Kennedy Student Journalists Win Again!

Kennedy students captured three 2008 New England Scholastic Press Association Journalism Awards Friday at the 60th annual conference at Boston University. The entire Eagle Flyer newspaper staff won the 2008 Highest Achievement Journalism

Award in Scholastic Editing and Publishing for Class I (schools with 1,000 plus students) for their body of work during the past year. In addition, students won two 2008 News Writing Awards: one for a story on retiring principal Mr. Azzara, and another

on the new suspension law. Kennedy has now captured 31 journalism awards since the newspaper was reinvented in 2004.
