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Block Scheduling

8:30 School starts/morning announcements

Students either have ELA, or Math until 10:30 depending on which teacher they are with.

Writing is a BIG focus this year

Math

Practice ALL math facts (multiplication, and division, addition and subtraction)

Currently our focus is Mult. Facts through 12. IT IS SO VERY IMPORTANT FOR YOUR CHILD TO KNOW THEIR X FACTS, AS MOST OF THE 4TH GRADE STANDARDS INCLUDE MULTIPLICATION AND/OR DIVISION.

Multi-step word problems using all 4 operations

Homework is given each night and due the day they are back with the teacher who gave the homework.

iReady Math 30 minutes, split over 2 days each week

Multiplication fluency checks regularly

3 FAST Tests during the year (first one already taken) to test their understanding of the standards being taught.

Students keep a math interactive notebook at school.

Reminders:

Check and sign planner every night for homework and notes

Snack happens after specials each day.- Students can bring in their own and also donations for the class are always welcome. STUDENTS CONTINUE TO WORK WHILE HAVING THEIR 5-10 MINUTE SNACK.

School hours are 8:30-3:00, with dismissal at 2:00 on Wednesdays. Our tardy bell rings at 8:35 this year. Students must be here on time EVERY DAY or go to the front office for a tardy slip.

- Florida Assessment of Student Thinking, or FAST, refers to the new Coordinated Screening and Progress Monitoring (CSPM) System assessments, which are aligned to the Benchmarks in Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) Standards.
 - The FAST progress monitoring tool is designed to track students' progress toward meeting end of the
 year grade level performance goals. As this is the first time these assessments will be administered;
 results will be used for informational purposes only and will provide information about the students'
 progress on mastering B.E.S.T. benchmarks. Students enrolled in grades 3 through 5 ELA and
 mathematics will participate in these assessments at the beginning, middle and end of the year.

Music

Students in kindergarten through 5th grade attend music class once a week. In this class, students not only learn musical skills, but access tools to increase creativity through game-based learning. This approach incorporates the spoken word, singing, movement, and instrument playing. Children thrive in this structured and fun environment as they explore the elements of music.
