


WHAT TO DO AFTER HIGH SCHOOL

CHOOSING A CAREER OR MAJOR TO STUDY

Ask yourself

- What are my interests? Hobbies? Things that make you happy?
- What are your skills?
- What are your talents or strengths?
- What is your personality type? Do you like working together or alone? Are you a leader or follower? Do like helping others? Are you creative/artistic or prefer structure?
- What are your values? Is financial security highly important or is it more important to have a life-work balance?
- What education do you want to pursue? How long are you willing to go to school for your career?
- Where do you want to live?

VOCATIONAL PROGRAMS

- What is the difference between vocational schools and 4 year colleges/universities?
 - Vocational schools focus on teaching a specific job and usually programs can be completed in a shorter period of time
 - 4-year colleges/universities traditionally focus on a broad education teaching theory and critical thinking skills. Typically these are 4 years or more programs.
- Where can you find vocational programs?
 - State colleges often have a variety of certificate and AS degree programs that will provide the skills to enter a skilled career in 2 or less years. Schools like SSC or Valencia State College
 - Independent trade/vocational schools exist to offer specialized programs
- There are a growing number of great paying jobs that can be done after earning a certificate, vocational degree, or AS degree
 - Examples: Healthcare, HVAC, technology, mechanics

Finish Strong

• The grades you have on your transcript at the end of summer before 12th grade are the grades colleges/universities and recruiters will see with your application

Choose challenging courses for senior year

Rigor of coursework is one of the key things colleges look at during admission process

Get to know your counselor

Many colleges & programs want a counselor recommendation.

Connect with teachers

Many colleges also ask for a teacher letter of recommendation

Continue preparing for and taking SAT and ACT

 Colleges and universities use scores from the SAT/ACT to determine admissions and sometime scholarships

Update your resume

Include awards, activities, volunteer work...anything that you feel sets you apart from other students.
This is a helpful tool to give anyone writing a letter of recommendation for you

Attend college nights and college fairs

• You will get a feel for which colleges/schools are right for you **plus** it is a great opportunity to ask questions about the school and application process

Connect with colleges

• Learn everything you can about the schools you are interested in...join their mailing list, follow their social media, attend recruiting events. This will help you learn more about the school

Visit colleges

 This is probably the most important part of a college search. Getting a feel for the college community will give you a good idea if the school is right for you.

Plan useful summer activities

Summer programs, internships, and volunteer work all improve your resume.

COLLEGE VISITS





GET THE MOST OUT OF A COLLEGE VISIT

- Check the schools calendar
 - Schedule your visit while school is in session to get a realistic view of student life
- Meet the experts
 - Try to talk with current students. Admissions representatives can help make that connection. If Admissions has a check-in or sign-in make sure you fill it out. Some schools track students interest in them.
- Take a tour
 - Take an official tour. This is a great chance to see the best features of a school.
- Venture out on your own
 - Take time to walk around on your own on campus and the community around campus so you get a well rounded view of campus life.
- Be a student for a day
 - Ask if you can sit in on a class. Some schools even sponsor over night programs. Then you can experience more of what it would be like to be a student at that school.
- Make a list
 - Keep track of your impressions of a school. Make a pros and cons list or use one of the printable guides found online.







CONSIDER THIS DURING PANDEMIC

Consider the following factors while searching for schools during the COVID pandemic

- Some schools may have adjusted their requirements. Talk to the Admissions Office of each school you are interested in attending
- Look for virtual tours and college fairs to check out schools
- Look at social media accounts of each school's clubs and organizations to get an idea of student life
- Be involved in your community. Check out VolunteerMatch.com to find virtual or at home options
- Grades are still VERY IMPORTANT. Some schools are waiving entrance exams so that makes your high school grades even more important.
