# Adjective and Adverb Clauses

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# Adjective Clause

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- A subordinate clause that modifies a noun or a pronoun.
- An adjective clause usually follows the noun or pronoun it modifies and tells which one or what kind.

# Adjective Clause

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- An adjective clause almost always contains a relative pronoun.
- Relative Pronouns: that, which, who, whom, whose

# Example Adjective Clauses

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- Emma Willard was the one *who founded the first women's college in the United States.*
- The team's mascot, *which is a horse,* is called Renegade.

# Appositive

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- A word or phrase set off by commas that explains the noun or pronoun that it follows.
- Example: Our destination, **the Museum of Modern Art**, was amazing.

# The Adverb Clause

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- A subordinate clause that is used as an adverb.
- An adverb clause answers the following questions: How? When? Where? Why? To what extent? How much? How long?

# The Adverb Clause

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## Examples:

–After I finish painting my bookcases, I will call you.

–I paint where there is plenty of fresh air.
