**Course Title**: AP World History

# **Course Description**:

The AP World History course is structured around the investigation of five themes and 19 essential concepts in six different chronological periods, from approximately 8000 B.C.E to present. This course is organized around a limited number of key concepts instead of a list of facts, events, and dates. We will spend less time on factual recall, and more time on learning the essential concepts needed to develop historical thinking skills necessary to explore broad trends and global processes involved in the study of AP World History.

Students taking the AP World History Course are also expected to take the AP World History Exam. This exam is 3 hours and 5 minutes long. It includes both a 55-minute multiple-choice section and a 130-minute free-response section. The multiple-choice part of the exam accounts for half of the student's grade, and the free-response accounts for the other half of the student's grade.
