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6th Grade Social Studies Syllabus

Course Description: The major focus is on several important regions of the world: Europe, Latin America, the Caribbean, Canada, and Australia. Students will learn how people have shaped the history of the region. Students will learn how geography and natural resources have affected how people live. In addition, students will learn about the economies of countries in these regions of the world. The geographic environment, political, economic, and historical development are explored in each of these areas. Important threads to be studied include ethnic patterns, cultural expressions of values through the arts, as well as interdependence of nations in the past and in the modern era.

Objectives: During this course, students will have the opportunity to advance skills in information processing, research, problem solving, public speaking, map/globe skills, inquiry, and working together cooperatively. The use of concept mapping, timelines, and graphs and tables will be used throughout the course to develop analysis and interpretation skills.
