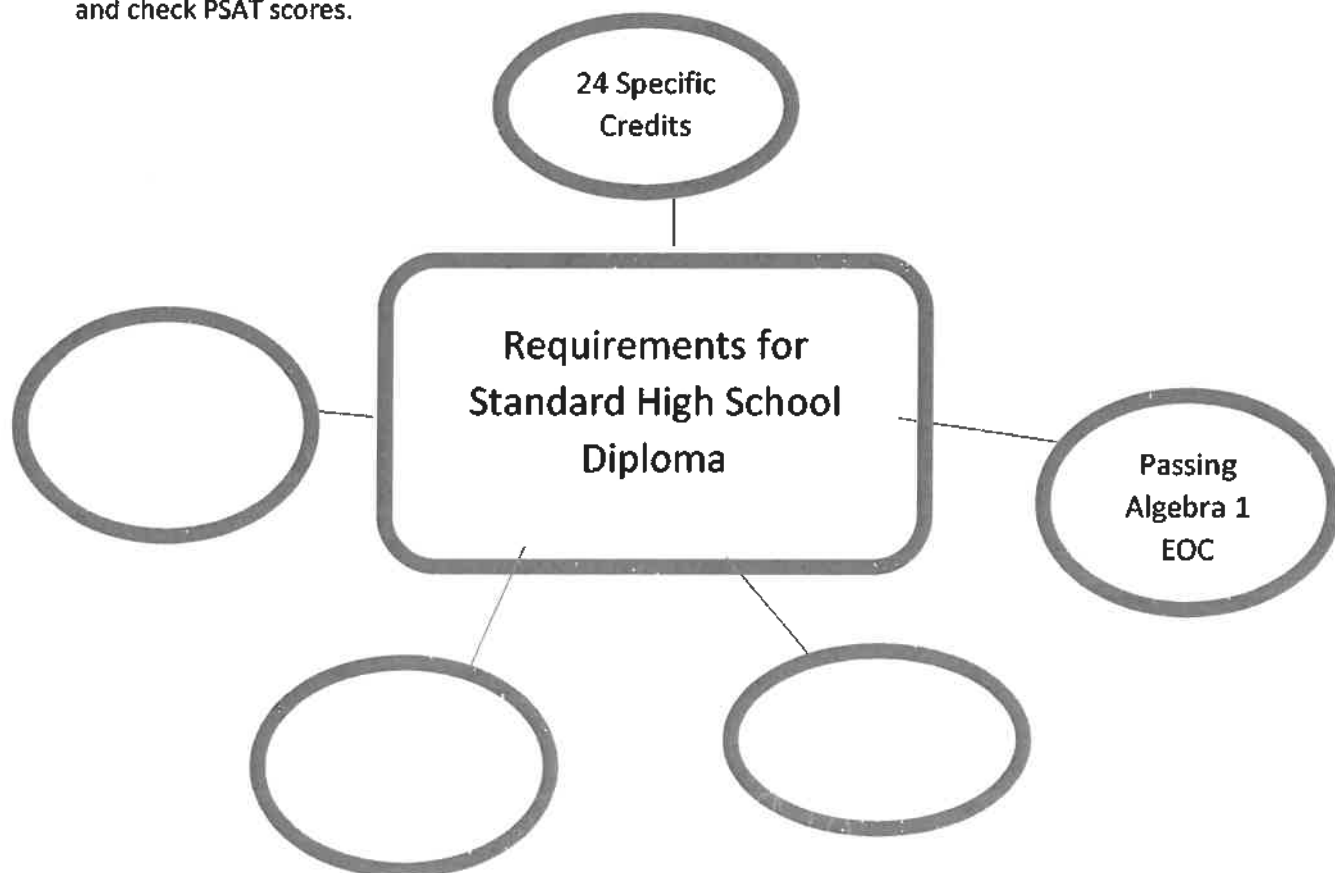

- Start thinking about life after high school, talk to people about careers you might find interesting.
- Look for a summer job, internship or volunteer position to help you learn about your field of interest.

