Score Totals:

- 0-5 This source is highly questionable. Should not be used in research without suitable justification.
- 6-9 The site may be an acceptable starting point for gathering information, but might not be suitable as a cited source in a research project.
- 10-11 Good source for research. Information should be confirmed in other sources.
- 12-15 Excellent source for research purposes.
 - Score totals are merely a guide; use the overall rubric to judge source validity
 - Author and publication information are especially important. Scores lower than "2" in either of these categories raises questions about the source's credibility.
 - If you are uncertain about the credibility of an author or publisher, conduct a quick online search of the name to get more information.
