## **Terms, Events, and People to Know:**

- French and Indian War
  - War over land fought between the French (with Indian help) and the British
- Treaty of 1764
  - France lost land Spain lost its territories
  - Colonies must help pay for the war even though the war was not theirs to fight.
- Proclamation of 1763
  - No Colonists could live west of the Appalachian Mountains.
  - That land was to be allotted to the Indians.
- Colonists were taxed to assist in paying for the war damages and costs.
  - o Stamp Act
  - o Sugar Act
  - Intolerable Acts
- First Continental Congress
  - Delegates from each state (except GA.) met to withdraw from British rule and cease paying the taxes.
  - Georgia didn't attend because they were benefitting from British governance.

- Quartering Act Colonists must house and cover costs imposed by British soldiers.

- Georgia Constitution
  - Strengths and Weaknesses
  - 3 Branches of Government
    - Legislature UNIcameral only has 1 house and is the MOST powerful.
