- During the late 1800s, many cities were run by a political machine
- Maintained their control by providing aid to citizens in exchange for political support
- Graft: The illegal use of political influence for personal gain
 - Municipal: city government
- Boss Tweed: powerful political boss of New York whose political machine was known as Tammany Hall
- What did cartoons like this lead to?



Civil Service Reform

- Garfield wanted change
- Arthur was a Stalwart- wanted to keep PATRONAGE
- The Pendleton Civil Service Act (1883):
 - It established the Civil Service Commission to make appointments to federal jobs on the basis of competitive examinations (merit) rather than "pull."




Rise of Big Business

- Why was steel so important?
- Bessemer Process
- Vertical Integration:
 - Control production and distribution processes
- Horizontal Integration:
 - Buy out or merge with their competitors



Labor Unions Grow

- Terrible working conditions leads to the rise of labor unions
- Samuel Gompers focuses on higher wages and better working conditions to develop the largest labor union in America
- Conflict between labor and management led to strikes




The West Changes

- Wounded Knee- the culmination of the US government's military operations against native peoples
 - Native Americans are generally defeated
- The Dawes Act breaks up tribal property and gives it to private individuals- supposed to farm and assimilate



The West Changes


- The Populist Party gains support from farmers
- Improvements in technology led to overproduction of crops- caused the price of crops to drop and farmers were struggling to make a profit
- William Jennings Bryan ran as a populist candidate
- Lost to McKinley- McKinley had the support in the cities with big business
- Cities now look like the future of America- not the western frontier

- Immigrants, farmers, and African Americans are moving to cities for a fresh start
- Settlement houses worked with meeting the needs of immigrants
- Social Gospel Movement growspreach salvation through service to the poor
