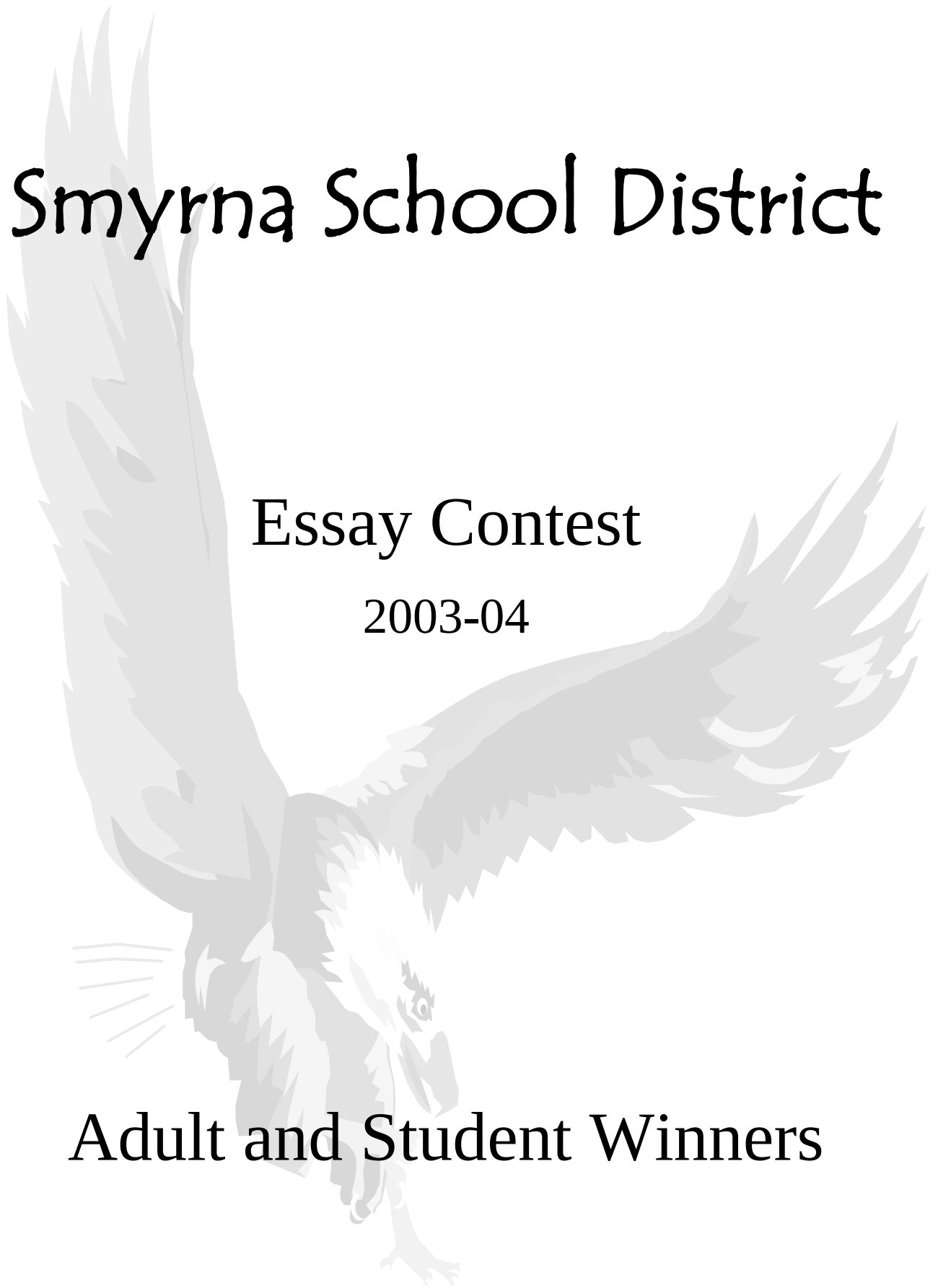

Contest rules and a writing prompt were disseminated to students (via their teachers) and the community in January 2004. As always, the writing prompt was created to mirror the type of prompt students might encounter on the Delaware Student Testing Program (DSTP) writing tests given each spring.

District teachers encouraged their students to write and helped select essays. Appreciation is extended to all for their time and effort in making this publication possible.

ESSAY CONTEST

Contestants are asked to write a maximum 500-word essay on the following topic (deadline in January 30, 2004):

Responsibility means being reliable and following through on commitments. This includes being responsible for your actions as a family member, teacher, student and citizen. You can demonstrate your responsibility through service to others and self-control.

Think about someone that you believe is a responsible person. Tell in detail why you chose this particular person, what specific qualities this person possesses and give specific examples of how he/she demonstrates responsibility.

ADULT WINNERS: First (gold), second (silver), and third (bronze) place winners received medals and certificates noting their accomplishments. Winners and runners-up were recognized during the “I Love the Smyrna School District” day (February 28, 2004).

STUDENT WINNERS: First (gold), second (silver), and third (bronze) place winners were selected at each grade level (K-12) in each building. Winners received medals and certificates noting their accomplishments. All winners were recognized during the “I Love the Smyrna School District” day (February 28, 2004).

Representing the Clayton Lions Club, I served on the committee to establish personal values as an important educational effort of the Smyrna School District. It also has to be learned.

In his book WHO’S LOOKING OUT FOR YOU, Bill O’Reilly challenges the so-called movers and shakers of our society to be less self-serving and more giving for the benefit of others. He takes it as his responsibility as an informing journalist to ferret out the motives of high profile political and professional people, including other media celebrities, as to their slant on reporting the news. A free society has a very awesome mission of caring, and we all must care enough to accept it. A care-free society will soon self-destruct unless we assume our share of the responsibility.
