

Hollis Cook Hosts Arizona Park Services Monument Tour

Courthouse Director Hollis Cook and about twenty other Park officials, many of whom had traveled to Tombstone from Phoenix and Tucson for the Board Meeting held last Thursday, October 10th at Schieffelin Hall, ventured out to Schieffelin Monument for a tour of the recently-acquired state park site.

The meeting began at 9:00am, where State Parks Officials met with the Arizona Historical Society to discuss the coordination of to develop and efforts enhance tourist centers around the state. Around noon, the group took a break for luncheon at Nellie Cashman's, after which they followed Director Cook out to the monument to view the site.

After the group had assembled at the monument, Cook gave a 20 minute presentation, which included some interesting historical facts about Ed Scheiffelin's life and death.

Cook also pointed out the GLO Survey marker at the edge of the site, and brought the group up to date on progress made to improve, and future plans to maintain the area. He stated that the first goal is to erect a gated fence around the area before cleaning of the site, including removal of graphitti from the cairn and surrounding rocks, will begin.

Cook also informed the group that The Friends of Tombstone Courthouse has raised \$200 to be put toward improvements on this historic spot which marks the tomb of the Founder of Tombstone.

Well pardners, talking about shooting yourself in the foot. Has greed and crass marketing competition reared its ugly head in Tombstone? Like folks in town needed anything more to think about than friends, food and fun during Helldorado weekend 2002, it seems much of the focus was on the circus that came to town, unscheduled and uninvited. The circus we refer to is the injunction served to two of the primary sponsors of the 73year-old event. They were told not to perform any show and call it the Gunfight at the O.K. Corral.

Helldorado is basically fundraising event; funds generated after expenses are donated to assist local interests, such as the elderly, schools and youth activities. Helldorado is an effort by the people, for the people and of the people of Tombstone. The all-volunteer organizational groups involved in the injunction, are from Helldorado Inc., and Vigilantes. The Tombstone Vigilantes and the Lion's Club are also sponsors of the event and all have been associated with Helldorado since their inceptions. Without these non-profit charity organizations, there would be no Helldorado. No Helldorado means a dramatic

reduction in tourism that no doubt would lead to many businesses drying up and blowing away in this arid economical climate.

Just as the many volunteers worked tirelessly to complete last minute details, Helldorado Incorporated, was notified that they had to remove a sign from the Helldorado performance stage that referred to a place known as the O.K. Corral, a name that is a (registered trademark). At the same time the Western reenactment group know as the Tombstone Vigilantes were notified by an attorney that they could not refer to their show as the Gunfight at the (registered trademark). They were told not to call it the gunfight, nor to indirectly refer to it as the (registered trademark). "Helldorado acted immediately to take down the sign, stated President Steve Reeder. "We just thought, O.K. we'll just do this. "Bob Love, owner of the (registered trademark) felt that the Vigilante group was trying to portray the Helldorado site as the location of the gunfight. They, he, wanted us to take the sign down, which was made by a local artist (name withheld) many years ago just to spruce up

SELECTIVE ENFORCEMENT PLAGUES TOMBSTONE

Michael Drawdy and Jamie Marsh, together again thick as thieves in Crystal Palace over the Helldorado weekend. Something is just not right with this picture. According to Drawdy, he has stated that he has no connection with Marsh and the Visionweb Properties arm of Visionweb Technologies.

Has Drawdy actually severed his ties with the group that bankrupted the Hot Biscuit Restaurant? Many members of the Chamber of Commerce are calling for Drawdy's removal as president. Drawdy has threatened that he will pack up his Visionweb Chamber website and ride out of town if he is removed. Unless, that is, the Chamber pays a reported \$30,000 to buy it from him. Chamber director Jean Sullivan has made excuse after excuse for Drawdy remaining as president. Other Chamber officials have commented that it is just too much trouble to have him removed. Another case of selective enforcement in Tombstone?

Next case please: our City Clerk position that has gone unfilled for over a year. Now that Dusty has been reelected, will his first move be to hire a permanent qualified city clerk? I say it is nessisary to complete a management team that holds each other accountable in city government.

Herb Linn remaining as council member to complete his term is another example of "It's just too much work." What about rules are rules? Some local RVparks went less than full over the weekend while the city looked the other way, refusing to ticket illegally parked trailers, RVs and even tents. Sure bet Tombstone Territories RV park would have liked to fill the 45 empty spaces they had available.

