Principal's Letter

Dear Parents,

I was hoping to start this letter on a positive note about another winter with minor disruptions. Thanks to Nemo/Charlotte I can't! I hope that you all fared well in survival mode! Let's keep our fingers crossed for March coming in like a lamb and leaving as a lamb.

March Madness, not basketball, is once again upon us. On March 5, 6,7,12,13,18,19 and 20 all sophomores will be taking the Connecticut Academic Performance Test (CAPT). CAPT scores are a part of Daniel Hand High School's graduation requirements (see the Program of Studies) and are also used as a measure for the high school program overall. Please note that on March 5, 6,7,12 and 13 CAPT testing will begin promptly at 7:25 a.m. On time arrival is extremely important. On March 18, 19, and 20 freshmen, juniors, and seniors will be taking trimester exams while the sophomores are taking CAPT. On those three days both CAPT testing and trimester exams will begin promptly at 7:45 a.m. Trimester exams end at 12:15 p.m.; however, CAPT testing will end at 9:15 a.m. on Monday and Tuesday and at 8:45 a.m. on Wednesday. The exam bus schedule allows for only one pick up and that is at 12:15 p.m. Sophomores may certainly remain in the school dining hall and wait for the bus. However, they are officially dismissed from school at the completion of their CAPT exam, so you may pick up your child following the exam. Please insure that your child has a good night's sleep and breakfast before taking these very important tests.

Scheduling for next year is in progress. The appropriate placement of students in selected courses is very important. Teachers have made recommendations that are in the best interest of your child, taking into consideration an academic review of their abilities. Should you have any questions, please contact the referring teacher and/or school counselor. Keep in mind that once schedules have been put in place, it is difficult to make changes.

I am very saddened by the events of Sandy Hook. The losses they have suffered I cannot even begin to imagine. Much consideration has been given by our Superintendent and the town in looking at what security we have in place and addressing necessary changes. The goal is overall student safety. Accordingly, we began the process of prohibiting movement from one building to another under the bridge. From our perspective, and that of the student leadership team, this did not create any major concerns in terms of congestion in moving from one building to another. Beginning on February 25 all doors into the building will be locked at 8:40 a.m. Upon arrival at school you will find located to the left of the double entry door a security buzzer. Please push the button and upon recognition give your name and business in the school. You will then be provided entry. In the event that you are sending a grandparent or neighbor to the school to drop off an item or pick

After going through a rigorous audition process in November, these students rehearsed for two days with other students from southern Connecticut, culminating in a performance on Saturday afternoon. In addition to working with renowned conductors, these musicians had the opportunity to perform collegiatelevel literature with other top musicians from the southern part of the state. Students who participated in the festival will now have the opportunity to audition for the All State Festival which will take place in Hartford in April.

Senior Ian Richardson was selected to rehearse and perform with the All Eastern Honors Band at the 53rd Eastern Division Biennial In-Service Conference in April. Athletic News

The winter season is just about to draw to a close and we are very proud of the work our athletes have done.

The wrestling team competed in the Class L State Championships on February 15 and 16 and finished in 5th place. The gymnastics team, four-time defending SCC Champions will compete in the CIAC State Open on March 2. On February 23, the gymnastics team won the Class M State Championship with a score of 139.275 points. **Fencing** has been impressive in setting the groundwork for the State Championships in early March. Unified BB has been keeping ahead of the weather and making their mark. The girls' basketball team won the first round qualifier vs. Kennedy on 2/25/13 and will proceed to the second round next week. **Ski team** members placed fifth in its first race on January 10th against 12 other high schools. The **boys' basketball team** qualified and will play in the State Tournament starting next week vs. Career. The boys' and girls' indoor track teams competed in the Class L State Championship on February 15 with the boys' finishing in the top 10. The boys' swim team competed in the SCC qualifier on 2/25/13 and will compete in the SCC meet next week. The boys' ice hockey team will compete in the SCC Division II Championship on 2/27/13 and also qualified for the State Tournament starting next week. The **cheerleading** team placed fourth out of the 15 teams at the SCC cheerleading competition this year.

Reminders for the New Year



- √ Students requesting an **early dismissal from school** must bring a note from home stating the reason for leaving school early. Notes should be presented to the attendance secretary upon arrival at school. At that time the student will be issued an early dismissal slip, which must be signed by teachers and returned to the attendance secretary before leaving school. Parents are asked to call the attendance secretary at 203 245-6355 in the morning of the dismissal to confirm the note. Parents are also urged to request an early dismissal only in cases of pressing family business. Seniors only have the privilege of leaving school early after their last class of the day. Trimester early dismissal forms for seniors are available in the Main Office and must be signed by a parent and approved by a school administrator each trimester. For trimester 3 juniors who meet the criteria in the DHHS Student Handbook can also apply for a daily early dismissal.
- √ First period classes begin at 7:25 a.m. followed by period 2 attendance at 8:29 a.m. Juniors and seniors, who do not have scheduled first time block classes and who have their own transportation, must be in school by 8:15 a.m. Please help us by being certain that students are on time.
- Parents of students who are absent are required to call the school at 203 245-6355 between 7:00 and 10:00 a.m. each day the student is absent. This procedure also applies to students who will be tardy to school or who require an early dismissal.
- Students who are **tardy to school** must arrive at school prior to 9:00 a.m. All excused tardies must be for a valid reason and must be verified by a parent. Oversleeping is not considered a valid reason for tardiness. To be eligible to participate in an athletic or other after school activity, a student must be present for a minimum of four hours.

The Daniel Hand Library Media Center now has a fully functional e-book/ audiobook system that is fully integrated with its online catalog and is accessible from home and school. E-books are now offered through two systems, Follett Shelf and Overdrive. Follett Shelf is limited to e-books that can be read on tablets, certain digital readers, laptops, or desktop computers. Overdrive offers both e-books and audiobooks and is compatible with all the above devices as well as mobile devices such as iPhones, Android phones, and other smartphones. With the addition of a student Wi-Fi network, these audio and e-books are easily accessible from anywhere in the school at any time. The LMC also plans to add titles from the upcoming Summer Reading List to either Overdrive or Follett Shelf. ST of CT Mandated Screenings:

As mandated by the State of Connecticut, the Health Office staff conducted *vision screening* for 9th grade students and *hearing screening* for 10th grade students. Parents of ninth grade students will be notified regarding *scoliosis screening* which will be conducted before the end of the 2012-2013 school year.

Connecticut State law requires each student in **grade 10 to have a physical examination** (PE) by a physician, APRN, DO, or PA. All areas that are noted with an asterisk (*) must be completed by the provider. Hemoglobin or Hematocrit is required. *Tenth grade* **physical examinations are due before entry to the eleventh grade.** Forms are available in the DHHS Health Office and your provider's office.
