A.P. World History Syllabus Mr. Spinks Eagles Landing High School Spring 2023

Textbook: Ways of the World by Robery Strayer and Eric Nelson (\$150)

Course Description:

The purpose of the AP World History course is to develop greater understanding of the evolution of global processes and contacts, in interaction with different types of human societies. This understanding is advanced through a combination of factual knowledge and analytical skills. The course highlights the nature of changes in international frameworks and their causes and consequences, as well as comparisons among major societies. The course emphasizes relevant factual knowledge deployed in conjunction with leading interpretive issues and types of historical evidence. The course builds on an understanding of cultural, institutional, and technological precedents that, along with geography, set the human stage. Periodization forms an organizing principle for dealing with change, continuity, and comparison throughout the course.

Chronological periods of the course:

Text Book Part 1 = Unit Zero, Unit One and Unit Two (before 1200 ce to 1450 ce)

Text Book Part 2 = Unit Three and Unit Four (1450 ce to 1750 ce)

Text Book Part 3 = Unit Five and Unit Six (1800 ce to 1900 ce)

Text Book Part 4 = Unit Seven, Unit Eight and Unit Nine (1900 ce to present)

Grading system:

The assessment category of Infinite Campus includes quizzes, unit tests, projects and discussion posts.

The assessment category makes up 40% of the final grade.

The Classwork/practice category will include vocabulary, notebook checks and other assignments. The classwork/practice category makes up 40% of the final grade.

There will be a final exam (20% of the final grade)

Homework - rarely will there be specific homework assignments. However, you will have to invest time each day in reading and vocabulary work as well as reviewing classroom lectures.

<u>Supplies needed:</u> 3 ring binder, loose leaf notebook paper, different types of post it notes and highlighters. *No spiral notebooks or journals.* Tutoring is available before school from 7:30am to 8am daily or after school by appointment.
