Course Description:

The Georgia Standards of Excellence (GSE) provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to learn, so teachers and parents know what they need to do to help them. The standards are designed to be robust and relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our young people need for success in high school, college and careers. Please visit <u>https://www.georgiastandards.org/Common-Core/Pages/Math-6-8.aspx</u> for a complete list of the 6th grade math GSE. Below is a brief description of each 6th grade math unit.

1st Semester:

• Number System Fluency: Students will divide fractions by fractions, compute fluently with multi-digit decimals, and find common factors and multiples.

• Ratio, Ratio, and Proportional Reasoning-Using Equivalent Fraction: Students will understand ratio concepts and use ratio reasoning to solve problems.

• Negative Rational Exploration: Numbers and Their Opposites: Students will use positive and negative numbers to represent quantities in real-world contexts; understand opposites, ordering and absolute value of rational numbers; and graph on the coordinate plane.

• **Expressions:** Students will evaluate expressions involving exponents and identify when two expressions are equivalent.

2nd Semester:

• One Step Equations & Inequalities: Students will solve and graph one-step equations and inequalities using each of the four basic operations.

• Area and Volume: Students will solve real-world and mathematical problems involving area, surface area, and volume.

• Statistics: Students will display data with graphs and summarize data using measures of center and variability.

LATE/MAKE-UP WORK

• Scholars will have up to <u>5 days</u> to submit <u>missed</u> or <u>late work</u>. <u>Note: Any assignment not submitted within five (5)</u> <u>days of the originally assigned due date will remain as a permanent grade of zero (0%) within the Infinite</u> Campus gradebook.

 \cdot An <u>M</u> or <u>missing</u> will be placed as grade placeholder to reflect missing work; please note missing work will equate to a <u>0</u> in the Infinite Campus (IC) gradebook until the work is made up.

 \cdot Scholars will receive a -<u>10pt. deduction</u> from the grade earned on the missed/late work \cdot If the work is not made up within 5 days of due date, the grade will be changed to a <u>0</u> with commentary indicating the missed work deadline.

• If a scholar **misses work** due to an **absence** the scholar will be allowed to make up work commensurate with his/her number of absence/s. It is the scholar's responsibility to inquire about missed work and or assessments from his/her teacher(s).

CLASSROOM/BEHAVIOR EXPECTATIONS

Discipline Protocol

Please note that such infractions are handled on a case-by-case basis, but could warrant a consequence that results in a scholar receiving an immediate office referral; thereby foregoing the prescribed Dog B.I.T.E.S. process.
