Honors American Literature Summer Reading Assignment 2018—2019

In order to acquire knowledge of the American Literary Periods and the significance of each, students will conduct extensive research. Additionally, students will read and analyze literary texts representative of each literary period. On the <u>first day of school</u>, students will submit the summer reading assignment in both **PRINTED** and **ELECTRONIC** format and upload an electronic version to Turnitin.com. Finally, students will be tested over the information compiled for the summer reading assignment on the first day of the third week of school.

The second paragraph should analyze how the text demonstrates the characteristics of the literary period. Be sure to properly cite evidence from the text to support your claim.
