AICE General Paper Summer Reading (11th Grade Honors)

Read *Kindred* by Octavia Butler. Then, use your understanding of the novel to answer the following 3 questions. Each answer should be around 150 words.

- 1. Both Kevin and Dana know that they can't change history: "We're in the middle of history. We surely can't change it." (page100); and "It's over.... There's nothing you can do to change any of it now." (page 264). Why must you, the reader, experience this journey with Dana? As a member of the human race, must we experience different cultures in order to understand and accept them?
- 2. How do you think Butler confronts us with issues of difference in Kindred? How does she challenge us to consider boundaries of black/white, master/slave, husband/wife, past/present? What other differences does she convolute? Do you think such dichotomies are flexible? Artificial? Useful?
- 3. "The ease. Us, the children.... I never realized how easily people could be trained to accept slavery." This is said by Dana to Kevin when they have returned to the present and are discussing their experience in the antebellum South. To what extent, if any, do you believe racial oppression exists today?

What is an annotation?

As you read, you are to underline, circle, and draw arrows connecting words and phrases, or whatever it takes to remind you later of your impressions. These annotations should include notes to yourself in the margins—

- asking questions anything you don't understand or wonder about the book
- making observations
- defining new vocabulary words
- identifying literary elements and explaining the significance
- noting allusions