This is on open call for citizens to unite and assemble organized citizen groups to patrol our Southern border and to do it actually on the border not 25 to 50 miles from the border, as is now the practice. Our goal should be to staff the border each and every day, until the issue of the invasion is resolved.

bottom-line? The The Government is not doing their job to effectively protect our borders. I call for American citizens to do the job for them. We have given them a year to respond to the demands of the American citizens, to tighten up the security and National defense of our borders. This is not a result of the just the past year worth of handwringing and telling us they cannot do anything about it. Government is obviously not capable of or not willing to protect our soil. Basically, they have admitted cowerdace and unwillingness to do what the American people feel is necessary; we all know they have been ignoring the border problem for decades. Enough is enough. It is time to act. This has been in the planning for some time; now is the time for action. I am looking for citizens to organize, pool supplies and equipment, train responsibly and move out in groups to protect a stretch of our border. 
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DOG SENSE A POLITICAL COLUMN

Tombstone's annual celebration, which was originally staged in an effort to reestablish its identity after losing a bid to remain the official seat of Cochise County, has been portraying the famous gunfight since 1929. Every year groups travel from around the country to reenact various western gunfight events, even comedy western skits. However most groups cherish the opportunity to perform the famous gunfight reenactment in the very town where it occurred. Most do not seem to care where they perform; knowing that the current (registered trademark) arena theater is not the actual location of the event, they are just as satisfied to perform it on the streets or on the Helldorado set.

Now, Helldorado and the entire charity spirit of the reenactment groups could be snuffed out with one litigious volley fired from the desk of the current owner, Bob Love, who lives on the East Coast. Reeder feels this is a big concern for the businesses and tourist attractions here in town: so much so that he the Tombstone addressed Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night, alerting them to the situation and asking for support from the community. The two groups have obtained legal assistance to fight the ban on reenactments outside of the (registered trademark) arena. The following is an official statement by Steve Reeder given to the Chamber of Commerce at Tuesday night's meeting.

"What our councel advised Helldorado what Incorporated and the Tombstone Vigilantes should do in this situation- will affect the whole town. We will set the standards in the

case; if you do not respond to it, everyone here will eventually receive a letter, and be affected by this registered trademark application. Therefore, we are asking for your help in raising money for the defense fund. We have an attorney who specializes in intellectual property and he has taken the case at a fraction of what it would normally cost. Regardless of this, we need help raising the cost to protect our future."

What will come of this is yet to be resolved. The facts seem to insinuate that no one, but no one, can use the name of the (registrademark). Tumbleweed took to the streets over Helldorado Weekend to ask visiting fans of the Wild West what they thought of the situation. Basically, we asked two questions. Do you think someone can own a historical event, trademark it, and not allow anyone else to reenact it? Question two dealt with a situation: Say you came all the way here to see the gunfight. The (registered

HUMAN RIGHTS GROUPS SEEK FEDERAL INVESTIGATION OF SHOOTING AND DRUG SEIZURE

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Human rights advocates are calling for a federal investigation into the and a vigilante group's seizure of drugs near the U.S.-Mexican border. The advocates, including members of a group called Coalicion de Derechos Humanos, said the two separate incidents resulted from misguided federal immigration policies.

"The murder of two migrants is not an isolated incident," said the Rev. John Fife, a Tucson pastor. "It is the culmination of a history of dehumanization and racism and militarism on this border that has gone on for a long time. Too long."

Two men were killed Oct. 16 when two suspected immigrant smugglers drove up and opened

fire on a group of illegal border crossers near Red Rock, about 35 miles northwest of Tucson. fatal shooting of two immigrants
Investigators believe the survivors - except one who escaped - were forced to get into the smugglers' vehicle and leave with them.

> Also, on Oct. 15 and Oct. 16, members of an armed citizens patrol called Ranch Rescue seized about 280 pounds of marijuana from smugglers crossing a private ranch.

> A U.S. Border Patrol spokesman declined to comment, and calls to the Mexican Consulate and the Pinal County Sheriff's Department, which investigated the homicides, were not returned.



of Derechos Humanos, said she doubted the vigilante groups have jurisdiction to do what they're doing. She said law enforcement agencies are better suited to safeguarding the public. Former Pima County Supervisor Raul Grijalva, now running for Congress, also took part in the protest, asking federal authorities to investigate.

"This is very scary," said Jose Matus, director of Derechos Humanos. "We're fearful of people thinking they can pick up guns and shoot at anyone who looks Mexican."



