15) If you had to choose five **excellent sources** for your PowerPoint, would this be considered an "excellent" source? Yes or no and why?

- For a book, give the title and author.
- For an article, give the title and author.
- For a website, give the title and URL.

**HINTS - HOW TO EVALUATE A WEBSITE**

**(To save paper, please delete this section before you hand in the assignment.)**

**Author** = The author can be a person or an organization.

**Author** = When it is not obvious who the author is, try going to the homepage of a website. You will usually find an "About," "Contact Us," or "People" link that will tell you something about the author. You can also try Googling the author.

**Date** = For science courses, be sure that sites are current (less than 5 years old).

**Date** = Look for the © or update date at the bottom of the screen.

**Date** = If there is no visible © date, check the dates of the titles in the bibliography or works cited page.

**Date** = If links on the page are broken, that means that the website is not maintained or updated regularly, so the information may not be relevant.

**Domain**= The extension at the end of a URL (ex. .com).

**Domain**= Domains such as .org and .gov are usually, though not always, more reliable than other domains (ex. .com and .biz).

**Purpose** = Websites are created to educate, entertain, or sell.

**Purpose** = Quickly glance at the titles, pictures, captions, and links identify the author's message and point of view.

**Title** = You can usually find the website's title in the tab or the blue bar at the top of the screen.
