considerations.

¹**Agriculture** includes forestry, fishing, and hunting; **other services** excludes federal-, state-, and local-government services; **real estate** includes rental and leasing; **administrative** includes administrative support and government administration; **healthcare and social assistance** includes private, state-government, and local-government hospitals; **professional** includes scientific and technical services; **educational services** includes private, state-government, and local-government schools.

²Applying expertise to decision making, planning, and creative tasks.

³Unpredictable physical work (physical activities and the operation of machinery) is performed in unpredictable environments, while in predictable physical work, the environments are predictable.

- Minnesota poised to fare better than many Midwest and Northeast states
- Working-age population (25-54) in MN projected to grow, though relatively slowly
