Capstone Pilot Program

The year, both Lyman Hall High School and Sheehan High School are piloting a Capstone Experience. The schools are currently running a semester course for the group of thirty-three juniors who were selected for the pilot. At the end of the course, the goal for each student is to have an approved Capstone Proposal and Action Plan. Students are being exposed to skills during the course that they will use towards successfully completing the Capstone Experience, and ultimately will need for their post-high school experience. The skills are centered on research, communication, problem solving, and writing. At the close of the first semester, students will be "on their own" to finish the implementation of their selected project. There will be periodic check-ins with their Capstone teachers and mentors for progress monitoring. The projects will be due in April and will conclude with a presentation to various faculty members, parents, community members, and other students.

Each student has a unique project and their end result will be in one of four categories: improving a system, building a product, writing an investigative composition, or planning an activity or event. All students will be immersed in various forms of research, making connections within the community, and producing a formal presentation.

The students from both high schools took a field trip to the HubCap in November to meet each other, discuss their topic ideas, and learn about the opportunities that the HubCap can offer to enhance their projects.

A Capstone Committee was formed at the beginning of last school year to plan for the pilot and the full Capstone Experience. This group of dedicated teachers meet on a regular basis to address needs of the course, re-evaluate the experience, and discuss its future. The group met at the beginning of December 2014 to read Letters of Intent from each student in regard to their proposed Capstone Experience. The group provided feedback and determined whether the student was set to forge ahead or if he or she needed to refine the scope of the project before continuing to the next step. In the process, the group began to form a common set of expectations around the many options available to students

The committee will continue to meet to discuss the progress of the pilot and to determine what Capstone will be next school year.

Winter Concerts

On Tuesday December 9th, the 7th and 8th grade choruses and bands performed their winter concert selections in the Fred E. Rossomando auditorium at Moran Middle School. The 7th grade chorus sang traditional arrangements; holiday favorites and an acapella version of the Lion Sleeps Tonight The 7th grade band played a similar selection as well as the pop favorite "Happy". The 8th grade concert followed in similar fashion with the highlights being "All I Want for Christmas is You" sung by the chorus and a medley of songs from Frozen performed by the band.

On Wednesday December 10th, the 6th grade band and chorus performed their winter concert at Sheehan High School's auditorium followed be a second concert which included the String Ensemble, Varsity Choir and Jazz Band. Of particular note was the acapella song "Yonder Come Day" by the 6th grade chorus and the Varsity Choirs' independent break away quintet singing as arrangement by Pentatonix.

Mastery Based Teaching and Learning

The three words of the district this year, Lead, Learn and Leverage are coming to life as we continue our journey as a district to move to a Mastery Based Teaching and Learning system. This fall through the continued collaboration with Great Schools Partnership from Maine, nearly 200 staff members have had the opportunity to learn firsthand about what this system of teaching and learning means. Through the coordination of our Great Schools coach, Jon Ingram, various K-12 staff, along with parents and Board members, have all engaged in this first step, learning.

As we begin the new year, Jon Ingram will continue his work with our district in the development of competencies in all content areas that span PreK-12. This work will be guided by the newly formed District Leadership Team which will be comprised of PreK-12 administrators, teachers, parents and the end consumer, our students. So what is a competency? What might this mean?

The table below shows the competency learning progressions that students are expected to demonstrate mastery of in mathematics but specifically in the domain of Numbers & Base Ten

Through this mastery based work, which will be a process and a journey, not a race, the outcomes will be a change in practices in how we teach, how we assess and allow students to demonstrate mastery and ultimately, higher achievement and engagement for all of our students.

The picture above is another graphic view of how this all fits together. At the pinnacle of the triangle you see graduation standards that will span PreK-12; these will be developed with our staff through the second half of the 2014-2015 school year; graduation standards are the content that is essential for students to know and be able to demonstrate; again this will be developed locally by our staff. Performance indicators and unit based learning objectives are where our curriculum documents will highlight the expected outcomes for students.

Imagine a system where all students, regardless of their grade, age or ability, are taught the competencies they need to be able to demonstrate mastery; imagine a system where time is the variable and learning is the constant; imagine a system where learning is personalized and all learners are engaged; imagine a system where learning occurs anytime, anywhere. Imagine the possible; Wallingford Public Schools for the future.

Season for Giving

The start of November marked the beginning of the Titan Pride giving season at Sheehan High School. In conjunction with the town of Wallingford's Holiday for Giving Campaign, students and teachers from Sheehan collected canned food for the annual food drive, raked leaves in the community on Veteran's Day, and are currently collecting toys for the annual Toy Drive run by the National Honor Society.

Throughout November the Sheehan community collected a total of 4,851 cans for this year's canned food drive. *Mr. Lombardozzi's* period 2A took first place and brought in a total of 649 cans. *Mr. Smolley's* period 2A class came in a close second with 508 total cans collected. The students at Sheehan showed how dedicated and thoughtful they are and did a tremendous job of promoting the food drive and collecting the cans to make a difference in the lives of people in Wallingford.

On November 11th, approximately 75 students and 12 teachers volunteered their time and raked leaves for the Wallingford community. They were able to get to 8 houses and used well over 500 bags in order to collect the leaves. Sheehan's Student Council, National Honors Society, all class officers, and others were part of the 75 people who made up the student group. Faculty members Dom Lombardozzi, Kevin Ainsworth, Dan Wostbrock, Johann Rene, Josh Lambert, Jean Mellor, Carrie Hawkins, Christina Brozyna, Susan Hudson, Carrie Palange, Mike Tyrrell, and Heather Brinton rounded out the teacher group. It was a great collaborative effort between students and teachers and highlighted the core values of Sheehan High School.

Lastly, the National Honor Society, advised by *Heather Brinton*, and the Sheehan community are taking part in a toy drive to support Wallingford's Holiday for Giving program. Around forty toys will be dropped off at the school and brought by Sheehan's Peer Advocates to the Holiday for Giving distribution at the Wallingford Grange. This annual event shows how caring and dedicated the students and staff are to making sure Wallingford's children can all have something to look forward to this holiday season.

As we enter the new year, Titan Pride will be in full effect as we march into the second half of the school year and toward all of the Spring events that make Sheehan a special place to learn and work.