DISTRICT 25 CANDIDATES FACE TOUGH QUESTIONS

PART 2 OF 4

Despite a Homecoming football game, District 25 debates at Schieffelin Hall drew a crowd of about 40 local residents who listened to candidates for the State Senate and House of Representative face off to answer tough questions posed by the *Tumbleweed*. The format for the general election debates challenged candidates to face-off in pairs to answer twelve questions presented by Tumbleweed moderator Bill Bennett. Dave Stoddard and Marsha Arzberger, candidates for one Senate slot, squared off to answer each of the twelve questions posed to the candidates. The four remaining candidates for the House, Jennifer Burns, Bobby Lugo, Dave Stevens and Manny Alvarez were paired off randomly to answer six of the twelve questions. The *Tumbleweed* has transcribed the candidates' responses to the twelve questions and presents them here for those who could not attend. Item 2: There has been a lot of "positioning" in the past on public land use - grazing vs. recreational vs. environment. What is your position and how do you plan to move in that direction?

Public land is exactly that, public land. It is there for the use of the public. Grazing is a valid use of public land. It does not cause the great amount of environmental damage when there is a conscientious grazing program applied. In fact, grazing on public land proofs to be beneficial in keeping down the undergrowth, reducing the danger of fire and what was the second part of the question? As a legislator I'd just be one vote out of ninety on any bills that come up to curtail grazing. Of course, if a bill comes up to further the grazing rights or install grazing permits on land on which grazing is permissible then of course, I will vote favorable on that.

Senator Arzberger

Your asked about public lands. There are two kinds of public land in Arizona, one would be Federal land and one would be State land. Federal land is often forestland and many of the grazing disagreements we have had, have to do with Federal land. I have seen personal proof for

beneficial for forestland. I have a feeling that they are going to be coming back to that after all these fires. Let me go on to State land. State land to begin with is in trust to provide income for our school system and therefore it is often leased for a number of different reasons. One being grazing, farming, there are also other commercial uses that State land is leased for. And the purpose, in our Constitution it says that State land returns as great amount of money as possible to the school system. Now I think your question is leading toward the future of public land and although you did not say so, I suspect that you intended to ask about open space. I imagine Ed that was part of your question. I think it is important to maintain open space in the State of Arizona. And by saying that I mean, let's not allow the principles that State land must recover the largest amount possible mean that, all our State land are going to be sold for development and in this state that means wall to wall houses. There is a great deal

of work we need to do in this area. At the present time I think our State lands are managed very well, I have a few questions about our public lands and I also would ask that there are a few unique and special places in Arizona such as mountain tops that should be preserved.

Representative Lugo

Yeah, the land that we have here in Arizona, all of it is beautiful and we are a big State. And I think that we have to use it the way that would be better for our posterity. And I think if we are talking about Federal land or State land. Our Federal land we can use grazing on it to protect the ecology on it. And the State land we can lease it and therefore the school will get benefit out of that. But I think that number one and my priority would be to conserve the land that we have and try to save it, because it is a very beautiful State of Arizona and our land is what makes our beautiful State.

The Washington Sniper By: John C Betka

I have debated the article this Issue of the Tumbleweed, however, I felt amiss if I did not address the issue of the so-called Sniper of Washington Area. Some people are staying home from work. Some parents are pulling their kids out of school. Others are avoiding shopping and pumping gas.

All this concern because one sniper has begun picking people off at long range in Maryland, Washington and Virginia. First of all, I challenge the word sniper in this application, just about anyone can hit a target at 100 yards, that does not justify this person being a "sniper". To take a sniper "out" requires the use of another "sniper" why are we not doing just that.

Police officials say the manhunt has become the No. 1 priority of the local, state and federal governments. And despite all the resources of government, State, Local and Federal agencies there is seemingly little progress being made in the investigation. Press conferences are held virtually on the hour. Officials are talking about an unprecedented level of cooperation between government agencies. I hope the murderer of nine is caught soon. But not optimistic. Bureaucracies are just that Bureaucracies and are inefficient. The bigger they are, the more inefficient they get.

Just imagine if there were 10 shooters, or 100, or more such individuals or organized terrorists at work.

The problem is quite simple, just as the U S Supreme Court ruled in 1995, " it is NOT the duty, obligation, responsibility of any police agencies, Federal, State, Local, County etc to protect you your family or your property, that is the individual's RIGHT and Obligation." I point out the weakness in American law enforcement not to alarm people, but to demonstrate that ordinary citizens cannot and should not count on the government to protect them, their lives, their property and their family members. The government can't do it. It's not possible.

