Philosophy/Goals of the Instructional Program

- 1. The development of individual potential
 - a. Recognize and develop skills, abilities, talents, and interests.
 - b. Develop and exercise creativity, self-expression, and critical thinking.
 - c. Develop and demonstrate self-direction, self-motivation, and a sense of responsibility.
 - d. Develop the ability to make decisions and solve problems in a positive, constructive manner.
 - e. Increase self-awareness and strengthen self-esteem.
 - f. Develop ability to participate constructively in a changing society.
 - g. Develop a desire for continuous lifelong learning.
 - h. Understand and practice the principles of positive physical and mental health.
 - i. Increase awareness of and appreciation for esthetic values and beauty in various forms.
 - j. Learn how to use leisure time constructively.
 - k. Make realistic choices of educational, vocational, and avocational goals and to begin to acquire necessary skills to reach these goals.
- 2. The acquisition of a general education
 - a. Master basic skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing.
 - b. Master the basic skills of mathematics.
 - c. Develop an understanding of and appreciation for the American heritage and ideals.
 - d. Acquire the essential information and understand the concepts of social science history, geography, economics, sociology, psychology, and philosophy.

- Acquire the essential information and understand the concepts of science astronomy, biology, chemistry, geology, and physics.
- f. Acquire the essential information and understand the concepts of literature, the arts, and the humanities.
- g. Acquire the essential information and understand the concepts of the practical arts business education, consumer and homemaking education, industrial education, and work experience and education.
- h. Understand the general nature of systems biological, economic, physical, political, social, and cultural.
- 3. The acquisition of skills leading to career attainment
 - a. Increase awareness of and exploration of vocational choices.
 - b. Become knowledgeable about various vocations.
 - c. Relate skills and interests to vocational choices.
 - d. Develop salable skills.
 - e. Understand the relationship between present vocational choices and future technological changes.
- 4. The development of personal and social relationships
 - Learn to value the worth and dignity of every individual.
 - b. Learn to respect and get along with people with whom one works and lives, and with those who think, act, and dress differently.
