

Cornell Note Taking: Give AVID Students a Tool to Increase Their Academic Achievement

Cornell Note Taking is a system that each AVID student is expected to be efficient at. There are four parts to Cornell Note Taking:

1. Note-Taking: Writing down key points of the lecture or reading. 2. Note-Making: Revising notes, generating questions and



collaboration to create meaning. 3. Note-Interacting: Writing of summary/Use notes as a learning tool.

4. Note-Reflecting: Use of feedback to make improvements.
