## 6th Grade Girls are on the Move ... College Bound What's Going On In 6th Grade Classes?

Are you wondering what your child is learning in class?

Well here is the scoop ...

Ms. James and Mrs. Mosley-Jensen's

classes have recently finished their Mythology unit, learning features of mythological stories and reading mythology from a variety of cultures. Students analyzed the mythological features of the film Percy Jackson and the Olympians: The Lightning Thief and compared the actions of important mythological figures to Coretta Scott King. This month, we are working on our Expository unit, learning common text features of informational writing and engaging in web-based research. In the coming weeks, students will create a culminating task that requires them to conduct and cite research and create a multimedia presentation on an instance of genocide. Their research project ties in with our current readings in The Diary of a Young Girl by Anne Frank, project using appropriate evidence and citations.

Dr. Cheatham—Earth Science (Quarter 2) This unit includes the study of the Earth's layers and plate tectonics. Students are learning about the composition of Earth's crust, mantle, and core and how fossils show evidence of Earth's changing surface and climate. They are also studying how the movement of lithospheric plates cause major geological events. The Earth's Layers mini-project was due on November 7th.

#### What's Going On In 6th Grade ... Cont.

In Coach Ball's social studies class students are studying the development of modern Latin America, the organizational structures and cultures of different Latin American countries, and the political and physical features of the region. The culminating project for the unit is a foldable that organizes information about locations and physical features of Latin American countries.

Ms. Smith and Ms. Chitiga's mathematics students are currently working in Unit 5. In this unit, students are working with decimals, ratios, and percent's. This unit overlaps with the standards from unit 3 and allows students to reinforce their percent skills with

an understanding of one-step equations from Unit 4. The unit 5 post-test is tentatively scheduled for December 16th.


#### **ACADEMIC FAIR**
