Grade Level News

Each month our Grade Level News will feature highlights about school life at Mokulele Elementary School. Enjoy finding out more about what happens at the Home of the Flyers.

Kindergarten: The Kindergarteners completed the first quarter of the school year! We also welcomed Mrs. Slilma Tukey to our Kindergarten Ohana. Mrs. Tukey welcomed her new students with excitement and a smooth transition. As we head into the second quarter, we will learn about the Fall Season and Fire Safety. The students will continue to practice their letter and number recognition, as well as producing quality work when writing their letters and numbers. Emphasis will also be on letter sounds and blending of words. New vocabulary words will be introduced in Math: greater than, less than, and equal to. Please continue to read daily with your child. We look forward to meeting all of you during Parent – Teacher Conference.

Grade 1:

"When I look up, I see the whole world shining. When I look down, I feel the earth as mine.

When I look out, I touch everything .When I look in, I can hear my heart sing."

As our mindfulness sessions end each day, the students look forward to singing this exploring song. They have learned three strategies to calm themselves down: shark fin, mindful minute, and the relaxation train. Please remind them to use it when they need to remember to be mindful. Thank you for working with your child to complete our first quarter project, "It's All About Me!" The students proudly shared their folders and we enjoyed learning more about everyone During the Fall Break, please continue to listen to your child read, read, and read. Please visit the Hickam Library and borrow books about plants. Our next field trip to the Lyon's Arboretum will focus on plants. We will become arborists and closely examine variations in plants. Fall Festival will be coming soon in November. We hope that you'll be able to volunteer.

Grade 2:

A highly popular 2nd grade tradition is coming your way!

All of the 2nd Graders are scientists! We are learning the scientific process of the power of observation and writing notes which are data to study about life cycles. We will bring science to life! Your child will be learning and working with mealworms! They will have their own mealworm kit in which they will view their mealworms' life cycle.





Grade 3:

This month the Third Graders will be reading stories that describe how important cooperation is to solving community problems. The students will be learning that when people share ideas and work together it makes solving problems easier. In Math, the students will be learning to add and subtract using various strategies. They will also be learning the value of different coins, coin equivalents, and learning to compute change.

Grade 4: Our 4th grade scientists had yummy fun creating, testing, & analyzing their solar ovens effect on their marshmallows. Even though the weather wasn't very cooperative we all had a lot of fun while learning. We wish our friends who have moved or are moving a fond Aloha A Hui Hou (Aloha until we meet again) and to our new friends Aloha E Komo Mai (Welcome!). Just a reminder, if you are moving please give our office notification at least a week in advance or asap so that we can have all records ready for your child's transfer. Fall Break is fast approaching... Where did the first quarter go? Over the break please remind your child to read and practice their math facts daily.

Grade 5: Our students are currently collecting HI-5 items to recycle, and the money earned will be donated to the American Red Cross for Hurricane Harvey relief efforts.

Grade 6:

The month of September has quickly reached its end. We were not able to start many of the things we had planned, but, are eager to begin the Second Quarter refreshed after Fall Break. October looks to be a month filled with our personal narrative writing project. We will have started our new Unit in Wonders, "Excursions Across Time". We will be learning about early civilizations and the beginnings of democracy. Our teacher plans to extend these opportunities into our Social Studies lessons. We can't wait to travel to other places and time now that our Rube-Goldberg Machines are done. In Math we are working diligently to master the four operations: adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing with both fractions and decimals. These lessons will require us to be quality producers by checking over our work, being organized and neat with our calculations. We need to be self-directed learners by persevering through each task we are given. It helps if we have memorized our multiplication facts, so we can recall quickly important information. Please cheer us on as we continue to grow and improve to prepare for Middle School.

Vision


Mokulele Elementary School is a Tribes school where all learners succeed in a safe, positive place that values relationships and relevant learning.
