Career Pathway: Government and Social Sciences Authentic Real-life Experiences

Mahwah High School offers a variety of co-curricular opportunities to students to expand their knowledge and understanding outside of the academic classroom. Government and Social Sciences Pathway students will have the opportunity to participate in unique project-based learning opportunities that develop problem solving, technical, and teamwork skills.

Co-curricular Opportunities

Academic Decathlon

The Academic Decathlon[®] is a team competition wherein students match their intellects with those of students from other schools. Students are tested in ten categories: Art, Economics, Essay, Interview, Language and Literature, Mathematics, Music, Science, Social Science, and Speech.

Club of Cultural Appreciation

This club's goal is to create a safe environment where students from different ethnicities and backgrounds can share their experiences, cultures, and traditions with one another.

Current Events Club

The Current Events Club provides an open and welcoming environment in which students can share and discuss events that are of interest to them. Topics raised can range from the political and international to celebrity news or science.

Girls Learn International

During chapter meetings, students use an extensive curriculum developed by GLI to learn about issues dealing with human rights and girls' education. The GLI curriculum is specifically designed to guide participants in developing critical thinking, problem solving, and advocacy skills essential to effective leadership.

Mock Trial

Mock Trial is a program that simulates a real-life court experience. Students take up roles as attorneys and witnesses to form cases for both sides of a hypothetical legal problem.
