



Ci3T Corner: Test Taking Tips

The Hawai'i State Assessments (HSA) Science and Smarter Balanced (SBA) Assessments are designed to measure whether students are "on track" for college and career readiness. These tests are given to our students from grades three through six. In addition, students school-wide will be completing their iReady Diagnostics in Reading and Math. Testing will begin in March and continue through May.

Here are five tips for testing:

- 1.Have a good night's rest (8-10 hours).
- 2. Enjoy a healthy breakfast before testing.
- 3. Arrive on time.
- 4. Start your day with encouraging words.
- 5.Don't stress, do your best!



Hawaii Keiki Waiakea Complex RN's Message Bike Safety

We have a lot of students who bike to school. So, let's review bike safety tips to keep everyone safe.

Bike safety tips:

- Use a Properly fitted Bicycle helmet. To protect your child's head and brain. Hawaii has a Helmet law §291C-150. The law states, "No person under sixteen years of age shall operate a bicycle upon a street, bikeway, or any other public property unless that person is wearing a properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet."
- Select a bike to fit your height. To do so, per the Department of Transportation National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, stand over your bicycle; there should be 1 to 2 inches between the rider and the top bar for a road bike and 3 to 4 inches for a mountain bike. The seat should be level front to back, and the height should be adjusted to allow a slight bend at the knee when the leg is fully extended. The handlebar height should be level with the seat.
- Make sure you have reflectors or lights attached to your bike. It's hard to see bicyclists during dawn, dusk, or nighttime hours. Reflectors and lights on the front and rear of your bicycle will help drivers notice you.
- Make sure you are visible to others. Wear neon, fluorescent, or bright colors when riding to make yourself visible to others.
- Go with the flow of traffic in the same direction as other vehicles.
- Obey all traffic laws. Obey all traffic signs, signals, and lane markers. Yield to pedestrians in a crosswalk.
- Use hand signals. Look before turning.
- Use bike lanes or bike paths when available.
- Sidewalks: Bicycles are prohibited from being ridden on sidewalks in a business district but may be ridden on the sidewalks when traveling at 10mph or less.