10th Grade

11th Grade - FALL

- If applicable, register for PSAT at your school (cost – about \$20). Take the PSAT in October.
- Participate in test prep for ACT/SAT.
- If interested in going into the military, make sure you talk to a recruiter and take the Armed Forces Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB).
- Contact your counselor about eligibility for ACT/SAT fee waivers (free and reduced lunch as well as several other criteria).
- Register for ACT and/or SAT for the spring (check current costs on website) www.act.org, and www.collegeboard.org Make sure to use your school code so results come to your school - 100809

11th Grade - SPRING

- Research post-secondary institutions and programs of study to aid in senior year course selection.
- Registration in January through pre-scheduled appointments.
- Order a transcript; check for errors and needed credits.
- Take the SAT and/or ACT – SEND SCORES TO AT LEAST ONE SCHOOL IN FLORIDA for Bright Futures purposes.
- Complete and submit community service hours
- Visit college campuses – set an appointment with the admissions office and notify Ms. Johns to have absence excused.

Summer Before Senior Year

- Complete online courses.
- Visit college campuses.
- Work on community service hours.
- Submit all schedule change requests before school begins. After 21 days a withdraw from any course will be posted on the transcript as a WP or a WF.

Senior Year, Semester 2

- Check transcript for accuracy.
- Complete any missing graduation requirements.
- Check your Bright Futures Eligibility; update with accurate institution information.
- Apply to state colleges.
- Apply for scholarships.
- Request a final transcript be sent to your post-secondary institution

Parchment & Ordering Transcripts

- All transcript requests MUST be submitted in Parchment at
<https://www.parchment.com/u/registration/9276/account>
- All transcripts are loaded in Parchment EACH SEMESTER.
- Download a free PDF of the transcript to review.
- Transcripts show the cumulated weighted and unweighted GPA, class rank, letter grades and service hours.

Grade Forgiveness

- Students can retake classes in which they earned a D or F.
- All grades appear on the transcript. Forgiven grades will still show but will not be included in GPA calculation.
- Juniors should complete grade forgiveness before the beginning of their senior year.
- Options for grade recovery: St. Johns Virtual School and Florida Virtual school (flvs.net) and/or the APEX lab at school during a class period.

SAT and ACT

- Students register online (sat.org and act.org).
- Registration deadlines are usually a month before the test date.

Community Service Hours

- Must be a NON-PROFIT organization.
- Documented on letterhead with the number of hours worked, description, contact signature, parent and student signature.

Submit to Mrs. Richards in the Guidance office.

Financial Aid

- Federal Aid – FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid); www.fafsa.gov ; opens October 1st of senior year
- State of Florida Aid – Bright Futures; www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org ; opens October 1st of senior year
- Institutional Aid – Apply via the college/university you will attend.
- Private Aid – free money from organizations interested in helping students; scholarship opportunities are on the Guidance page of the BTHS website, check your (or your parent's) place of employment; corporations, local businesses, fastweb.com, finaid.org, collegenet.com, bigfuture.collegeboard.org

Bright Futures

- You must APPLY for Bright Futures by submitting the Florida Financial Aid Application.
- Read over the Bright Futures Student Handbook.
- Know the requirements for the Florida Academic Scholar and the Florida Medallion Scholar.
- Bright Futures GPA is NOT the same as the transcript GPA. Honors, AP and dual enrollment classes are weighed equally with 0.5 per credit (not 1.0 for AP or DE). Two academic electives will be accepted toward the GPA if it benefits the student.

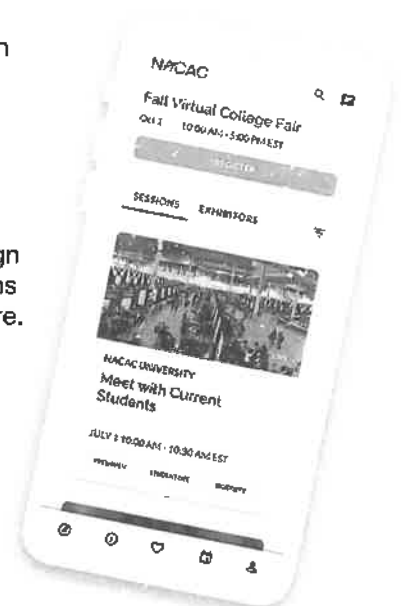

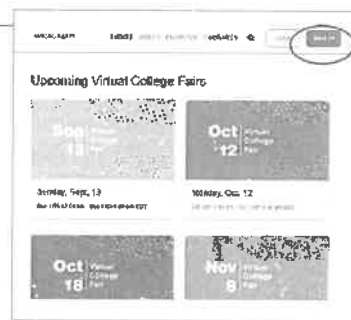
Quick Start Guide for Students

Thinking about college? Sign up now at virtualcollegefairs.org and start exploring! Then, on each fair date, you can drop in on Zoom sessions offered by more than 600 colleges to listen, connect, and ask questions.

