Application deadline: June 30, 2019

Purpose: The Opportunity Fund Program creates a three-year weighted funding program across the state. Delaware is currently one of only a handful of states without additional funding for English learners (ELs) and/or low-income students (low-income).

Allocation Method: LEAs will receive \$500 per EL and \$300 per low-income student. Funding shall be made available to LEAs upon the passage of the FY20 budget in early July, so they may begin to hire staff, procure instructional materials, execute contracts for services, and plan for the upcoming school year. LEAs may use this funding for 100% of staff costs, including, but not limited to, reading specialists, math specialists, school counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, and other personnel dedicated to initiatives such as trauma-informed practices.

Accountability: Districts will be held accountable to ensure funds are used to improve outcomes for low-income and EL students. Districts and charters will work with Secretary Bunting to set goals at the beginning of the school year, participate in a mid-year progress review, and then evaluate summative performance data during their end of school year conference. Community accountability will be provided in a summit to highlight best practices, in an annual report, and in spotlights showing program successes and challenges across the state.

Metrics: Districts and charters will set goals to reduce the gap between English learners', low-income students', and the overall student population's baseline performance rates and 100% by half, thus reducing students' non-proficiency by 50%.

In addition to the accountability measure data, the Delaware Department of Education (DDOE) will provide support by offering

- Toolkits on evidence-based best practices for improving outcomes for EL and low-income students.
- Guidance for selecting high quality instructional materials.
- Technical support enabling LEAs to take a comprehensive look at their funding streams in order to maximize and coordinate them.
- Professional learning provided by content experts.
- Sharing best practices in a variety of ways including regular meetings with curriculum directors, chicfs/principals, social media and presentations.

DDOE will use a third party to also evaluate

- The effectiveness of funds in improving outcomes for EL and low-income students.
- The successes and challenges/shortcomings of the program, including recommendations for future enhancements.

Results from the first year of funding will be finalized in August 2020. Subsequently, DDOE will host a summit in September/October to share the report and best practices. In November/ December 2020, the third-party evaluation will be complete and results will be posted after districts and charters verify them.

We will oppand our early learning programming for an additional 60 students (four Pre-K classrooms to be housed at Brick Mill Elignentary School, Specifically, we will target students in the abovermentioned a subgroups who would otherwise not be enoughed in a formal early learning setting. After bed you will see the higher number of these subgroups located around Stiver Lake Elementary and Redding Middle school, We will larget this feeder area. Our district currently has the Appropriate Pre-School Center site that serves 140 three year olds and 130 four year olds. This past school year our CTE pathways created two PreK Lab sites housed in each of our high schools, Each class has 15 students. While the MOT area, compared to other districts, does not have a high percentage of Low SES and EL students (22%), our data reflacts that we do have disperaging gaps that need to close, Additionally, we are still enrolling many EL students that are coming from various countries. Our staff need the tools to serve them and increase proficiency levels in the reading category per ACCESS (see chart). These lunds will also provide training for these teachers and additional staff support, We strive to serve EACH student in our service area and provide quality instruction.

The impact of investments in low-income and EL preachoolers will be evidenced through higher Delawere Early Leamer Survey scores as program participants enter kindergarten, while the impact of Opportunity Funding initiatives for older low-income and EL studente will be reflected in increased ELA and math Smarter proficiency percentages.

Finally, one of our strategic plan areas under Fostering Academic Achievement is to 'grow services to preschool families and child care providers. These funds will assist us in achieving this god.