The fact is the government has systematically been disarming the law-abiding citizen in lieu of the Rights of Criminals. We Americans have the God Given Right to Keep and Bear Arms, an

armed Citizen is a Free person, a disarmed citizen is a slave and as such subject to the whims and terror of the criminals like this so called sniper, like the terrorist of 911. They cannot nor have they ever been able to protect us. We live in an illusion of security, the only security is when the American Citizens acts individually and collectively to protect themselves. Recognize that all of the policemen in the world can't stop it. They can investigate. They can respond to it. They may even eventually apprehend the perpetrators. Only you and I as armed citizens can STOP IT!

HOW TO BUY A HORSE

HOW TO BUY A HORSE:

The decision to purchase a horse is an important one. Factors such as the breed, age, sex, and training level must be determined. A family with young, inexperienced children would not be looking for the same qualities as a professional horse trainer. I have put together the following tips over twenty-five years of breeding, training, buying and selling horses. Keep in mind that although most "horse people" are honest, there are a few that will do nearly anything to sell their horse.

First, be honest about your level of expertise. Can you tell whether a horse is conformationally correct? Can you identify lower leg lameness? Do you know enough about your particular breed choice to be able to tell whether the horse in question matches the standard? If not, please find someone who does know and take them with you when you go to view the animal.

Make sure you first see the horse in the smallest enclosure possible. A stall is ideal. If a horse if weaving, cribbing, or turns and tries to kick when you open the stall door, it is probably not a good prospect. Ask the handler to lead the horse out and stand it as squarely as possible. Move around the animal and look for conformation problems.

Also observe the horse's disposition as it is being handled. Since horses are occasionally drugged prior to sale, run your hand down the groove in the neck and watch for traces of blood or needle marks. Also check the hip area for signs of an injection. Ask if the horse kicks. If it does not, pick up each foot and examine not only the hoof, but the area above it. You are searching for small scars that may indicate that the horse has had a surgical

procedure commonly referred to as "nerving". It is frequently done when horses have been diagnosed with navicular disease. Cutting the nerve will insure the horse is not able to feel anything in his lower foot or leg. Unfortunately, a "nerved" horse can walk over broken glass and severely cut himself without knowing he is injured.

Now is a perfect time to ask to see the horse's papers if you're looking at a purebred animal. It is extremely important to be sure that the horse being sold matches the horse described on the certificate of registration. Is it the correct color? Are the white markings identical to those listed? It is equally important to be sure the person selling the horse is the same person printed on the certificate as the owner. Keep in mind that if a registration certificate lists two names, such as Bob AND Brenda Smith, you must have both signatures in order for the sale to be legitimate. If the certificate reads Bob OR Brenda, either may sign.

Ask why this horse is being sold. Ask if the horse has any history of injury, colic, founder, or any other equinerelated medical problem. Find out the name of the seller's veterinarian and ask if you may call him or her. As you are asking these questions, continue walking around the horse and observ-Does the horse seem overly calm? Run your hand inside the inside of the mouth. Be careful not to get bitten! The seller will think you are checking age by looking at the teeth. What you are really doing is seeing if the mouth is extremely dry. Tranquilizers generally cause dryness of the mouth, drooping of the eye lids and lower lip, and sometimes an unsteady gait.

Ask the handler to take the

horse to an open area. Walk behind the horse and watch the hoof prints in the dirt. If the horse tracks normally, the hooves will leave straight indentations. If you see a hoof print off to one side, the horse may wing or paddle. Watch the horse move. Does it appear sound? If you want to ride the horse, ask that the seller ride first. To you, the term "green broke" may mean the horse simply isn't finished, but certainly can walk, trot and canter evenly, and knows his leads. To the seller, it may mean the horse probably won't buck you off!

Watch as the horse is tacked up to be ridden. Bitting is very important. If a very severe bit is required, the horse is probably not as welltrained as one who goes in a simple snaffle. Watch as the girth is tightened. Does the horse move and sidestep? If so, he may be "cinchy", and that can be a difficult problem to correct.

If the seller has ridden and you've watched, then you've ridden, and you're satisfied that this horse is probably the one you're looking for, you should still ask a few more questions. Make sure you've been told the accurate age, especially if the horse is not a purebred. I once had a young lady boarding a horse in my barn who told me her gelding was six. He certainly looked older, and when I checked his teeth, identified a horse closer to thirty! Ask if the horse has been shown? By whom? When was he last vaccinated? Dewormed? How is he to clip? Bathe? Tie? If the horse is a stallion or mare, make sure you know the get or produce record. If a stallion, make sure both testicles are descended. Find out whether the horse has been artificially collected. If a mare, find out whether she has been live covered. When was her last foal? Did the foaling occur without problems?

