Twenty-one states legalized marijuana for medical use, but Colorado made it legal for recreational use. Recreational use means that you can buy marijuana whenever you feel like it. That means the citizens of Colorado may buy marijuana at stores. I am not for the legalization, but I would support legalization for medical use.

On Easter Weekend, Colorado citizens gathered in Denver to have to celebrate 420. 420 is a festival where people can smoke marijuana and talk to the other people who are enjoying themselves by smoking marijuana. They were promoting their happiness that they could smoke Marijuana freely and not be arrested for doing this act. Other Colorado residents say "the whole sky was filled with smoke." That is doing harm to the environment and polluting.

The people of Colorado are doing harmful things to their brain and body. For example, when you smoke one marijuana joint, it is equivalent to smoking five cigarettes. The THC in Marijuana is

five times stronger than what it was in 1960. It hurts you because your brain is still developing if you are a teen and even as an adult. When you use it, it makes you hallucinate. The question is, why did lawmakers make Marijuana legal? Some states only legalize it so they can get out of debt. So far, Colorado has made two hundred million dollars in taxes. "If the states use the marijuana tax for the state itself, it should be earmarked so the states can get out of debt, but the extra money should go to the veterans, or for education," says Mr. Miner, 7th grade teacher of Griswold Middle School. Earmarked means to have a written document stating that a certain amount of money will go to a specific cause. "Legal does not mean safe," says Mrs. Butremovcic, health teacher of Griswold Middle School.

On the news, there were reports of a fourth grader bringing Marijuana into school and selling it. They have claimed they took the Marijuana from their grandparents stash. Lots of children do not

know what Marijuana can do to you. Children are going to keep taking Marijuana from their relatives with them not even knowing. Even Representative Dan Pabon of Denver states, "We are making sure that we kept this out of the hands of kids, cartels, and criminals." But he did not keep his promise. How can he say that, even though kids can get it without anyone knowing?

The marijuana legalization states you have to be twenty one or older to buy and possess up to an ounce at a time. Non Colorado residents can purchase up to $\frac{1}{4}$ of an ounce, and Residents can grow up to six plants in their residence. These are some rights Colorado citizens have. There will be no more arrests for Marijuana possession. If you are driving, they will reduce the problems associated with the illegal market. If people are high, they can refute the DUI charge. The only way they would have to take a D.U.I is if you are a danger for the people around you.




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Katelyn Kennedy

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Budget Troubles by Derek Janca

Many of you have heard of the proposed budget for the 2014-15 school year. However... there will certainly be more cuts. Proposed at the hearing for the budget earlier this year, the school wanted an increase of 2.29% or \$576,450. The 2013-14 budget was over \$25 million. The budget focused on three unfunded mandates -Common Core, the Smarter Balanced testing, and teacher evaluations.

Common Core Standards include "what is to be learned." These are based on career readiness and the goal of students not having to take "remedial" classes in college. This is a noble pursuit, but reports from students, parents, and teachers alike show that these aren't all they're talked up to be. I've heard reports of students learning in kindergarten what their parents learned in first grade. These programs will

re-allocate over \$45,000 in textbooks and materials.

Smarter Balanced... all I can say is, it does get better. This year was rough, challenging to learn, and well, just annoying. It was a pilot. In fact, Griswold Schools described this year as a "field test." They were hard... because they were based on common core; things that we started to implement this year. Next year is also reserved for testing. This will be targeted in later years. GMS has received a tech grant this year.

"A Teacher Evaluation System is crucial to encourage our teachers and administrators to improve. However... the current mandated program is time consuming, expensive, and unwieldy," says Paul Smith. And, not to mention every teacher I have talked to hates it. Really, how tough can it be? It has been described as "stressful" on multiple occasions. The funding for this program, going into full force in the 2014-15

year, cuts out of the other mandates.

Many new proposed costs include new textbooks, including those for a math coach. Currently, none is present in the entire district. A total of 5 new staffing positions were considered. Four new textbook sets will also be included. Seven proposed items are set aside for common core.

In addition, several things were noted but not included nor suggested, but as what "students need that is not currently supported" to be successful. Magnet programs for GHS were here, along with e-text support and extracurricular activities for GES and GMS.