1. Sign Up

Don't wait until the day of the fair! Go to virtualcollegefairs.org ahead of time and click the "Sign Up" button. (If you signed up previously, click "Log In").

Fill out the sign-up form. As a final step, pick the virtual fairs you'd like to attend—Sept. 13, Oct. 12, Oct. 18, or Nov. 8. Click "Register" for each.



2. Zoom

Do you have Zoom on your device? If not, please download it ahead of time.

3. List of Colleges

Several days before each fair begins, log in and take a look around. Click the "Colleges" tab to see which colleges will be at the fair.

You can sort the list by A-Z or Z-A. If you already have a college in mind, search for it by name.

The "Filter" is really helpful. This is how you can narrow your results by location, majors offered, and other criteria. Once you find a college that interests you, use the ♥ to add it to your "Favorites" list.

4. List of Live Sessions

On the day of the virtual fair, colleges will offer live Zoom sessions you can attend.

Click the "Live Sessions" tab. You'll see literally hundreds of sessions to choose from!

Because there are so many, it's best if you look through the sessions before the fair date. Use "Filter" to narrow your results. Or click "Show Schedule" to see sessions by start time. Pro Tip: Colleges located on the East Coast will offer their sessions towards the beginning of the fair while colleges on the West Coast will offer sessions towards the end.

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5. Log In, Day Of

Yay, it's the day of the fair! Log in on Sept. 13, Oct. 12, Oct. 18, or Nov. 8.

Each fair is eight hours long. There's no need to stay the whole day—instead, plan your time using the reminders you added to “My Schedule.”

Note: Some sessions are popular and will fill up quickly. When a session is about to start, be sure to click the “Join Now” button that will appear.

6. Watch Videos


At any time (not just during a fair), you can click on “Videos” to watch videos each college has posted. Use “Filter” to narrow your choices.

7. Schedule a Meeting

Another option is to meet one-on-one with a college's admission representative. This is great if you missed a session or have specific questions to ask. To do so, go to a college's profile page, click “Schedule a Meeting,” and then pick a date and time (if available). You'll receive text reminders and the meeting will be added to “My Schedule.”



8. Get Advice

During each virtual fair, you can click on the blue chat  button for advice. This will connect you to a college advising expert from NACAC. (NACAC is the worldwide association for counseling and admission professionals—we're happy to help!).

9. Attend a NACAC Meet-Up

Dual Enrollment Frequently Asked Questions

What is dual enrollment?

*Students are earning high school credit and college credit at the same time, for free**

**paid for by SJCS D*

What types of dual enrollment can a student participate in?

Traditional dual enrollment, early admissions, and collegiate high school. The qualifications for all three types of dual enrollment are the same. The deadline and process for submitting the dual enrollment packet to take courses at SJRSC are the same for all three types of dual enrollment.

What is Early Admissions?

Early Admissions (college credit) an admission status, which is a form of dual enrollment, that allows a secondary student to enroll full-time (minimum of 12 credit hours) in courses that are creditable toward the high school diploma and the associate degree. The early admission program is limited to students who have completed a minimum of six semesters of full-time secondary enrollment and who meet all other admission criteria required of dual enrollment students. If students choose this option during senior year, they cannot take classes on the BT HS campus.

What is Collegiate High School?

St. Johns County creates an opportunity for a cohort of eligible students to enroll in college level classes and earn their Associate in Arts degree, all while still enrolled in high school -

http://www.sjrstate.edu/collegiate_hs_stjohns.html . If students choose this option, they cannot take classes on the BT HS campus during senior year.

Is there a maximum number of courses students can take?

