
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Introduction


- Undergraduate curriculum is designed in a discrete disciplinary package—such as Sociology, Economics, Biology, Chemistry.
- In reality, today's society faces issues which transcend the boundaries of academic specialization.
- Interdisciplinary approach provides:
 - Students with an opportunity to see how different fields of knowledge can converse with and inform one another.
 - Interdisciplinary education focuses on more than one discipline.



Intro (Cont.)

- Matsagouras (2002), the interdisciplinary approach favors a holistic overview of all things creative, initiative, and imaginative.
- Karri (2009) highlighted the key points of interdisciplinary curriculum:
 - A range of faculty with diverse training providing students with a breadth of integrated knowledge in interdisciplinary field of inquiry
 - Students and faculty engage in collaborative activities related to problems or topics that cut across disciplinary boundaries
 - Programs require collaborative support for faculty and student from across the institution.
 - ➤ The university is a network of collaborative and dependent efforts towards knowledge production





 Disaster & Coastal Studies (DCS) offers a interdisciplinary approach from social science perspective about the nature of natural disasters in the coastal zone; social aspects of catastrophes or disasters; and organizational issues inherent in preparedness, planning, and managing all forms of disasters.

• The minor is designed to prepare students to meet the workforce demands for emergency preparedness agencies and organizations, as well as advanced studies in the field of Disaster Management.

 Furthermore, the program allows faculty and students to engage in crossdisciplinary research.
