Academic Team

Sponsor: Z. Kirk (Room 2134)

Description: the ELHS Academic Team is comprised of some of Eagle's Landing's most potent minds. Addressing questions ranging from complex mathematics to historical synthesis, the ELHS Academic Team battles region and district foes at monthly competitions.

Prerequisites: any student many try out for the Academic Team.

Activities: historically, the ELHS Academic Team has attended two major competitions per year. At competitions, the team competes against other academic teams from all over the southeast. Competitions are held on Saturdays and typically last all day.

Meetings: practices are held bi-monthly except during the week before a meet. Then practice occurs twice weekly.

Art Club

Sponsor: N. Wyatt (Room 5172)

Description: Art Club is an introductory art organization.

Prerequisites: one semester of high school art.