Traditional Dual Enrollment students may take a maximum of ten (10) Dual Enrollment credit hours in the fall term, ten (10) Dual Enrollment credit hours in the spring term, and six (6) to eight (8) Dual Enrollment credit hours (a maximum of 2 courses total) for the summer term. Early admission Dual Enrollment students must take a minimum of twelve (12) and a maximum of sixteen (16) Dual Enrollment credit hours each fall and spring term. If a student is participating in a BT HS dual enrollment course, this is counted in the total maximum.

Can 9th graders participate in dual enrollment?

Per the St. Johns River State College & St. Johns County School District Articulation Agreement, "The St. Johns County School District and St. Johns River State College agree that eligible secondary students are entitled to participate in dual enrollment for a maximum of three years in college credit coursework at the 1000 and 2000 level."

What is FERPA?

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law that affords parents the right to have access to their children's education records, the right to seek to have the records amended, and the right to have some control over the disclosure of personally identifiable information from the education records. When a student turns 18 years old, or enters a postsecondary institution at any age, the rights under FERPA transfer from the parents to the student ("eligible student"). The FERPA statute is found at 20 U.S.C. § 1232g and the FERPA regulations are found at 34 CFR Part 99.

Do parents have access to the students dual enrollment course grades?

No. Students are expected to handle all communication because they are considered a college student. No one at SJRSC, including students' professors (teachers), can communicate with parents per the FERPA law.

Dual Enrollment Frequently Asked Questions

Can parents conference with/correspond with the students college professors?

No. Students are expected to handle all communication because they are considered a college student. No one at SJRSC, including students' professors (teachers), can communicate with parents per the FERPA law.

What if students have accommodations?

The student will need to work with the SJRSC Disabilities Services office to determine what accommodations, if any, can be used in college classes.

Are dual enrollment courses 'watered down' to fit the needs of high school students?

No. These courses are adult level courses and students should have not only the academic maturity, but the social/emotional maturity to handle adult content matter and academic responsibilities.

What's the impact of dual enrollment?

Dual enrollment is the start of a college transcript. Dual enrollment grades will follow students forever, which can impact admittance to college/university, acceptance into the students major, and enrollment in graduate school. Doing poorly in dual enrollment courses may also negatively impact financial aid.

What are the homework/study time expectations of dual enrollment?

2-3 hours of homework for each hour spent in class

How will students know when off campus (at SJRSC) dual enrollment applications and registration forms are available?

Students should pay attention to morning announcements, Schoology, the remind text messages from the school counselors, and the website

How will students be informed of all dual enrollment deadlines?

Students should pay attention to morning announcements, Schoology, the remind text messages from the school counselors, and the website

Do students have to re-register for dual enrollment each term?

Yes, a complete and accurate course Registration/Approval form must be submitted by the published deadline for every term the student would like to participate in dual enrollment. Students do not need to complete a new APPLICATION for the college each term. GPA requirement must be met each term. Students should pay attention to morning announcements, Schoology, the remind text messages from the school counselors (directions attached), and the website for deadlines each term

Can the high school counselor help students plan for their AA degree?

High school counselors will advise students for high school graduation and how dual enrollment courses will impact high school graduation. High school counselors cannot advise on AA degree requirements or pre-requisites needed for intended majors. However, SJRSC advisors can help with that, once a student is enrolled in their first dual enrollment course. Dual Enrollment Frequently Asked Questions

How do students choose courses to take at SJRSC?

Students should be extremely intentional when choosing dual enrollment courses to be sure they are getting pre-requisite credits needed for their college major. Students should research courses needed to complete their Bachelors degree at their intended university, then work backwards from there when choosing dual enrollment courses.

How do students choose the times/dates/locations of courses to take at SJRSC?

The students BTHS schedule cannot be changed to accommodate SJRSC dual enrollment courses. Students can view the course availability for SJRSC courses to determine the time/dates/location of dual enrollment courses at SJRSC: <http://www.sjrst.edu/courses.html>

What if students want to drop/add/withdraw from a college course after the deadlines?

The high school counselor must approve any changes in college courses so they can make sure the student is still taking the necessary graduation requirements. If students receive a D, F, or W students will not be eligible to take more dual enrollment courses.