One of the best tips I can give you is to have your veterinarian do a pre-purchase examination. The cost varies from \$50.00 to over \$200.00, however, if your horse has a heart murmur, or other problem, it is well worth the money to find out. If you are buying a hunter/jumper, you most certainly want the legs radiographed. Definitely have a vet examine any animal to be used for breeding.

Finally, get a bill of sale, as well as the certificate of registration signed. If brand inspection, or livestock hauling cards are required, be sure the card is on file and that you obtain the transfer. Looks like you've just bought your Diane returns next week with an informative article with



for a while.

We arrived in the mid-1940s and how my parents managed to keep up their traveling all through the years of World War II I never knew, but I know we traveled by car, train and bus.

Ft. Huachuca was about 30 miles south of town and had finally gotten permanent quarters built for the soldiers stationed there, so the Army was selling off the tiny-18' to 24 foot trailers the soldiers had been billeted in at the beginning of the war. Dad bought 16 or 18 of them and set up a trailer park on Toughnut Street, renting them to the people that wintered in the arid high desert that seemed, with the perpetual sunshine, to heal their arthritis and asthma. The climate was wonderful and it did help the ill, but only in Tombstone were they able to live symptom free.

As in all small communities, the residents were happy to see an enterprising young couple join them, full of new ideas from across the country. Daddy was appointed the Marshall of Tombstone; I don't know whether it had any official duties or if it was simply a courtesy title to help spur tourism. I do think it helped draw tourists, as he looked the part when he rode astride a horse on the dusty streets of town.

He was also part of the group of townspeople that decided to spruce the town. Progress was coming to town! They ripped out the original plank sidewalks and tore down the shading overhang, then they poured concrete sidewalks sans the welcoming shade. The image of the old west had been destroyed, the tourists stopped coming. Learning their lesson rapidly as they watched the economy plummet, the new sidewalks were dug up, the planks and overhangs replaced, Tombstone was back and the tourists soon were.

There were two saloons in town, the Oriental and the Crystal Palace. I liked the Crystal Palace the best with its long, polished mahogany bar backed with beveled mir-

rors, player piano tinkling, and if you squinted and the light was just right, you could almost see the card-players, some with their hats pulled sharply down over their face hiding their eyes from the other players, the smoke from a roll-your-own curling upward. The only thing missing were the dance hall girls. They may have been there but if they weren't in costume an 11 year old in those days didn't recognize them, and too, I thought "dance hall girls" did just that-dance.

Naivety, don't you wish it were still around?

gerprint" that each firearm leaves on a bullet or cartridge case after it is fired, and trace it back to the original buyer of the gun.Ballistic fingerprinting will not work for a number of reasons. Probably foremost is that crooks do not use valid identification to buy guns in stores. That means the evidence chain will rarely connect back to the crook.

Second, the signature changes with successive firings of the gun. The changes are most pronounced when the gun is new. Moreover, it is not difficult to intentionally disfigure the lands and grooves in the barrel to change the signature.

Third, barrels and firing pins can be replaced, creating a new signature that does not exist in anybody's database. Gun owners oppose registration because governments have a habit of changing the rules at some future date and using the database of gun owners to demand surrender of the newly banned guns. This is what happened in New York City. For 25 years, all rifles and shotguns were registered. The city's politicians insisted that crime fighting, not confiscation, was the goal. Then the law was changed, and many of the previously legal guns were on the prohibited list. Those that were not surrendered were confiscated during raids on owners'

homes using registration lists.

Opposition to registration is hardly the paranoia that gun control supporters want people to believe. Often these same gun control advocates are (rightly) suspicious of the government when Fourth Amendment rights, rather than Second Amendment rights, are involved. Many supporters of gun control (rightly) opposed the Patriot Act and Attorney General John Ashcroft's inability to limit his actions within constitutional boundaries. They do not call themselves paranoid when opposing the Patriot Act, which authorizes massive invasions of personal privacy. However, they call gun owners paranoid for opposing registration. Some proponents of keeping a registry of bullet signatures insist that this is not gun control, just a crime tool. If you study the debates over every piece of gun control legislation in the past, you will find the same argument being made.

Gun control has always been advanced as just crime control. But gun control costs lives, it does not save them.

BISBEE COUNCIL APPROVES CONTRACT FOR CITY MANAGER

BISBEE (October 9) – Last night, the Bisbee City Council approved a new three-year contract with Rob Yandow, the City Manager. "The new contract will assure greater continuity and stability at our chief administrative post," Mayor Dan Beauchamp said, "making it more likely that a good manager will be on the job for the critical years ahead."

