For your summer reading project you will be required to read one text, either fiction or non-fiction, based on your reading level and of your choosing. Please select a text that you haven't read before. Attached is a list of possible options and a link to the Governor's Summer Reading Challenge suggested reading list. These resources may assist your search. After you read, complete the task below.

Your School Library Needs Your Review!

When items are purchased online from companies such as *Barnes and Noble* and *Amazon*, the organization invites customers to review their new products. Imagine that you bought your summer reading book through one of these sites. Write a review that will help your school library media specialist decide whether or not to purchase this book for your school.

Companies provide guidelines for its reviewers such as the following:

- **Include the "why"**: The best reviews include not only whether you liked or disliked a product [book], but also why. Feel free to make comparisons with related products [books] you've experienced.
- **Be specific**: Your review should be relevant to the product [book] you're reviewing and focus on specific features or your experience.
- Not too short, not too long.
- **Be sincere**: We welcome your honest opinion about the book. Be sure to support your opinion.

YOUR ASSIGNMENT:

Keeping these criteria in mind, write a review of the book you read. Your goal is to influence the library media specialist to purchase this book or not.

- 1. Include the title of the book (underlined) and the author.
- 2. Begin with a brief summary of the book. Remember not to include the ending.
- 3. Be sure to discuss the book's <u>theme or central idea</u>. Be sure to include text evidence to support/explain your theme/central idea.
- 4. Use at least <u>two specific examples</u> from the text as you explain why you did or did not like the book.
- 5. On a scale of 1-5 stars, rate your book. 5 stars=highly recommended to 1 star=not worth reading.

You may hand write your review or type it. Your work will be scored using the attached rubric, and will count toward your Trimester 1 grade. It is due to your English-Language Arts teacher on September 7, 2018.

Seven Dead Pirates by Linda