What kind of high school credit will a student earn with a college course?

If students take classes at SJRSC, do they need a parking decal?

Yes. Dual Enrollment students must have an SJR State parking permit. Log into your "MySJRstate" account, select "Request Parking Decal" on Student tab, complete permit, print, sign, and submit to Security to obtain a decal.

How do students who take classes at SJRSC get their textbooks?

Dual Enrollment textbooks are checked out (loaned) to SJCS students through the Media Services Department located at 10 Hildreth Drive in St. Augustine. The phone number is 904-547-3947. Website: <https://www.stjohns.k12.fl.us/media/dual-enrollment/>

Requirements for ALL dual enrollment (no exceptions)

- 3.0 unweighted, cumulative GPA (if the GPA falls below a 3.0, student will no longer be eligible)
- Have a full set of qualifying placement scores (see document "Where can your test scores take you")
- Have social/emotional maturity
- Counselor Recommendation
- Submit a complete and accurate dual enrollment application, including qualifying placement scores, by the BTHS published deadline
 - Students will be informed when dual enrollment applications and registration/approval forms are available as well as deadlines using the following: morning announcements, Schoology, the remind text messages from the school counselors, and the dual enrollment website

Dual Enrollment Frequently Asked Questions

How does a student earn qualifying placement scores?

Students can earn qualifying placement scores for dual enrollment classes through the PERT exam, ACT exam, or SAT exam. Student should refer to "Where can your test scores take you" document for qualifying placement scores needed for dual enrollment.

How does a student take the PERT exam?

Students should call the SJRSC testing office at 904-312-4228 to make an appointment at the testing center to take the Reading, Writing, and Math sections of the PERT.

How does a student take the ACT exam?

Students should register for the ACT exam online at <http://www.act.org/content/act/en/products-and-services/the-act/registration.html>

How does a student take the SAT exam?

Students should register for the SAT exam online at <https://www.collegeboard.org/>

What if a student is interested in taking dual enrollment at BTHS during 11th grade?

Dates that 10th grade students should have on their calendar (**students** should attend these meetings and fill out/turn in paperwork). Specific dates will be sent in the informational email that will go out in December:

- Early January at 8:30 am in auditorium (parents DO NOT have to attend, students do) – mandatory meeting for students
- Mid January– students should have complete and accurate paperwork turned in to main guidance office, including qualifying placement scores

What if a student is interested in taking dual enrollment courses at SJRSC during 11th or 12th grade?

Students will be informed when dual enrollment applications and registration/approval forms are available as well as deadlines using the following: [morning announcements](#), Schoology, the remind text messages from the school counselors, and the dual enrollment [website](#)

Students should meet all deadlines published by BTHS. Refer to the BTHS dual enrollment timeline for more information.

When students are selecting college campus courses, please keep the following in mind:

1. Which SJR State Campus is offering that specific section of the course?
2. What time of day/evening is the course?
3. The students BTHS schedule cannot be changed to accommodate SJRSC dual enrollment courses.
4. Will you have enough time to drive to/from your high school campus for the course?
5. Your BTHS high school courses must be taken in consecutive class periods. You may NOT drive to-from-to the BTHS campus to participate in dual enrollment.
6. If you are an athlete or involved in activities that may take you away for meets or events during the week, can you still attend every dual enrollment course session? If no, don't sign up!
7. The students BTHS schedule cannot be changed to accommodate SJRSC dual enrollment courses.
8. If students choose to take a dual enrollment course at SJRSC, they will be allowed to modify to 2 BTHS courses for every 1 on campus SJRSC course they take. Students can have a conversation about this with a counselor during their registration appointment - <https://www-bths.stjohns.k12.fl.us/courseregistration/>

Dual Enrollment Frequently Asked Questions

9. The students BTHS schedule cannot be changed to accommodate SJRSC dual enrollment courses.
10. The success rate (earning a C or better) for online dual enrollment courses are lower than courses at the college campus, therefore we do not recommend students take online dual enrollment courses.