The contract increases the severance pay in the event the city manager is removed, from the Charter's minimum of three months severance pay, to six months. The contract also increases the notice that the city manager gives to the City, should he desire to leave, from 30 days to 60 days, increasing the notice requirement from the manager's original hiring agreement. Both provisions are in the contract to provide incentives for continuity in stable, strong leadership at a time when the city is undergoing the \$276 million overhaul of its wastewater system.

The contract also permits the City Manager the use of his late-model City vehicle for personal use. The impact of this benefit will likely only cost the city an extra tank of gas a month, if that, Bisbee Mayor Beauchamp said. The agreement does not affect Mr. Yandow's salary, which currently is \$82,000. Also, the contract does not alter the fact that Mr. Yandow serves at will from the City Council.

The Contract with Mr. Yandow includes annual performance objectives for the upcoming year, objectives like updating and expanding the master economic plan, developing a management accountability program to assure completion of city tasks, and so forth.

Bisbee is a small city with infrastructure deficits that normally plague much larger cities, deficits that were the legacy of the closing of active mining operations. "We need to encourage strong leadership in our City Manager at this critical juncture of our history and that means bringing our Agreement with the City Manager closer to what other cities offer to attract and keep and keep strong, professional leadership."

Mr. Yandow came to Bisbee in March 2001, from Barre, Vt., where he served as City Manager. The contract with the City Manager was moved from the October 1 regular council meeting until Tuesday, October 8, to allow time to work out last minute details of the agreement.

avoided most communication with some writers researchers. I have had many people ask me what is going on with Tim? Why is the family screening and not responding to phone calls and mail?


Some of these writers helped your son with his research with leads and info, and he does not have the decency to even answer their calls and mail?













The State for Arizona has some of the best teachers in the nation. Arizona requires a continuing education for these teachers up to a master's degree, I believe. Now, in the federal sector and in the private sector, any employer that requires this continuing education must pay for it. However, the State of Arizona is not required to bear the cost of this required continuing education. Therefore, I think if the State of Arizona would give these teachers free tuition in their institutions of higher learning in which they are required to participate, that would help. Another thing that would help would be to standardize teacher pay across the State so that the teacher in Douglas or Tombstone would get the same pay as one in Paradise Valley or Scottsdale. One of the ways we can do that is take another step and standardize

the pay by a consistent pay scale. Now already these teachers retire under the Arizona State retirement system so I don't see why the State can't accept the pay scale. Now regarding the facilities, already we have the School Facilities Board in which the schools in rural areas like Tombstone are constructed with State funds. I understand that this has been a big drain on the State but I think that that should continue. And I think we should restore discipline to the classrooms, allow these teachers to maintain discipline themselves without the convoluted process when they get unruly students and appeals and so forth. Education in Arizona, actually anywhere, is a very important part of our future and I will do everything that I can to support that.

Mr. Alvarez

Thank you. As you know, the school system has always been one of the lowest paid employees in the county. What we need to do to encourage the teachers to relocate here is that we need to go in the process, of course the benefits is one thing. The teacher when he goes to school does not go to school for nothing. We've got to help him pay for that education that he receives, and another thing that we need to do is encourage him into helping this teacher when they come into the school to be supportive of them. Not just say, well, you know hey, you are on your own, take care of them, educate them, and throw them at the door. That is not the purpose. To get good schoolteachers, we need to support their income. That's the main thing, and I think that everybody knows the only way you are going to get it is through taxes. And I know everybody in here if there is a school bond to fix things, everybody would vote for it. So the education part locally is not that bad, we can support them, but we cannot pay those teachers up to the standards of Phoenix and Tucson. And I know that some of those teachers are willing to be relocated to come into these rural communities. We have a way of life here.

Representative Lugo

A couple nights ago, we attended a forum up in Ajo and exactly what you are saying now was being discussed there. Ajo is also in rural Arizona and it was at a school board session that the candidates that was running for school board were there and these questions were being asked: How are they going to entice people, teachers to come there? You know and that is a big problem. Next year I already have a bill in process that I will introduce that any student from Arizona, that will teach in rural Arizona, I was thinking the bill would say anywhere in Arizona, but I think I will specifically say in rural Arizona if a school teacher graduates from college and wants to teach in rural Arizona and they sign up through your contract the State will forgive 50 per cent of their student loan. If they will go two more years that's 25 per cent and if they go two more years then we'll forgive 100 per cent of their student loan. I know a lot of people I have said that before and they say Arizona is in a budget crunch, how are you going to pay for this? Well, I advocate that we look at some of these tax loopholes that we are experiencing right now. If we were to address them we could get up to 5 billion dollars on it, and if we could get that money out of Arizona it would pay for the bill that I am trying to stretch right now. Even so that we don't do that, how much is the price of a child? I think that we can go in there and cut other places and get the money to fund what I said, because I don't think that we can put a price on the education of our future.

