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
Counselors' Corner, continued...

Nurse's Corner

Greetings!

Spring is here and winter colds are now being replaced by allergies, asthma, and other illnesses. We do not want your child to miss school; nor do we want your child to come to school and expose others to illness that could be contagious. In an effort to keep students healthy, we ask that you keep your child at home if he/she is sick and feverish.



In Georgia, pollen season comes in two phases. From April to June, many allergy sufferers feel the effects of trees and grasses. Then, from August through September, they feel the effects of Ragweed. If your child suffers from allergies, please make sure you medicate them at home or send a note along with the medication, as these medications are not provided at school.

Tips for Surviving Allergy Season

- 1. Know the pollen count.
- 2. Stay indoors when the pollen count is high.
- 3. Protect yourself from pollen when you go outside.
 - 4. Wash your hands and face consistently.
- 5. Help your child's teacher by purchasing boxes of tissues.

Grade Level News

Kindergarten News

Can you believe spring is already here? This school year is flying by! We are having so much fun in kindergarten. We are becoming better readers, informative writers, professional mathematicians, and brainy scientists! Let's just say...there is never a dull moment in kindergarten!



What are we learning at school?

In English Language Arts, we will continue to practice writing and reading three letter CVC words (bat, mug, kid). Your child should be able to successfully sound out these words and write the letters they hear, as well as take three isolated sounds (b-i-g) and blend them together to read the word (big). We are working hard on informational and opinion writing. As we write, the students are encouraged to sound out words and write sentences independently.

In Math, we are busy learning everything there is to know about addition and subtraction. Your child is learning to show their answers in a variety of ways (with fingers or manipulatives, pictures, ten frames, and equations). This unit requires consistent practice to ensure that your child understands the difference between an addition and subtraction problem. Encourage your child to read the math problems aloud before solving them. Ask "Does this equation want you to add or subtract?" We will also focus on the following key vocabulary words: sum, difference, add, subtract, equation.

In Science, we are wrapping up our unit on living things. We had the best time observing the butterflies in our classrooms. Your children not only learned about the life cycle of a butterfly, but they observed it with their own eyes! Letting our butterflies go was a sad and happy day...the students miss having them as our "class pets." J Now we have moved onto plants, and we are busy sorting them by their many attributes. What makes a tree different from a flower? How are two flowers similar?

A BIG CONGRATULATIONS to those students who attended our sight word popcorn party in the beginning of April! We are so impressed by your hard work! Remember, your child needs to be reading at a level D by the end of kindergarten. Sight words are one important component of reading. Did you know 75% of the words you read every day are sight words?

Second Grade News

Second Graders Are Special Shining Stars!!



Special Events:

With the introduction of the night sky, second grade has been busily involved with fun activities!



Dr. Schmude, a Gordon State College Astronomy professor, came to visit the second grade team. The professor held a group meeting to discuss many interesting facts. One thing our students learned is that different colored stars have different temperatures. Based on their shirt color, students stood up to represent the different types of stars. Next, we went outside to use a special instrument called a sun spotter. This instrument gave students the opportunity to view an image of the sun and where the sun's spots were located.

Students were also able to visit the Star Lab. The Star Lab is an inflated globe that students are able to crawl inside. Once inside, the night sky and all its constellations are viewed on the ceiling. Students enjoyed hearing the stories of how the constellations were first named.

In March, we celebrated Dr. Seuss's birthday! Teachers and students dressed as book characters and read for several hours to promote reading. (One class was even brave enough to try green eggs and ham!)

In some classrooms, students were given the opportunity to make moon phases using Oreos. The moon phase was displayed by using the black cookie and white cream as representation of each phase.

This month, students learned about bicycle safety from McGruff the Crime Dog and a local officer. He explained the bicycle hand signals and gave the students a safety booklet. We enjoy our monthly visit from McGruff to teach us how to remain safe at all times!

Special Projects:

We had a wonderful turnout for our Black History celebrations. Students completed a research project that consisted of creating a booklet of information about a specific African American that has contributed to our history. Students made a pipe cleaner person, stamp, and timeline to accompany their bibliography research. As a school competition, all classrooms developed a bulletin board that was representative of Black History Month. We used our projects, along with other activities completed in class, as our artifacts to celebrate this special time. A volunteer came for each class as part of the Read-in-Chain. The children enjoyed listening to stories such as *The Freedom Box* and *The Other Side* to name a few.



As we begin our unit on lifecycles, second grade purchased live ladybug larvae which grew in our Ladybug Land habitat. We watched as our ladybug larvae quickly grew to become pupa. Once they became adult ladybugs, we released them near the garden that our Garden Club has built.

The students have worked hard to create a three-dimensional replica of the ladybug lifecycle using a variety of materials. They were asked to display each stage of the lifecycle and to provide a written explanation of the change that occurs.

Special Reminder:

Keep up the great work with First in Math, Study Island, and Accelerated Reader. We hope to recognize students who have excelled in their performance by the end of the year!

We are wrapping up our science unit on heat and starting a unit on pollution and conservation.

In math, we have concluded our unit on fractions and we are teaching a unit on measurement. We will be working on telling time to the nearest minute and solving elapsed time problems. In addition, we will be learning about mass and volume.



In social studies, we are focusing on the basic principles that provide the foundation



of a republican form of government. Our third graders will be learning about the responsibilities of the three levels and three branches of government.

We are planning to have a special visitor share with our third grade students: Tim Thompson, the mayor of Stockbridge!