Unwritten rules of dual enrollment (College Student 101)

- Students are responsible for sharing information regarding dual enrollment with parents
- Make sure professors know your name & face by introducing yourself after the first class.
- Every course has a published syllabus. Find it. Print it. Follow it.
- Pay attention to the Professors' Office Policies or contact methods.
- Attend every class, be early for class, & stay until the professor dismisses the class – EVERY CLASS – regardless of the attendance policy.
- Pay attention to the SJRSC calendar as it differs from the BTHS calendar.
- Bring your textbook(s), notebook, and something to write with to every class.
- Take notes in your notebook (not your phone) every class.

PERT Placement Testing for Dual Enrollment Students

The St. Johns River State College Testing Center is currently offering PERT placement testing through remote and on-campus proctoring.

To take the PERT online through remote proctoring, the following are required:

- Completed Online SJR State Dual Enrollment application
- A laptop or desktop computer with a microphone (not a tablet or phone)
- A webcam
- Reliable Internet connection
- Photo identification in the form of a government-issued ID card (driver's license, passport, etc.) or school-issued ID card (This item is required for both remote and on-campus testing)

If all of these requirements cannot be met or the student is not comfortable with being recorded through remote proctoring, on-campus PERT testing is available at reduced capacity by appointment only.

Please be aware that the PERT test may not be taken more than three times in a 12-month period. If a student has taken the PERT test previously and is unsure if all attempts in the current 12-month period have been exhausted, the student should contact the Testing Center at 386-312-4228 to determine their testing eligibility.

To register to take the PERT with SJR State, the student will need to:

1. Pay the \$20 Dual Enrollment PERT test fee through the online payment system on our Testing Center website <http://www.sjrstate.edu/testingcenter.html> by clicking the green "Test Fee Payment" button and then selecting "PERT-Dual Enrollment" from the list of exams. Enter the required information and checkout. Make note of the receipt number as it will be needed when contacting the Testing Center to schedule. Please be aware that this fee is nonrefundable and does not register a student to take the test. Call the Testing Center with any questions in regard to general PERT testing, number of previous PERT attempts, or appointment availability prior to submitting payment.
2. Contact the Testing Center by phone at 386-312-4228 or email at testingcenter@sjrstate.edu to schedule placement testing.

Please provide the following information:

- Placement testing is for Dual Enrollment
 - Student's full name
 - Student's date of birth
 - SJR State Student ID number (X Number) *Required only for remote testing
 - Student's contact information (phone and email)
 - Which sections of the PERT (Reading, Writing, Math) the student is required to take
 - Receipt number
 - Testing method of remote or on-campus
3. Follow next steps based on testing method.
Remote Testing – If the student's application has been fully processed, an email will be sent notifying the student that their name has been added to the list of students to be loaded into the system for remote testing. Students must follow the self-registration steps provided, read the testing rules outlined in the email, and respond with the requested information by the given deadline to be processed with the next group of students to test remotely. Once this has been completed and students are loaded to take the PERT remotely, they will receive an email with instructions on how to access the PERT online for remote proctoring. These instructions must be followed to ensure a smooth, frustration free testing experience.

On-Campus Testing – Students must make an appointment to come to campus to test. Testing Center staff will provide appointment options based on availability and campus. Please be aware that the Testing Centers are operating at reduced capacity to ensure social distancing. A face mask is required to test on-campus.

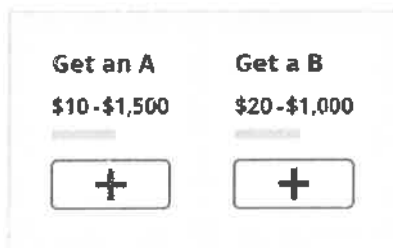

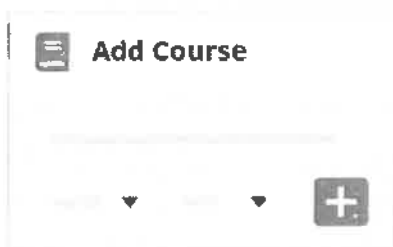

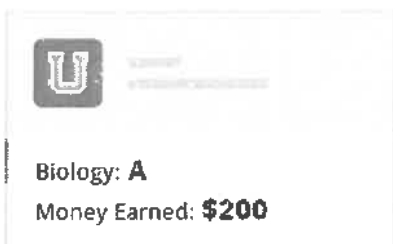