An inspection of the erties does not contradict, pursuant A.R.S. 42-12152, the Assessor's decision to revoke AG status, as the "primary use" of these parcels is for development and sale, while the grazing use is an ancillary benefit while the lots are being marketed. Also utilized and uncontradicted was the 3-part test used by the Assessor's office in order to determine whether to remove land from AG status, which is based on: 1) the land survey creating individual subdivided lots has been recorded, 2) on site development has taken place, and 3) clearance to sell has been obtained from the Real Estate Department. Further discussion ensued with regard to the property owner's request/entitlement for AG status, to which Ms. Ann Littrell, Deputy County Attorney, explained that the action before the Board does not meet the statutory definition of an "objectively verifiable error" pursuant to A.R.S. 16251(E); therefore, the request for AG status can not be considered as that would require judgment/discretion as to whether the land is actually being used for grazing until each parcel is actually sold. A motion was made by Supervisor Thompson and seconded by Supervisor Newman to unhold the Assessor's decision to deny agricultural status for Parcel Nos. 121-01-007 through 121-01-042, as the claim does not meet the statutory definition of an objectively verifiable error pursuant to A.R.S. 42-16251. The motion carried by a vote of two to one. Result of the motion: Supervisor Call, yes; Supervisor Newman, yes; Supervisor Thompson, no.

There is no accepted cation frequency available to coordinate incident response within the border area nor is their common licensing to operate on compatible frequencies

Ø Inspections must be done on emergency

vehicles when crossing the Border into either country A solution is needed to expedite inspections to cross either side of the Border.

Mr. Carper mentioned that a possible solution could be an umbrella coverage by the state and/or federal government for emergency personnel and equipment. Mr. Frank Moro, voiced his opposition to the Hearing Officer's decision for: Parcel No. 106-70-135 -Comparable sales used by the County Assessor are not similar to the subject property, as the building was the second to the oldest of all the comparable properties, in worst condition, and the highest value by nearly 100%. Requesting that the Assessor use comparable buildings, same side of Fry, or comparable buildings with comparable use such as Long John Silver, Rigaberto's/Rodolfo's Taco, etc. for a reduction of \$49.00 per square foot, Full Cash Value of \$127,592. Parcel No. 105-16-001P - Comparable sales used by the Assessor are not comparable to the subject property as the uses, design, and construction are entirely different. Requesting a Full Cash Value of \$532,720, which is \$120,720 more than the value, which can be justified. Parcel No. 105-06-020C - The subject property is an apartment complex, which was converted to affordable with approximately 2.22 acres split off to Calvary. The property was then purchased for \$250,000 with a grant of \$115,000 from DOC. Requesting a Full Cash Value of \$250,000 to reflect secondary improvements/renovations. Mr. Phillip Leiendecker, County Assessor, recommended the following: Parcel No. 106-70-135 - Reviewed property and explained that comparable #1 is valued per A.R.S. 42-13203, Comparable #2 is listed with greater depreciation due Comparables #3 and #4 were not comparable due to the fact that they are listed as full service restaurants. All land values are valued at \$4.00 per square foot along Fry Boulevard. Recommended no change. Parcel No. 105-16-001P - Square footage was reduced from 14,977 to 14,759 based on computerized calculations of perimeter dimensions. Equity improvement comparable listed on petition at \$28 a square foot is a strip store and is not comparable to a business office. Recommended no change as sales and equity of office building support 2003 valuation. Parcel No. 106-68-148 - Income approach indicates a valuation of \$243,440 Recommended no change as current valuation is considered to be more equitable pending market based revaluation of medium size apartment complexes. Parcel No 105-06-020C - Market analysis indicates a valuation of \$17,600 per unit to be appropriate. Recommended no change, as the sale price of \$400,000 was considered valid due to the fact that the seller received this amount at closing. A motion was made by Supervisor Newman and seconded by Supervisor Thompson to uphold all of the Hearing Officer decisions made on August 20, 2002 except for those decisions made on Parcels No. 106-58-148 and 106-70-135 in order to allow further research. The motion unanimously carried.

