Principal's Message

Aloha Mokulele Elementary 'Ohana,

We'd like to honor our student athletes in the Girls and Boys Flyers Basketball teams who competed in the Radford Complex Basketball Tournament last month in Radford High School gymnasium. Their display of good sportsmanship was great to see! We also want to congratulate our Mokulele Speech Teams for their excellent performances at the Complex Speech Festival at Aliamanu Middle School on February 4.

Our annual Jump Rope for Heart 'Ohana Groups was a big hit with all students and staff on the afternoon of February 17. It was a hot afternoon, but everyone enjoyed themselves in this fun fitness event!

As we travel though the school year, from time to time we need to stop and take stock of our bearings, and when necessary, make course corrections. Now is one such time. We would like to remind all parents and students about these school rules that we expect all students to follow:

- 1) School uniform shirts must be worn on all school days. The only exceptions are Thursdays, when college attire may be worn instead of the school uniform. We are an AVID school, and are planting the seeds of college for all at an early age. Other days would be free dress days for special occasions. (see Student Planner, p.11)
- 2) We have noticed that some students have been arriving very early on campus, sometimes as early as 6:30 am. This is a concern since we have no childcare program before school and it could become a liability. We have also had groups of students running up and down hallways, congregating in bathrooms, and otherwise causing disruptions. We respectfully ask parents that your children arrive on campus no earlier than 7:10 am. (see Planner, p.14)
- 3) By the same token, we ask that all students exit campus after school unless they are supervised by after school programs or by an adult. (see Planner, p.14)
- 4) Personal sports equipment is not to be brought to school by students and is considered contraband. It has been the source of disagreements and unnecessary arguments. As such it will be confiscated and held in the office for parents to pick up. The school has ample sports equipment for our students' needs.

We have been working hard on our Academic Plan for 2017-2020, and will be sharing it with our parents and community. We have conducted a needs assessment that will largely drive our goals in the plan. All parents and community members will have an opportunity to provide input regarding the direction of our school over the next three years.

Kindergarten: Kindergarteners will be learning about the various animal groups for our next field trip to the Honolulu Zoo on March 29th. Grade 3:

This month the Third Grade students are learning to identify and describe two-dimensional figures. 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Vision


Mokulele Elementary School is a Tribes school where all learners succeed in a safe, positive place that values relationships and relevant learning.
