The Georgia Department of Education (GaDOE) has approved computer courses that will fulfill the foreign language requirement for high school graduates enrolling in a university. Lowndes High School is one of the first schools in Georgia to implement these courses.

Computer programmers and software developers are in demand in Georgia. High school students need to learn the skills to be able to compete in today's workforce. Lowndes County Schools will be preparing students with STEM – Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, as well as, implementing new computer courses.

LHS is currently offering Introduction to Digital Design and Computer Science Principles. These courses are designed for high school students to understand, communicate, and adapt to a digital world as it impacts their personal life, society, and the business world. Business teachers have been attending professional training in Macon, Cumming and Statesboro to prepare for these new classes. The third class in the pathway, Programming, Games, Apps & Society will be implemented next year. The completion of all three classes will be equivalent to two

foreign language classes. Students entering a university right out of high school are required to have a foreign language credit on their transcript. Programming classes will meet this requirement. All the teachers in the business department are very excited about the new courses being offered and hope that it will increase enrollment. Students also have positive things to say about the class:

LOWNDES FFA DOMINATES NATIONAL AGRISCIENCE FAIR Herring, Warren, and Corbett Win Proficiencies



Indianapolis, IN - Members of Lowndes County FFA excelled in competition at the National FFA Convention held October 18-22. Lowndes FFA had the largest number of National Winners in the National Agriscience Fair. Landon Herring, Callie Warren, and Hunter Corbett won agricultural proficiencies.

The Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through their SAEs or home agricultural projects, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. Students can compete for awards in 49 areas covering everything from Agricultural Communications to Wildlife Management.

Herring won the Specialty Crop Production proficiency. Over the course of five years, he worked on his family farm producing flue-cured tobacco. Herring is the son of Joey and Lisa Herring.

Warren was named the winner of the Fruit Production proficiency. She developed her blueberry project over five years on her family farm. Her parents are Kevin and Amy Coggins.

Corbett won the Agriscience Research – Integrated Systems proficiency. He performed multiple research projects over the five years of his FFA experience, focusing on using cotton gin trash to clean up oil spills. Corbett is the son of Dr. James and Tracy Corbett.

Also competing in the proficiency competition were Chandler Kudyk, Outdoor Recreation, and Bailey Anderson, Equine Science. They both earned the distinction of National Proficiency Finalists – 1 of 4 in the nation in their category.

The National FFA Agriscience Fair is a competition for FFA members who are interested in the science and technology of agriculture. It is held each year during the National FFA Convention & Expo. Ten Lowndes FFA members won six of the twenty four divisions of the agriscience fair. These national winners are as follows: Environmental Systems - Division II, Charity Brown; Division III, Zach Gay and Cedric Montgomery. Food Systems - Division IV, Levi Herring and Conway McNeil. Plant Systems – Division II, Courtney Cameron; Division IV, Hunter Corbett and Chandler Kudyk. Power Systems - Division IV, Frank Balmer and Jackson Sumner. Also competing were: Ellison Pitchford, 7th place Animal Systems Division I; Clay Parker, 7th place Animal Systems Division II; Elizabeth Fisher and Gabriella Daughtry, 2nd place Animal Systems Division III; Brianna Matheny, 10th place Food Systems Division II; Ty Parks, 2nd place Plant Systems Division I; Kayla Hall, 3rd place Social Systems Division IV; Joe Corbett and Levi Brown, 2nd place 2nd place Social Systems Division III; and, Trevor Ross, 3rd place Power Systems Division II.

Ian Bennett was a candidate for the position of National FFA Officer. He represented the Georgia FFA Association in this activity at the National Convention. Bennett is the son of Dr. Marshall and Marybeth Bennett.