PLANNING AND ZONING

ITEM 19 - DOCKET CP-02-03, RESOLUTION NO. 02 76 AMENDING THE COCHISE COUNTY COM-PREHENSIVE PLAN SECTION 102.1.E GOAL AND POLICIES - TABLED ITEM -- Planner Mark Apel explained that in December, 2001, the Planning Commission recommended that the Board approved some minor changes to the water policies in the Comprehensive Plan. These revisions are meant to bring the policies up to date to better reflect the recent efforts of the County to address water issues County-wide and in the Sierra Vista watershed. These changes were advertised in all the major County newspapers and a public hearing was held on July 18, 2002 to present these changes Additionally the proposed changes were posted on the County website for the public to peruse The public feedback was minimal. Some of the major nronosed revisions are listed below

(Language changes are printed in bold.)

Sustain an adequate, safe water supply through water conservation measures; incentive proural recharge areas; and cooperative multi-jurisdictional planning

ents: Water is a limited and limiting resource throughout the County but certain areas face more immediate issues. Arizona Revised Statues 11-821.C (3) allows all counties to specifically plan for development as it relates to available water resources

POLICIES:

The County will use its most current water resources inventory of available surface water, groundwater, and effluent supplies to evaluate the potential impacts to local water supplies from master development plans, rezoning, special uses, major amendments to this plan and other major developments

County will pursue methods for individual homeowners and businesses to decrease water use through incentives, education and various zoning mechanisms.

In order to minimize or mitigate water usage, golf courses and other high water uses shall be permitted only as Special Uses.

The County shall implement a joint development plan for the Sierra Vista Sub-watershed, or portions therefore, through intergovernmental agreements and a joint planning effort with those incorporated cities of the Sub watershed that choose to participate, pursuant to ARS 9-461.11 and ARS 11-951. The joint development plan shall address water issues that may include existing and proposed mechanisms for conserving water, vested property rights, incentive programs, implementation schedules, and other issues as they

relate to development in the sub-watershed. The County may implement joint development plans for other basins, sub-watersheds, or portions thereof, as necessary.

The County will work with agencies and organizations throughout the County, as necessary, to address regional water resources issues as they relate to growth and protection of the County's natural resources. Supervisor Thompson made a motion, which was seconded by Supervisor Newman, to adopt Resolution No. 02-76. The motion unanimously carried

DEVELOPMENT PLANS, PLANNED DEVELOP-MENT ZONING DISTRICT, CITIZEN REVIEW PROCESS, NOTIFICATION, AND WATER CONSER-VATION SITE DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS -TABLED ITEM -- Senior Planner Mark Apel explained that Master Development Plans (MDP) are useful tool for both developers and County Planners to obtain con-sensus and agreement on the way an area is developed. MDP's differ from site plans as they address the "bigger picture" rather the minutia of a detailed site plan. It is the goal of the Planning Commission and the Planning Department to enhance both the public's ability to propose large scaled, well planned development projects in the rural area and the Commission's and the Board's ability to evaluate the issues associated with such projects. Consequently, a number of changes are being proposed to simplify the process and still provide good planning for the County. Some of the triggers which might require an MDP could be:

 A proposed change of an existing Growth Category D, Rural Area designation, to be applicable to an area that is not contiguous to an existing Growth Category A, B, or C area.

A proposed zoning amendment for ten acres or more, if the amendment includes multiple zoning districts and a mixture of new residential and nonresidential zoning districts;

A proposed zoning amendment that includes a Planned Development (PD) Zoning District 4. A proposed rezoning to Heavy Industry in a Category D area that has the potential to include more than one principal use
5. A proposed major amendment to the

Comprehensive Plan that is submitted for the purpose of authorizing one or more developing projects

Another proposed revision would delete the current provision that if the Board of Supervisors take an action on a master development plan which is substantially different that the Commission's recommendation, this issue must be revisited by the Commission. By deleting this provision, the approval or denial of a MDP and a PD Zoning District by the Board is consistent with the authority given to the Board by statutes. The proposed changes were advertised in all the local newspapers a public hearing was held on July 18, 2002 to these changes. The public also could view these amendments on the County's web page. Very little feedback was received from the public. Mr. Apel mentioned that under the Growing Smarter Statute (11-829B), the Board of Supervisors is mandated to hold a public hearing for each rezoning application and special use applications. The notification range would be 1,500 feet in Category D and 300 feet in all other categories or half the width of the subject property whichever is greater. The Board mentioned that in the County 300 ft could mean that one or two property owners would receive notification of a project, which could affect an entire neighborhood. Consequently, the Board requested that the Planning Department review this notification limit with the goal to increase it. This item was tabled until Monday, September 9, 2002.
