Course Description:

In Honor's World Literature, students will come to understand what it takes to ensure success in higher-level courses. This syllabus reinforces the reasoning and analytical skills required for a continued success in the Merit Program. The purpose of the units is to provide students with rich, multi-genre and multi-media resources that challenge students to read, to think, to analyze, and to write critically. The literature choices in all four units will be related by focusing on historically based world literature with a balance of traditional and contemporary Young Adult literature. Students will study how the structure of language helps to promote and expand the ideas behind literature, both writing, speaking, and listening. The course will also incorporate grammar, vocabulary, research and writing.
